QUEEN IN BATTLE AGAINST DIVORCE

Gets the Big London Papers To Assist

OPPOSES NEW LAW

Under Custom, Report of Majority of Recent Commission Extending Divorce Facilities Would Be Basis of Legislation—Believed She Has Prevented It

(Canadian Press) New York, Nov. 28.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: Queen Mary has taken strong action in reference to the recent report of the divorce commission. The queen is opposed to divorces under any conditions and is greatly annoyed by the terms of the recent report. At present, according to English law, divorce is obtainable by a husband only if the wife is guilty of adultery and is obtainable by the wife only if the husband is guilty of adultery and cruelty as well.

A majority of the commissioners recommended the granting of divorces on other grounds, insanity and habitual drunkenness, while the minority, which included the Archbishop of York, practically advised that the only alteration in the existing law should be to put the two sexes on an equality regarding the grounds for divorce, and should the extension of facilities for either. It is customary for the government, in due course, to introduce a bill with the object of giving legislative effect to the majority report of a royal commission who, as a usually the case, the commissioners are not unanimous, but the queen firmly resolved to do her best to prevent the majority report of the divorce commission being made the basis of a new law. She has the church on her side and the staff of the steady movement toward disestablishment, the church is still a great power in the land.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has vigorously condemned the majority report and every bishop and clergyman of the church of England is following the lead set by the two archbishops.

Queen Gets Aid of Press The queen, however, not content with having the church on her side, made up her mind to win over the press also and by a clever stroke succeeded in getting "The Times" and "The Daily Mail" vigorously support her recommendations in their editorial columns.

In all the circumstances therefore, it is extremely unlikely that any bill will be introduced in parliament framed on the recommendation of the majority report.

MONEY LEFT IN WILL TO AID IN FOUNDING HOME FOR OLD MEN

Caleb R. Palmer Remembered Many in Distributing His Worldly Goods—Circuit Court

In the probate court today the matter of the will of Caleb R. Palmer was taken up. He died on November 10 of this year in Penobscot, but his domicile was in St. John. The will, which was proved today, gives to the "Methodist church" the sum of \$1,000 for the superannuated orphans' home of that church, and \$500 for the Missionary Society for missionary purposes of the church; to the Protestant Orphan's Home of St. John, \$500; to his executor, William Edgar Wallace \$500 upon trust that when an institution for or the maintenance of a home for old men and old women is established or promoted in St. John, to pay the same and interest thereon to the said institution for such institution or towards the endowment of the same in the amount of the sum so invested; if no such institution is inaugurated within ten years from the testator's demise, the sum so invested to belong to William Edgar Wallace.

The will provides that, having insured the Royal Assurances, \$1,000 to his sister, Ruth E. Lovers; \$500 to his sister, Mary Wilson; \$500 to his sister, Emily Rye; and \$1,000 to his brother, Edward C. Palmer, he confirms the same. He gives \$1,000 to William Edgar Wallace, a niece by marriage, the interest on \$1,000 to Magie Gambin, formerly Murray, a niece by marriage; and after her death the principal to her daughters, Jennie E. and Anna Gambin; to John Franklin Palmer, a nephew by marriage; \$500 to Bertha Pearson, a niece by marriage; \$500 to the Rev. Thomas J. Durrant, \$500 to Lewis Widger, his nephew; John A. Palmer, of Dorchester, \$500; to James Humphrey, of Braas's Creek, \$500; to Mary Wilson, of Matine Falls, \$500; to Mrs. Duly, of Greenville, Maine, a niece by marriage, \$1,000; to Jennie E. Widger, a niece by marriage, \$500; to Minnie, wife of William Radford, a niece by marriage, \$500; to George Laver, a nephew by marriage, wife of Thomas Pearson, blacksmith \$500; to William Edgar Wallace, of Penobscot, his executor, \$1,000; and he makes him his executor. There is no real estate, personal estate, \$2,000. T. P. Regan, is executor.

