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



REV. J. B. AVISON.

At the early age of eight years, his mother died, and he was adopted into the family of Robert Wilson, Esq., of Mono. In a revival service, conducted by the Rev. J. Roadhouse, he was awakened at sixteen years of age to see and feel that he was a poor lost sinner and needed Divine forgiveness. Mrs. Wilson, aided by the spirit of God, was enabled to help him into the way of peace, and was a mother to him until he passed from her care into the higher service in God's presence. Bro. Avison often said that Mrs. Wilson's Christlike life helped him to become a Christian. Her light shown in her family, and her example and teaching aided him greatly n his Christian career.

God called him to the work of the ministry at an early age. He heard the Divine call, and yielded promptly. Having been an exhorter, then a local preacher, he yearned for more extensive usefulness, and made known to Mr. and Mrs. Wilson his wish to enter the Christian ministry. years after his conversion he went to Cobourg college, and spent two years in close application in order to qualify himself for the great work of preach-

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call h lestial heave utmos was f come silent years him to Reach Circuit, where he labored for one year with acceptance and He spent 1876 on the Scarboro' Circuit, where he made many sincere friends, and was granted the privilege of leading souls to the Saviour. He was my colleague on Toronto Fourth Circuit during 1877, and laboured mostly in the King Street Church. Longing for increased ability for usefulness, he obtained the sanction of the conference of 1878 to attend the Toronto University for one year.

He returned to Scarboro in 1879, and spent the year in abundant abours, and with gratifying success. By the Conference of 1880 he was again appointed to Scarboro' Circuit, and to take charge of the Don Mills Church. Having finished his probation, he was ordained, and in the May of that year was married to Kate, eldest daughter of Mr. John Balmer, of Toronto, a young lady of intelligence and piety. The union was a very

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years reachointed happy one; but alas! so short. An insidious disease slowly undermined Bro. Avison's constitution, and by the direction of his medical adviser, last October he went to the Pacific coast, hoping that cessation from labor and the change of climate would restore his health, but he gradually sank, and it was painfully evident to those who loved him, that his race was nearly finished. On Christmas day, after returning from Church, he said, "Kate, this is the happiest, sweetest Christmas I have ever spent. I was never nearer to God, never had a brighter hope of heaven, never had such a sweet assurance that I am accepted through the merits of Jesus. It is a peaceful Christmas to me.

Deriving no benefit from his visit to the Pacific coast he returned to Toronto, remained a few days at Mr. Balmer's, and then proceeded to Squire Wilson's, in Mono, where his bright, beautiful life closed, cloudless

as a gorgeous sunset.

When he first intimated to Mrs. Avison his conviction that he would not recover, it was done with a smile, and he exclaimed, "Halleluia! I shall see the King! My all is on the altar -my wife, my child, my loved shall see the King! My all is on the anatomic God's care. One of the sweet-ones, I give them all up, and leave them in God's care. One of the sweet-est promises in God's Word, during my Christian life, has been 'the blood of Lens Christ God's Son. cleanseth us from all sin.' I feel it now. Tell of Jesus Christ, God's Son, cleanseth us from all sin.' my people," said he, with strong emphasis, "that the Gospel which I preached to them I find to be a grand reality now. I could preach now as I never did before !"

The day before his death he lay very quietly all day, and spoke but The suffering was nearly ended, and the light of the celestial world threw its rays over his pure spirit, and he enjoyed such communings

with the Unseen as "no tongue can speak."


Mrs. Avison leaned over him, and he said softly, with closed eyes, "The call has come!" Slowly he raised his right arm and beckoned to the celestial attendants, then lifted both arms earnestly, and looked up while a heavenly radiance lit up his face, and he said to his weeping wife, with the utmost tenderness, "I'll wait for you." The end had come. The race was finished. Once again he spoke. They were his last words, "Come! come! come! Lord Jesus!" The eye was sightless, and the lips were silent. He was not, for God took him. February 14th, 1882. Aged 29 years.

