Leave Today For Hydro Hearing At Washington

FREDERICTON, April 2.—Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, chairman; Hon. J. E. Michand, member, and J. D. P. Levin, solicitor of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, are leaving tomorrow for Washington to attend the meeting of the International Joint

Waterways Commission which will be in session in Washington on April 7. They will appear on behalf of the New Brunswick application for permission to develop the Grand Falls hydro project.

It will be just as easy to disclose the governing facts now as it will be one week or six months hence. Dr. J. W. Robertson's suggestion that a "fact-finding" investigation is advisable has not yet been improved upon by anyone who has contributed to the discussion of the situation. His idea was that if an impartial tribunal were appointed to get at the facts and make them public a settlement would be possible, and while such a body was being selected and set to work, mining might be resumed pending the completion of the investigation. What it called "a fight to a finish," to which both sides appear more and more committed, is, after all, only a phrase. It must be established before a jury of public opinion what the conditions are under which coal can be and should be lifted in the publicly-owned Nova Scotia mines. Delay in resuming work and in having such conditions made known can result only in injury to the miners, to the operators and to the public interest. Public opinion demands just conditions, fair to all three parties, the miners, the operators and the people of Nova Scotia, who own the mines, and it demands that work be resumed. The mere defeat of one side or the other would result in no permanent settlement. What is wanted is the sort of settlement that will do justice to both sides; and both sides must be content with that.

THEY WANT COKE

If coking plants can be established in Saint John, Halifax, Quebec, Montreal and Toronto, as it is hoped they will be, the Maritime Province coal industry would enter upon a period of unexampled prosperity. The Toronto Star says in the course of an examination of the fuel situation. J. L. Landt, a fuel expert who has been conducting an inquiry for the Dominion Fuel Board, has expressed the view that "within the next few years the United States probably will not allow the exportation of anthracite." This sounds improbable, but no such threat is needed to convince Ontario, or any part of Canada, that we should be making a much greater use of Canadian coal, because it is desirable that we should not be so dependent upon a foreign source for fuel and also, what is even more important, because we should be keeping at home the vast amount of money we now pay for American coal.

The Star quotes Mr. Landt as most hopeful that the whole situation may be revolutionized by the establishment of coking plants which could convert Maritime soft coal into coke which could be substituted for American anthracite. In discussing the outlook for a coking industry, with plants in the Maritime Provinces, as well as in Quebec and Ontario, the Star says that Mr. Mackenzie King Government has hitherto data that warrants the taking of definite action in making Canada less dependent on fuel supplies from other nations. By encouraging the construction of coking plants and making it possible for Ontario and Quebec to use Nova Scotian and Alberta coal, it will promote a new national policy which will draw the provinces closer together and hasten the return of prosperity.

INCOME TAXES

This is the income tax season, and although diminution of the federal income tax is not now expected this year, the Citizens' Research Institute of Canada keeps plugging away at the need for revision. Under the direction of Dr. Horace Brittain the Institute continues to collect and analyze facts in regard to expenditure and taxes and to educate public opinion as to the need for rigid economy. Of late the Institute has been comparing the federal income tax in Canada with that in the United States, keeping in mind the fact that this country must always be in competition with its neighbor for population and for capital, and that therefore it is necessary that it should rid itself of every handicap which can be avoided. The population of this country, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, had increased by 3.1 per cent, at the end of 1924 as compared with 1922, yet during that period there was a decrease of 17.7 per cent. in the number of individuals paying income taxes and of 22.7 in the number of corporations paying such taxes. The greatest decrease was in individuals or corporations having incomes of \$30,000 or more.

The Institute quotes figures showing that the income tax payable by Canadians is far and away in excess of that paid by men of the same income in the United States, a fact to which President Beatty of the C. P. R. referred pointedly in an address he delivered a few days ago. In support of its contention that the tax should be diminished, the Bureau quotes President Coolidge, who said recently: "All experience shows that a larger amount of money can be collected from large incomes at a moderate rate than at a high rate. When the rate is too high large incomes disappear, leaving all the burden of taxes on the wage-earners and people of small means." The need for reduction applies to incomes of all sizes.

"The people of the Eastern Provinces," says the Manitoba Free Press, "can do much to help solve the most pressing of our western problems, and westerners in turn should give fair and unprejudiced attention to the problems of the East. While it is hardly true that East and West are mutually and equally interdependent in a business sense—because the West depends so largely on the export market—yet it is true that East and West can do a very great deal to help one another, and that co-operation and harmony are in every way to be desired."

CAT CAUSES \$40,000 FIRE. CARDIFF, Wales, April 3.—A cat chasing a mouse caused a \$40,000 fire here recently. While pursuing a mouse in a warehouse, the cat knocked over a box of matches from a table. It ignited when it fell on the floor.