Edmonton to Lay Half Million Square Yards of Permanent Paving Next Year. Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 28.—Contracts for laying 511,333 square yards of permanent paving, at an estimated cost of \$1,734,785, will be awarded by the city of Edmonton the middle of December. Forty-one streets will be improved next year. This is the largest single contract in the history of the paving business in Canada. The improvement programme, which is under the direction of the board of commissioners, also includes the establishment of a municipally-owned paving plant, costing \$100,000. It was discovered that Dr. Nazim Bey was organizing meetings and leading numerous intrigues against the authorities.

Woodstock Men Buy Pair of Black Foxes. Woodstock, N. B., Nov. 28.—The fox farm industry in which Carleton county will play an important part, was settled last night when George Balmain and George McPhail arrived here from P. E. Island where they were sent to purchase the fox ranches. They reported the purchase of a pair of thoroughbred foxes from one of the best ranches on the island. The amount paid is in the vicinity of \$14,000. The company, which is composed mostly of Woodstock men, will at once go through the necessary legal forms and work out the details of a business that is expected to become an important industry. The question of the location of the farm is not yet definitely settled, but it will probably be within easy distance of the town. The foxes purchased may be left on the island until spring. Messrs. Balmain and McPhail found great difficulty in landing a pair as there were none for sale owing to the great demand. They are much elated over their purchase.

A. B. FARMER'S ADDRESS. It was at first stated that A. B. Farmer, Toronto, would address the Canadian Club, on tax reform, at Keith's Assembly rooms. It was found, however, that they were engaged next Monday evening and arrangements were therefore made for the use of the big school room of Trinity. The meeting, which will be open to taxpayers, will open at eight o'clock Monday evening, and will at five o'clock have a reception of the taxpayers.

Was Friend of Harrison. Washington, Nov. 27.—Colonel Daniel M. Randall, sergeant at arms of the senate, and an intimate friend of the late President Harrison, died today. An operation was performed on November 7.

WAR INTEREST IS CENTERED IN THE DARDANELLES

Turks Reinforce Garrison There and Fleet Reported Ready For Sea—New Phase to Macedonian Situation—The Cholera Scourge

(Canadian Press) London, Nov. 28.—The Turkish fleet with the exception of the cruiser Hamidieh is reported by special correspondents in Constantinople to be ready to go out and fight. It is still doubtful, however, whether the Ottoman military authorities will agree to allow of its use against the Greek fleet in spite of the reported intention of the Greeks to reinforce their forces at Xerxes Bay behind the Dardanelles. The move would seem to give the Turkish navy a chance for which Turkish naval officers profess to long. The report of the arrival of 500 Turkish officers and seven civilians, including Dr. Nazim Bey, the chief organizer of the committee of union and progress, by the Greek steamer "Sakizli" is telegraphed here by a special correspondent. The arrested men have been deported to Greece. The correspondent says this step by the Greeks was justified because the Turks violated the terms of capitulation by bringing arms and ammunitions to the island of Sakizli and got away in some cases by using fraudulently obtained passports.

The report of the recall of the Austrian Red Cross unit from Turkey is also declared to be unfounded. Athens, Nov. 28.—Seventeen Greek transports, escorted by a cruiser, left Salonika yesterday for Dedagach, carrying 12,000 Bulgarian troops.

TALKS ABOUT SUNDAY WORK IN THIS CITY

The Loading and Unloading of Steamers at Sand Point LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

Rev. Dr. Rochester, General Secretary, Speaks of Interview Here and of Further Investigation This Season—Sunday Trains on I. C. R. (Special to Times) Montreal, Nov. 28.—At the annual meeting of the Montreal branch of the Lord's Day Alliance in the vestry of the Presbyterian church last evening with Rev. J. L. Ditty in the chair, a comprehensive address was delivered by Rev. Dr. Rochester of Toronto, general secretary of the alliance in Canada. Referring to conditions in this province, he said the alliance had accomplished a good deal. "At Clipperton, Kinto, and several other places held by correspondence with the attorney-general, and by personal visitation, we have dealt with construction work, largely on the railway and in connection with public works of various kinds," he said. "We have not been successful in stopping all this work. I am going to pay 20¢ of them a visit tomorrow."