NEW RULES.

What shall be done to expedite the business of District Meeting and secure a more complete report of our Church Property?

1. The District and Building Committee shall \meet the day previous to district meeting to thoroughly examine the state of our Church property, to prepare and submit a full report to District meeting.

2. That a summary be prepared for publication in the conference minutes of the Church, the items being given which are now given in the district ummaries.

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In all cases when a station receives missionary money, whether called a Mission, Circuit Mission, or a Circuit, the amount shall be separately

given in the annual report.

4. That in future the term of a minister's stay on a station be three years, except in special cases, and then in order to have the term extended an application must be forwarded to Conference through district meeting, whose recommendation for such an extension will be necessary before being accepted by the Conference, and in no case shall a minister remain on a station or Conference appointment more than five years in succession.

5. That the Jubilee Fund and the Church Extension Fund be made into one, to be called the Church Extension Fund. The rules applying to each fund in the past shall apply to the amalgamated fund in the future, and that no grant shall be made from the amount of money subscribed for the jubilee fund, but it shall remain intact to be used only in making loans

to needy cases of church or parsonage building.

6.—Salaries of Ministers.

That the minimum salaries payable to our ordained married ministers shall be according to the following scale :-

20.—Recommendations.

1. METHODIST UNION.

That this Conference hereby admits the desirability, possibility, and feasibility of the unification of Methodism in this land, and that a Committee be appointed to meet and confer with any Committee appointed by other Methodist Churches to prepare a basis of union, and that the following brethren be that committee, viz: Rev. W. Bee, R. Boyle, H. Harris, J. Milner, J. C. Antliff, T. Griffith, Messrs. R. I. (Walker, M. M. Elliott, J. Green, E. Crompton, T. M. Edmondson, the President and Vice President as excellent manufacture. Vice President as ex-officio members. Rev. T. Griffith to be the Con-

2. That in case organic union of the Methodist Churches of this country is not effected, the Union Committee lay before each of the Conferences of the other Methodist denominations the desire of this Conference, that arrangements be made from time to time for amalgamating small societies in sparsely populated districts of the country, that there may be greater economy of money and labour.

21.—What changes are now made in relation to Church Property?

1. That Markham Circuit authorities have permission to sell their parsonage, for the purpose of securing one in a more central place, but the

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sale shall not take place until the whole case has been submitted to and the sanction of the Executive Committee has been obtained.

2. That the trustees of Salem Church, Etobicoke Circuit, have sanction to sell the church.

3. The Trustees of Woodstock church property shall have permission to sell 30 feet of land on the south side of the property.

4. That Thedford Station have sanction to sell the Church Property, viz.: the church and old parsonage at Widder, a better church and parsonage having been secured at Thedford.

5. That the McGillivray Station have sanction to sell the parsonage, when they have made arrangements to build in a more central part of the

6. That the trustees of Brant parsonage have sanction to sell their old parsonage, if they purchase a suitable one at Eden Grove a more central

7. That the trustees of Ripley church property have sanction to sell two building lots on condition that they purchase two others near the parson-

2. Votes thanks passed by the Conference.

Antliff, M.A., B.D. for his very appropriate Ordination Charge; to the Ministers of the several Evangelical Churches in Aurora for their courtesy and kindness in assisting to provide homes for the delegates, and also for their fraternal regard manifested during our sessions, to our own minister and the people of Aurora for their hospitality in entertaining the members of Conference, the reporters of the various papers, and the railway companies for kindly carrying the delegates at reduced rates.

3. That any business left unfinished be attended to by the General Committee.

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24.—Fraternal Greetings.

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1. That the Rev. R. Cade and T. Crompton reply to the letter of fraternal greeting from the Bible Christian Church, and inform them that the Revs. W. Bee and T. W. Jolliffe are appointed a deputation to convey to them our affectionate regards as Christian Brethren and co-workers in the Master's service.

