PUBLIC HEALTH WORK.

In the Province of Ontario an effor being made to reorganize publi health work in rural communities or a county basis, with a salaried public health officer and public health nurse in each, giving all their time to the work. A conference of rural leaders held this week at the Guelph Agricul-tural College adopted resolutions urging this course, and forwarded them to promptly follow so excellent an exremier Ferguson.

New Brunswick already has district health officers giving their whole time to the work, but has not been able to establish a public health nursing service. The Rockefeller Foundation is willing to pay the full cost of initiatng such a service in this province, if at the expiration of a stated time the muicipalities will assume the financial sponsibility. Some of them have

lready agreed to do so, and it is hoped that at an early date others will fall in ine, so that a service which is so essen tial to the public welfare in every rural constituency as well as in cities and owns may be established.

NATIONAL RAILWAY PROSPECTS.

A despatch from Edmonton says there will be no complaints from Brit-ish harvesters in Alberta this year, as the farmers will seek the supply nearer at home. That province hopes to get the larger portion of its supply from British Columbia. At a conference in Winnipeg this week it was estimated that the three Prairie Provinces would require 37,000 men. Alberta's quota is 10,000, of which it is expected 4,000 can be secured in the province itself. There was so much dissatisfaction as a result of the bringing of British har-vesters to Canada last year that it is probably wise not to repeat the experi-ment. Si Eugene Fiset has been nominated as Liberal candidate in Rimouski. 
Where could there be a better field for the moving pic-ture, which reaches so many more millions than any other form of expression?