The biggest question has arisen in connection with the winter-port work in St. John," he continued. He told of the work of loading and unloading vessels at St. John during the winter season. "We could not advise legal action," he said, "but I am going to pay 20¢ of them a visit tomorrow."

THREE KILLED; OTHERS INJURED IN WRECK. Philadelphia, Nov. 28.—Three persons are reported to have been killed and more than two score were injured, some probably fatally, when the Cincinnati express on the Pennsylvania railroad, which left here at 10:48 o'clock last night, was derailed at Glen Loch, a little before midnight.

REBELS IN THE RANKS. El Paso, Texas, Nov. 28.—Juarez, the important border point threatened by insurgents, has found that rebels are enlisted among the few defenders of the town. A series of arrests was begun today which it is said will materially diminish the number of the local garrison.

ATTEN OUTS IN SIXTH; GOOD BYE TO THE RING. St. Louis, Nov. 28.—Alb Attel, former featherweight champion, confirms the announcement of his retirement from the ring, made after he had been badly out-pointed in a fight with Oliver Kirk of St. Louis, last night.

HALIFAX HOCKEY PLAYERS. Halifax, Nov. 28.—Secretary-treasurer Inmor of the M. P. H. A., manager of the Halifax Socials, returned last night from upper Canada, well pleased with the working agreement between the M. P. H. A. and the Nationals. Despatches were in order, he said, in the statement that the Toronto's would be allowed to sign any players they wished up to the opening of the season. The hitch with Toronto arose over five players, Doherty, George and Howard McNamara, Horace Gual and Walter Miller. These Toronto claimed as having signed this season, and the agreement provides that Toronto's teams and the maritime teams shall be played on equal footing as regards bidding for their services up to the opening of the season in the N. H. A. Walter Miller was relinquished to Toronto, as he had signed a contract with them in September as provided by the rules.

PARSONS AND BURNS MATCHED. Halifax, N. S., Nov. 28.—Billy Parsons and Kid Burns have signed for a return match on Tuesday night to decide the draw between them on Thursday last. The bout is to be 15 rounds for the lightweight championship of Eastern Canada.

FORMER POLICEMAN TO THE PENITENTIARY. Toronto, Nov. 28.—Ovid Latremouille, once champion athlete of the Toronto force, was yesterday sentenced to seven years in Kingston penitentiary by Chief Justice Sir William Mulock. The charge was robbery while carrying an offensive weapon.

MANY LIVES LOST IN TYPHOON. Islands in Philippines Swept by Great Storm—Town Destroyed, Steamers Wrecked, Much Damage Done. (Canadian Press) Manila, Nov. 28.—Many lives were lost during a severe typhoon which occurred today, causing immense damage to property. The storm was very violent, crossed the islands of Samar, Leyte and North Panay, leaving ruin in its path. The town of Tacloban, the capital of Leyte, was practically destroyed. Two steamers were wrecked in Tacloban harbor. How many persons were killed by falling houses, flying debris and by drowning is not known, but the loss of life is reported to have been great and the damage is estimated at several million pesos.

NEW RAILWAY MAIL CLERKS. A dozen additional railway mail clerks will be added to the service on this division on Monday and will be employed for a month to assist in the Christmas rush. Three appointed so far are George Hatfield, Amos Toole, Harry S. Day, Richard H. Evans, and John M. Barton of St. John, P. C. Taylor of Harvey Station and John F. Cummins of St. Stephen. Five more are to be appointed. Recent permanent appointees to the service include D. L. Monahan, Arthur McEllan and Kenneth Colwell of St. John, G. P. Praver of Grand Falls and A. T. Ganong of Apohaig.

