

Boston, July 5—The climax of an eventful rowing regatta came late this afternoon when Edward Morely, an eighteenyear-old boy, rowing at No. 3 in the St. Alphonsus eight, of Roxbury, was drowned while clinging to a tow rope to which he had been attached by two boat-mates when they were forced to go after another comrade in danger of drowning, after their frail shell had capsized. At the same time the five other boats crews which had been contesting in the junior eightoared race, the last event of the New England Amateur Rowing Association's 23rd annual regatta, was also struggling in the water, two others beside that from the St. Alphonsus Association requiring assistance to prevent drowning, while the others did not swamp until crossing the finish line. In the excitement little interest was taken in the fact that Jeffries Point crew of Boston had won. The six crews which were in the race and which were flooded.

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