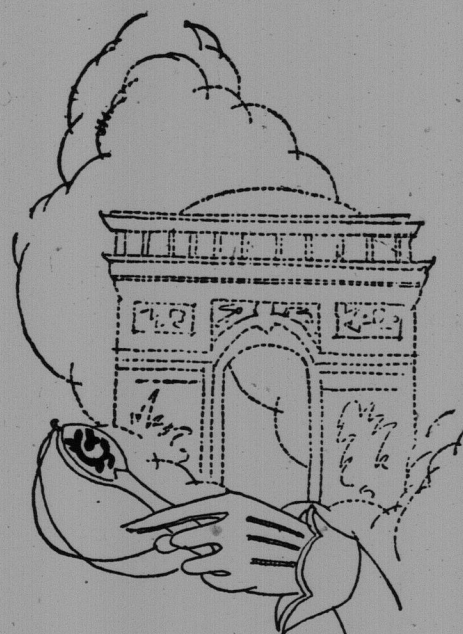

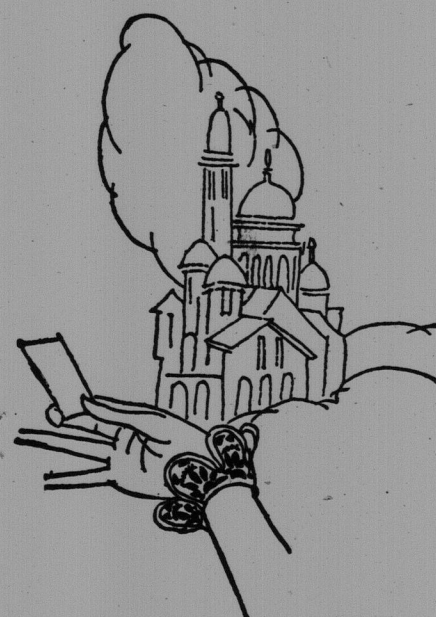

TELL LURID TALE OF HI-JACKING OFF N.Y.

SHIP AT HALIFAX BEARS MARKS OF BULLET BATTLE

Deckhouse Ordered Removed to Facilitate Removal of Liquor Cargo

RUM LOAD VALUED AT HUNDRED THOUSAND

Crew Overpowered and Driven Below Decks by Armed Pirates.

By Canadian Press.
HALIFAX, April 3.—With her deckhouse gone, bullet holes in the floor of the cabin, and her crew relating another lurid tale of hi-jacking off New York, the tern schooner Faustina owned by John Penny and Sons, of Newfoundland, engaged in the rum trade, arrived in port yesterday.

Several weeks ago the Faustina sailed from Halifax with a cargo of liquors valued at several hundred thousands of dollars, clearing. It was stated for "Nassau" or "Honduras."

Heavily Armed.

The story as told today by members of the crew was that nearly two weeks ago the Faustina, while off the New York run row awaiting customers, was boarded by the crew of a small boat which came alongside with such a speed that no identification marks could be secured. The newcomers, heavily armed, overpowered the run-runners crew, drove them below decks, sailed the craft 50 miles south and disposed of the cargo to a waiting vessel. To "steal" the transfer the pirates had Faustina's crew remove the deckhouse of their vessel.

Death Penalty Holds In British Army

LONDON, April 2.—British labor party fought unsuccessfully in House of Commons last night, to abolish the death penalty in British army, an amendment introduced by E. Thurtle, Labor member for Shorehitch, to annul army bill, being rejected by 329 votes to 158.

CANADA SOLD 258 CRAFT SINCE 1918

Some Brought \$1.25, Others Sold as High as Ten Thousand.

OTTAWA, April 2.—When L. H. Martel, member of Parliament for Hants, asked for a return showing how many boats had been sold since the armistice, with full particulars of the money involved, he started a list which today reached the House in a bulky file showing that 258 craft were sold. These comprise everything from an obsolete cruiser to a canoe. Some others brought as low as \$1.25. Even the Department of Health had sold one boat and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police two. The Department of Fisheries made the most of its turnover, because 127 of its 133 sales were of confiscated craft.

DOCTORS CROSS SWORDS OVER BUDGET DEBATE

Manion Declares Government's Fiscal Policy Used to Cover Deficits

HON. DR. KING DEFENDS WORK OF MINISTRY

Minister of Public Works Makes Sharp Retort to Opposition.

OTTAWA, April 3.—Doctors differed sharply in the House of Commons yesterday. For the Conservatives, Hon. Dr. Manion of Fort William continued attack on the budget; for the government, Hon. Dr. King, Minister of Public Works, spoke in defence. Dr. Manion declared that it looked as if the budget had been given to us to hide our deficits and that now the Dennistoun case was off the boards, he was going to keep the budget speech for light reading on dull days. He charged the government with having as many tariff policies as a centipede had feet. The only salvation for the country was to drive out the government bag and baggage.