J. H. Hyde to Lecture. Paris, Nov. 28.—James Hazen Hyde this winter will be a lecturer to fashionable audiences in the Theatre Michel. Hitherto he has been known chiefly for his fancy waist-coats, diletanteism in letters, as a gentle patron of art and literature, as an affecting violet bouquets and as encouraging the study of French language and literature in America.

POLICE COURT. Two prisoners, charged with drunkenness, were arraigned in the police court this morning and were fined \$4 or ten days in jail. John Campbell, who was arrested a few days on the charge of wandering about the street and not giving a satisfactory account of himself, was before court yesterday afternoon and was further remanded.

OFFICE STAFF AT CHAMCOOK ARE NOW IN POSSESSION

Expect to Be Putting up Products of Factory Early in December

(St. Andrews Beacon) The army of workmen at the new sardine town of Chamcook, are gradually bringing order out of the chaos of the last few months. The offices at the works have now been sufficiently completed to admit of the office staff entering into possession, which they did on Saturday last.

Miss Edna Fuller, Madge Rigby, Alice Leck and Jennie Marten, the young ladies who assist Secretary-treasurer Hayward in looking after the business end of the company's affairs, started out to their duties at Chamcook for the first time on Monday morning. They have had very comfortable home quarters provided them in the company's residence, and will remain there during the winter.

Managing director McCall told the Beacon that early in the coming month the work of putting up sardines, clams, and the other products which the factory will pack, will be begun. On Saturday, Mechanical Superintendent Kirwin, who has been one of the busiest men at the works, got the big elevator running. The company's hotel and offices and the street of the new town were also illuminated with electricity for the first time on Saturday last. A 200 h. p. Corliss engine, backed up with 3 1500 p. boilers provides the power for the dynamo and the other works.

The work of putting up samples of sardines, kippered herring, baked beans and brown bread, fish cakes, bouillon, etc., which has been carried on for a short time past under the supervision of Messrs. Tolis and Morris at the clam factory in town will be transferred to the Chamcook building next week.

Charles Haycock, the hustling secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Sardine Company, will soon occupy the Boyd cottage at Chamcook.

Mr. Boyd of the N. B. Telephone Company has been putting in a telephone exchange at the new sardine town at Chamcook lately. A beginning will be made with fifteen phones.

Daily Hints For the Cook

DELICIOUS NUT CAKE: Three eggs, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 cup butter, 2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 pound nuts, chopped, about 2 1/2 cups flour, juice of 2 oranges strained and mixed with the sugar. Flavor cake with vanilla. Bake in a sheet and frost with boiled frosting dotted with halves of walnut meats. LEMON SPONGE PIE: Mix 2 even tablepoons of flour with 1 cup of granulated sugar, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, then add 1/4 cup of lemon juice and 1 cup of boiling water with 1 even table spoon of butter melted in. Stir until smooth, then add the well-beaten yolks of 3 eggs. Beat all up well, then add the stiff whites. Line a deep pie plate with pastry and bake in a moderate oven until firm. When baked will look and be like sponge cake on top, and nice golden brown.

CONTROL OF PACIFIC Must Ultimately be in Hands of Canada, Australia and New Zealand

Wellington, N. Z., Nov. 28.—Premier Massey, speaking at Auckland, said New Zealand's annual contribution to the navy amounted to a quarter of a million pounds, inclusive of battleship payments, but if these payments were completed tomorrow, he said the annual contribution would not be decreased.

The overseas dominions should increase their contributions and the ultimate control of the Pacific must be in the hands of Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

LATEST FROM WAR Sofia, Nov. 28.—The Bulgarian and Turkish plenipotentiaries assembled at ten o'clock this morning to discuss further the terms of the proposed armistice.

A letter today from the front declares that there has not yet been any real assault by the Bulgarian besiegers of the fortress of Adrianople. The forts, it says, have been shelled and some of them captured by the allied Serbians and Bulgarians, who suffered heavy loss. On one occasion a Turkish fort was captured under the terms of the proposed armistice.