2. That we have heard with pleasure the addresses of Revs. G. Abbs, G. Miller, and S. G. Stone, D. D., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and we hereby express our appreciation of the fraternal sentiments to which they have given expression, and we assure them that we entertain towards them and the Connexion of which they are such distinguished members, the highest Christian regard, and that Revs. R. Boyle, R. Cade, and the President be a deputation to visit their general Conference to be held in Hamilton, and convey our fraternal greetings.

3. That the Revs. J. C. Antliff, B.D., T. Griffith, and R. Walker, Esq., be a deputation to visit in our behalf the coming general Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada and convey our fraternal greetings to that body.

4. Letter to the English Primitive Methodist Conference.

The Primitive Methodist Conference in Canada, to the Primitive Methodist Conference or General Committee in England,

GREETING.

Dear Fathers and Brethren,—We would respectfully bring to your notice at this earliest opportunity the following resolution of the Conference now in session, on the question of Methodist Union.

That this Conference is prepared to admit the desirability and feasibility of a unification of Methodism in this Dominion.

This motion was passed by a large majority. For some years past we have felt the strong tendencies of religious events in this country, drawing as by an almost irresistible influence the scattered elements of Methodism together. The numerous branches of the Methodist Church found in thinly populated districts and the migratory habits of the people have rendered it impossible in many places for even the most efficient man to build up strong societies and have involved years of earnest toil for which very inadequate results have been obtained.

We would gladly have made any sacrifice of a financial character if we believed we were doing the best that could be done for God and could see good prospects of permanently establishing our denomination in this country.

Our love for the parent cause in England prompts us to say that we are not unmindful of the fact that much that is dear in our religious history we owe to Primitive Methodism, and that for many years we have ceived substantial help from your hands. No initiative has been taken yet in reference to a basis of union, but we have telt it our duty to subman the case to you first of all.

When a practicable basis can be found that would be honorable and acceptable to us as a people, we trust we shall have your counsel and acquiescence.

This whole matter has come upon us spontaneously without agitation. The pressure brought to bear upon us by the consideration given to this subject by other Methodist branches, the force of public sentiment influenced by the Ecumenical Council to some extent, and the fact that many of our quarterly meetings have sent Union Legislation strongly endorsed by several District Meetings have resulted in this issue.

With a solemn consciousness of the leading hand of God in this movement, we submit the matter to your affectionate consideration.

2. REPORT OF THE SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Dear Fathers and Brethren,—In these times of business activity, political excitement, love of recreation and general restlessness we would reaffirm our allegiance to the sacred observance of the Lord's Day as indispensable to the happiness of the individual and the well-being of the State.

We would strongly recommend all our people to abstain from business conversation, secular reading, and diversions of any kind that might interfere with the design and spirit of that day, which is holy unto the Lord. Let us gather, our households together in family devotion and attend together the services of the sanctuary as the most effectual security against Sabbath desecration. We would also advise the occasional preaching upon

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this subject, especially urging the divine claims, and the evils connected with their non-fulfilment. We would also urge that our people fall into line with all prudent measures to restrain the movements of military processions, railway trains, steam boats, street cars, and opening of places of entertainment on the Lord's day, as contrary to the sanctions of religion and subversive of the law of the land.

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3 SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

Your committee has carefully examined the annual reports of all the stations in our work in regard to the Sabbath Schools and beg to submit the following facts:—

We have 301 congregations in this country and 169 Sabbath Schools. There has been during the past year a decrease of five preaching places, but an increase of 4 Sabbath Schools. We are sorry to find that Stations but an increase of 4 Sabbath Schools. We are sorry to find that Stations with an aggregate of 22 Connexional Churches report no Sabbath Schools: viz. Brampton North, with two Connexional Churches; Rosemont with three Connexional Churches; Collingwood three Connexional Churches; Woodham with four Connexional Churches; Hawkesville five Connexional Churches; Grey with three, and Collins' Bay with two Connexional Churches. We also call special attention to the fact that the Montreal mission reports no Sabbath School, as we regard a Sabbath School as indispensable in the establishment of a vigorous church in any centre of population. While we have no doubt that the friends on the above named stations have been prevented by local difficulties from organizing connexional schools, we would earnestly and affectionately request that all possible efforts be put forth to establish a connexional school in connection with every congregation. We would further recommend that each district organize a Sabbath School Association whose meetings might be held in connection with our district meetings and the meetings of our ministerial Respectfully submitted. associations.

