




Former Rector of Stone Church Died in Toronto -Was Overseas Chaplain During Late War.

seasonal price adjustments in the case of a number of commodities, for the most part in a downward direction, have slightly outwelghed the rise in price of other commodities, with the result that our monthly index number of wholesale prices has fallen in the case of both imports and exports, the index of the former declining from 165.29 to 165.11, and that of the latter from 151.97 to 180.70. The number for imports and exports combined has fallen from 158.63 to 157.90.

There has been since January some improvement in the price of wheat, oats, corn, and of beef and wool. Refined sugar rose sharply, largely as a result of crop reports. These were offset, however, by declines in the prices of cattle, wool pulp, cotton, silver and copper. Nearly half the items usee in the computation of our number show no change in price.