Belgrade, Serbia, Nov. 28.—The Serbian war office is continuing its military preparations on the Austrian frontier in readiness for possible eventualities. The government has received a denial of the report that the Serbian troops had occupied the port of Durazzo on the Adriatic Sea, according to the newspapers here.

THREE CORNERED FIGHT FOR EDMONTOU MAYORALTY

All Candidates in Favor of \$12,000,000 Expenditure in 1913—Tax is on Ground Values Only

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 28.—Edmonton is in the thick of a lively three-cornered mayoralty contest. The candidates are William Short, K. C., formerly mayor, who framed the present charter which gives the city the widest possible latitude for self-government; William J. Magrath, retired millionaire land owner, who favors extensive improvements under the slogan "Fair play and a square deal for everybody," and Alderman Joseph A. Clark, formerly secretary of the city, known among his friends as "the inaugurator of the council" and "watch dog of the treasury." Two thousand voters, of a total electorate of 17,000 are eligible to vote at the election on December 9.

The city streets have \$14,000,000 invested in its public utilities, which are owned and operated by the municipality. The three candidates are in favor of expending \$12,000,000 during the season of 1913. This will mean the most active building season in the history of the city and of western Canada. Edmonton derives its revenue from a tax on ground values only, the rate being twelve mills.

The Journal, a conservative newspaper, and the Bulletin, a liberal organ, owned by Hon. Frank Oliver, secretary of the interior under Sir Wilfrid Laurier, are supporting Mr. Clark, the Capital, liberal, in which Mr. Clark is said to be a stockholder, is pledged to Mr. Magrath, and Town Topics, a weekly chronicle of local events distributed free of charge, is boosting Mr. Clark's candidacy. The Mirror, edited by Gordon Edwards, and the French and German journals have not yet committed themselves editorially.

RAILWAY RECEIPTS AND EXPENSES FOR SEPTEMBER

The business of the railways for September while showing a considerable improvement over that of September, 1911, does not maintain the rate of increase set by the record-breaking month of August. The total net operating revenue of 90 per cent of the steam railways increased \$5,896,860 for September, while the increase for August was \$13,893,622. This increase in net operating revenue was at the rate of \$21 a mile of line for the month or at the rate of seventy cents a mile of line a day.

The total operating revenues per mile of line for the month increased \$5.15 per cent, the operating expenses 7.3 per cent and the net operating revenue 31 per cent.

The foregoing statistics are from the summary made by the Bureau of the Railways for the Interstate Commerce Commission. A special committee of the railways having headquarters in Chicago reports that bills now pending in the federal courts providing for an increase in the number of employees of the railways and for the rapid substitution of steel for wooden equipment will, if enacted, place the railways under an additional expense of approximately \$12,000,000 per annum for the former, and a total expense of \$32,746,000 for the latter supply. Without comparison, the railways in the course of three years have increased their steel equipment 250 per cent and their steel underframe equipment 250 per cent.

Mr. Cochrane replied that no arrangement had been made "as yet" but the Dominion Express Company were to be given the same rights as the Canadian Express Company, controlled by the Grand Trunk.

Mr. Emmerson asked to know if the C. P. R. would be compelled to give to other express companies on its maritime lines equal rights with the Dominion Express.

Mr. Cochrane replied that his first answer covered the ground.

The debate on the address was continued in the commons this afternoon with special reference again to the Macdonald by-election. The Hon. 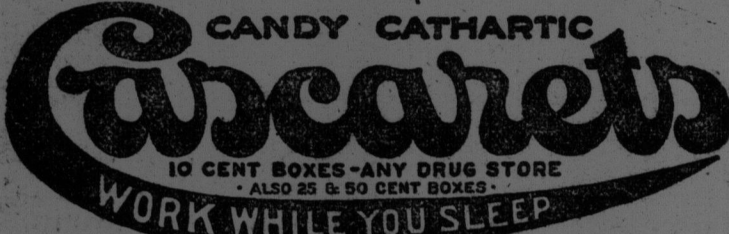

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NAVY IN THE SENATE

Borden's Election Has Delayed Granting of Aid for Year

SENATOR DANDURANO.