Your committee is deeply impressed with the importance of fostering an enlightened temperance sentiment among our people, realizing that one of the greatest obstacles to the progress of inward and outward holiness in the church is strong drink. We are of the opinion that with the knowledge possessed and available on this subject no official can indulge in the use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, with a clear conscience, for whatsoever is not of faith is sin.



We would suggest the adoption of the following-Ist. The formation of Bands of Hope in connection with all our societies, when that is at all practicable.

2. The teaching of a lesson on the subject of Temperance once each quarter, in all our Sabbath Schools.

3. The preaching of a temperance sermon in the pulpits of all our churches on the third Sunday in December of each year, announcement of which shall be made the first and second weeks previously in the Christian Journal. The announcement to be made by the Convener of this Committee.

4. We would urge upon our members the duty of putting forth all legitimate effort of vote and influence for the destruction of the drink traffic.

5. Your Committee is gratified to learn that a temperance text-book has been introduced into some of our public schools. We anticipate very beneficial results from its study, and earnestly desire its introduction into all our schools.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PRIMITIVE METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA.

DEAR BRETHREN IN THE LORD:-

"Grace be unto you and peace from God the Father and

the Lord Jesus Christ."

Another conferential year has closed, and the opportunity has returned for your representatives in Conference to address a few words to you based upon their knowledge of the church and its associations obtained through the position you have

assigned to them.

As a denomination we have some occasion for sorrow and We mourn the loss of departed worth yet much cause for joy. in the absence of last year's President, Rev. M. H. Matthews, also that of Bro. J. B. Avison, both of whom have gone to join the ranks of the redeemed in heaven during the past year. Some noble minded women too, who were indeed "helpers in the gospel," one of whom was the estimable wife of Rev. J. Smith, have passed on before, a little earlier than the rest of us, to the everlasting rest. Some of the men and women of our Israel, who in the years that are passed were very active workers, are becoming somewhat enfeebled by age, and some well remembered faces are missed from the Conference now. These changes, when we think of them, in some degree fill our minds with sadness, but there is another and a brighter view, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord," "The hoary head is a crown of glory if it be found in the way of righteousness." Many of the children too of the Primitive Methodist Church are saying like Israel in the days of Solomon, "The Lord our God be with us as he was with our fathers."

The year just passed has a good record. Many souls have been saved, and although by the tendency to migrate to the north-w far as 1 a greát Church also be Church and m North-v a Primi is likely ing its. territor

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north-west and elsewhere, our members are kept in check, so far as reporting largely increasing numbers is concerned, yet a great work in saving souls has been done under God by our Church during the past year. Substantial advancement has also been made in Church building and in the reduction of Church debts. Sabbath Schools have been much encouraged and many of the young have been won to Christ. In the North-west, in the Pheasant Valley, near the Qu-Appelle River, a Primitive Methodist Colony was opened this spring, which is likely to assist the denomination on this continent in retaining its members and pushing on its mission work in that vast territory.

Several special questions of great interest were before the Conference and received its careful attention. "The Bible in the Common Schools" "The proper observance of the Lord's Day." "Total abstinence from all intoxicating drinks as a beverage," and the importance of increased Sabbath School work and renewed Missionary self-denial and exertions.

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

But let us all be sure to ask the Lord to make us as the "children of Issachar, which were men that had understanding of the times," to know what Israel ought to do.





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