King Replies.

Dr. King warmly returned that Conservatives had gold-bricked the people of Canada in 1911 but, having been once bitten, the people would now be twice shy. He charged that during their administration Conservatives had not made one effort to further industries for the refining of metals, while, under the bounty policy of the Liberal government, Canada was now competing in the world's markets.

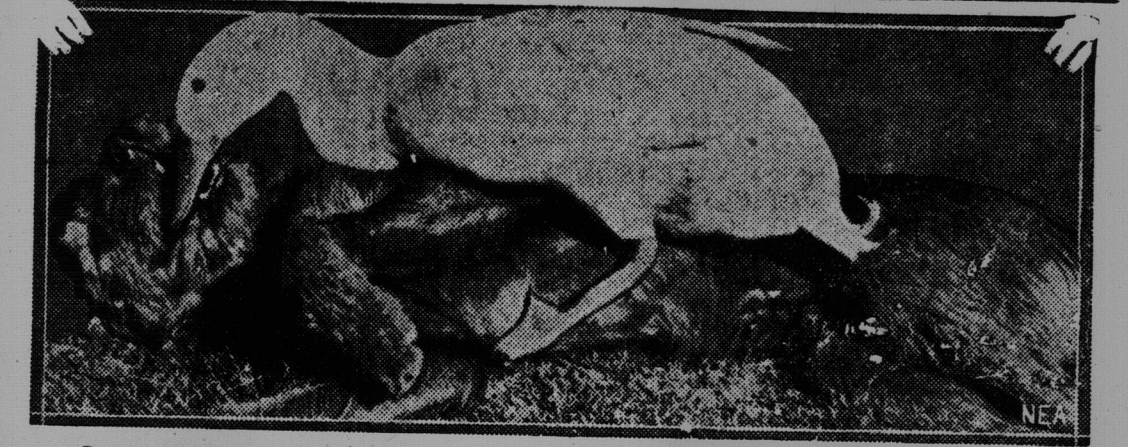

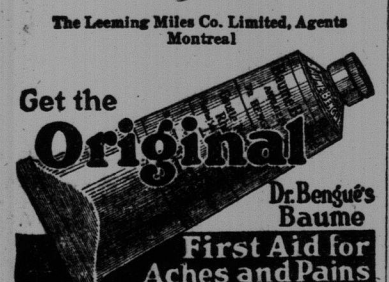

The former Premier said that there had been many difficulties in the way of the hydro development and he declared that certain monied interests had refused to develop the water powers and had also worked diligently to prevent the Government from going ahead with the work. The interests had at one time even penetrated into the executive council chamber to thwart the government in its efforts.

WILL QUIT LEGISLATURE

Hon. Dr. Foster in opening his address said he would not again seek a seat in the Legislature, but while he was discussing the hydro policy he mentioned that initial statement considerably.
"I will not be a candidate unless the Opposition propose to carry on their campaign of criticism of the Musquash development," said Hon. Dr. Foster. "If I see an effort is to be made to abolish and take away from the people what I have fought for in the matter of cheaper power then I will be a candidate and will be prepared to go on the hustings defending the hydro record of my own government and the government now led by Hon. Mr. Veniot. I can never sit idle and allow a policy which has meant so much to Saint John and to the people along the Kennebecasis valley, and saved so much money to the citizens of Saint John, to be attacked and thrown aside."

LEADER GIVEN DARE

In this connection Hon. Dr. Foster invited the leader of the opposition to go to Saint John and there meet him on the public platform making the same criticism of Musquash in that city as Mr. Richards had uttered in the House. Hon. Dr. Foster also declared that one of the opposition candidates in the forthcoming general elections would be Mayor E. L. Potts, of Saint John, and the former premier quoted from addresses of Mayor Potts to show that he was a great advocate of success of the Musquash development and would therefore be out of step with his leader on the hydro policy.

PAPERS PRAISED

Great praise was due The Telegraph-Journal and Times-Star newspapers, Dr. Foster said, for their campaign in placing the aims of the Maritime Provinces before the people of Canada. Dr. Foster claimed that a saving of \$294,328 had been made for the people of Saint John by the Musquash development while there were 11,000 satisfied customers today.