Lloyd George Quoted to Prove That There is no Emergency—Loughheed For One Fleet, One Army, One Exchequer

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—An important speech on Canada's present and future position in the British Empire was delivered in the senate today by Hon. Senator Loughheed, minister without portfolio and government leader in the upper house.

Senator Loughheed congratulated the opposition of parliament generally upon the election of Sir George Ross as opposition leader. With the present constitution of the senate, he occupied a place of special importance, for which his great ability and experience fitted him.

He said Canada was on the eve of prosperity which he believed Canadians generally were unable to appreciate. It was more appreciated by people from outside and the result was that the possibilities of wealth in Canada were being largely exploited by people from the United States.

Immigration was increasing so rapidly that within a few years immigration would be coming at 1,000,000 a year. What this meant was starting one hundred and forty thousand immigrants from the United States last year, bringing with them an average of \$1,000 each, or a total of \$140,000,000, which was ten times the authorized capital of the largest Canadian bank.

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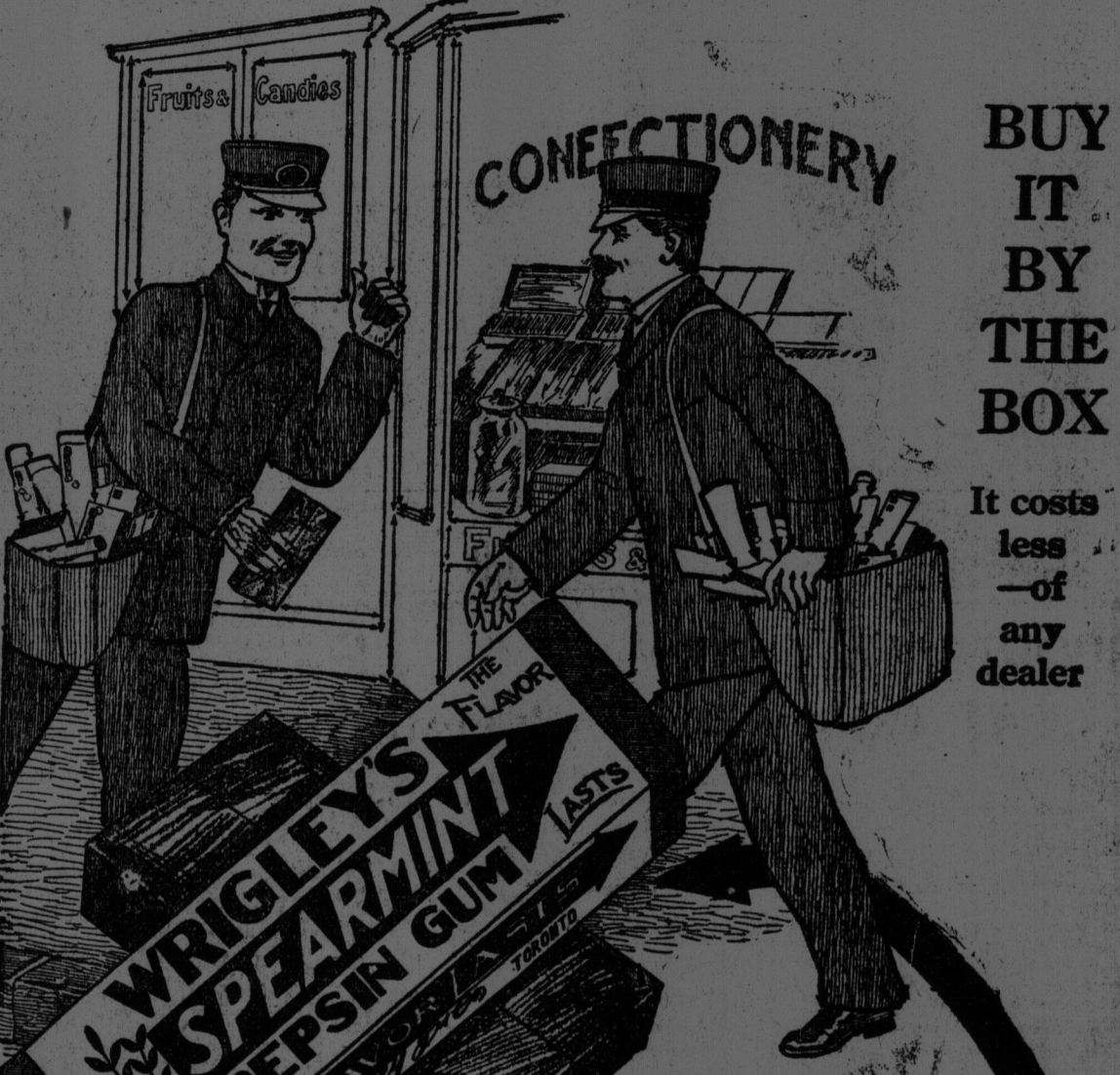

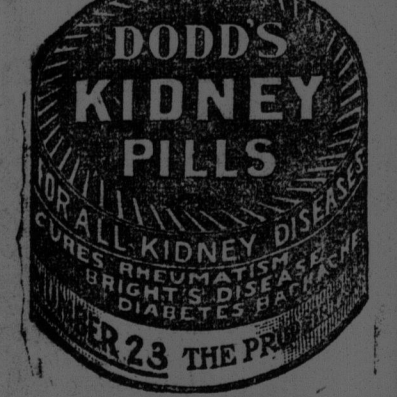

REFINERY TO BE OPERATING DURING 1914

D. Lorne McGibbon Gives Out Statement in Montreal - Plans Near Completion

A Montreal despatch to J. M. Robinson & Sons says: "Plans of the Atlantic Refineries, Ltd., the new sugar company in which D. Lorne McGibbon and other prominent Montreal financiers are interested, are fast nearing completion and a definite announcement of the details of the big project will be made in a few days."

"The new refinery, which would be erected in St. John, N. B., will be built at a cost of \$2,500,000 and will be one of the finest in existence. The capacity of the plant will be more than 2,500 barrels a day, and it will be built under the supervision of one of the best known sugar experts of America, who designed the large refineries of the Arbuckle, Warner and Havemeyer companies."

"The consumption of sugar in Canada per day," said Mr. McGibbon, "is approximately between 7,000 and 8,000 barrels, considerably of which is imported. This is growing rapidly each year, as no sugar refinery has been put up in the Dominion during the last twenty or twenty-five years, the outlook is most promising for our company."

Mr. McGibbon said that he expected the St. John plant would be ready for production in about a year and a half. Owing to the location of the refinery it would be possible to import the raw product from the West Indies, regardless of the season.

ANOTHER ST. JOHN GREEK TAKES BRIDE

Anthony Nektipoulos Sends Word That He Has Been Married in Athens

Another son of Greece who sailed from here to the defense of the motherland, has been married. It is about twelve years ago since Anthony Nektipoulos left the shores of his native land and came to America to seek his livelihood. When he did so he left behind him a pretty little maiden who welcomed him with a sweet heart's caress when he returned to his old home a few weeks ago, for she was soon to change her name of Katina P. Tziannes, to that of Mrs. Anthony Nektipoulos.

They were married and are now enjoying a honeymoon about Athens, where they both belong. A letter received yesterday by Anthony's cousin, Peter Chaggers, who is completing his fruit store at 20 Mill street, during his absence, told of the happy event. A wedding in Greece even in the troublous times of war, is a big celebration. Relatives and friends for miles around gather at the home where the ceremony is taking place and for a period of from two days to a week keep up the jollity. There is an abundance of good things to eat and drink and the wedding party make merry for days.