DORCHESTER HANGINGS

The Legislature, during the afternoon, adopted a resolution introduced by Hon. L. G. Hand urging that in the future all executions in the Maritime Provinces be carried out at Dorchester. This motion brought the first division of the House when the motion was carried 30 to 14.
The opposition to the resolution was led by F. L. Estabrooks, M. L. A., for Westmorland, who made a strong plea for the regulations concerning the death penalty remain as at present. Many

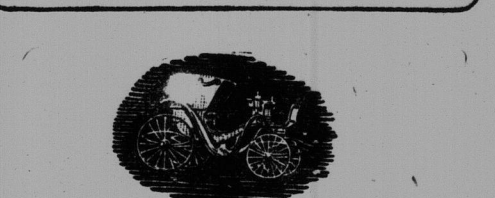

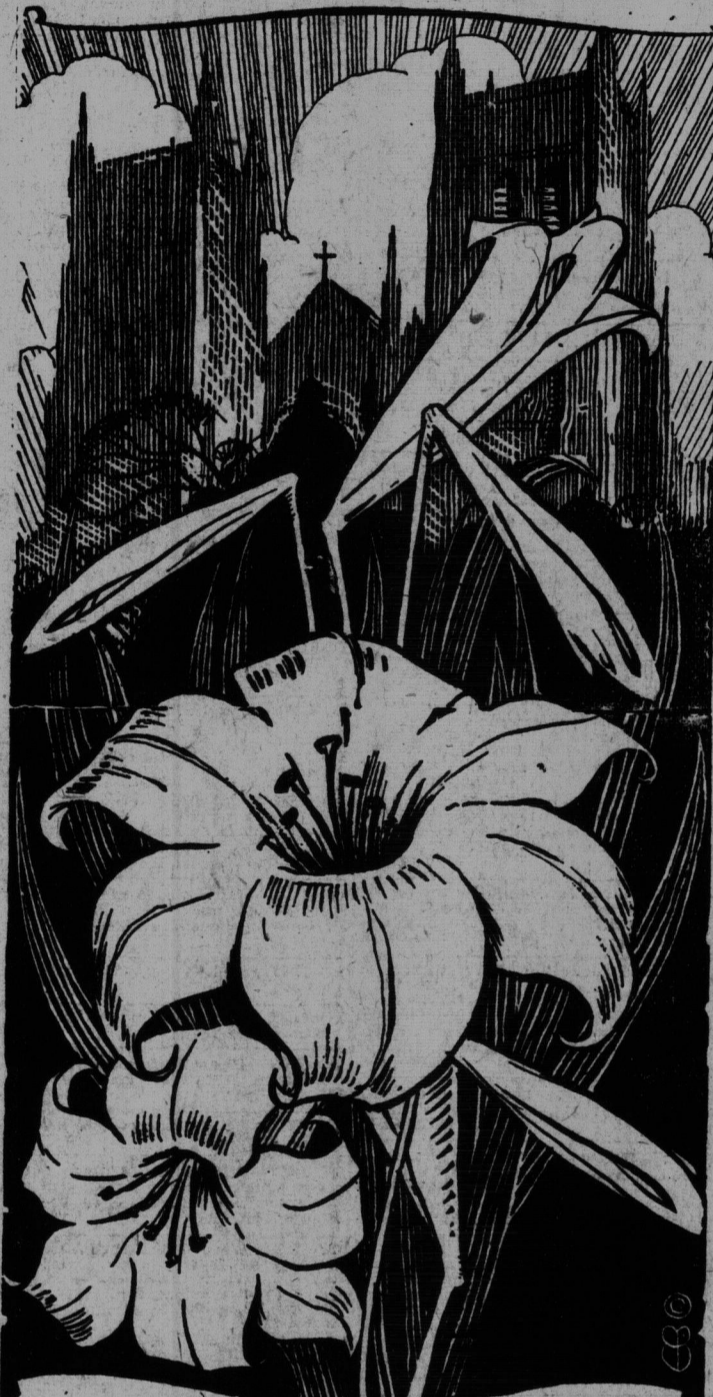

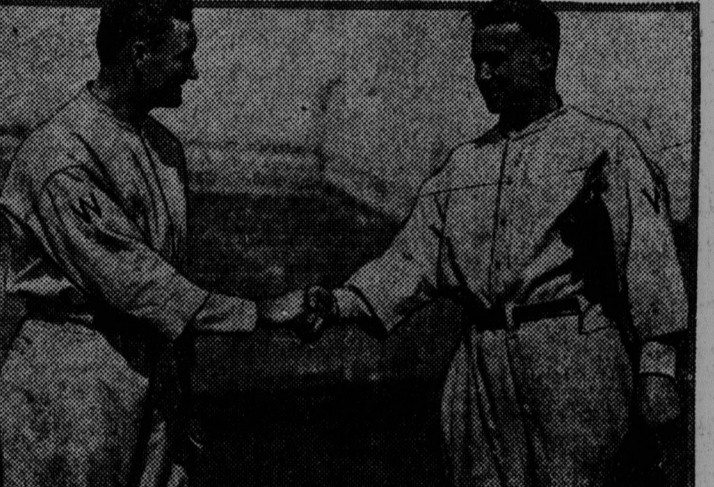
