LAKE MICHIGAN FROZEN OVER.

Great Inland Sea Covered from Shore to Shore - Mysterious Icebergs - A Record Winter

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Lake Michigan has at last frozen over, the cold spell of the last frozen over, the cold spell of the last frozen over, the cold spell of the last few days filling up the widely scattered spots of open water between the ice lost. In most winters there is a wide stretch of open water in mid-lake. At many points along the west shore the ice is piled up solid until it reaches from the bottom, forty feet deep, to an equal distance above the waterline. At the cribs the ice is piled up until it is higher than that structure. Icebergs are of great size and how they formed is regarded as a mystery by winter navigators, as the thickest chunks of ice they have seen are not over eighteen inches through. The Brothers Wright Succeed Where Langley Falled, in Driving an Airship That Is Not a Balloon.

To sall three miles through the air at a speed of eight miles an hour against a breeze blowing twenty-one miles an hour is the most notable achievement in flying-machine experiments. Three years ago two brothers named Wright, of Dayton, Ohlo, went-down among the sandhilis of the North Carolina care. ments. Propagation of the Succulent Bivalve Successfully Accomplished. Although many attempts have been made up to a very recent date it has been impossible to propagate oysters artificially, but within the last year Prof. Julius Nelson, biologist for the state bureau of shell fisheries of New

Jersey, has succeeded in preparing oyster germs or seed. If a female oyster be jabbed with a knife in the right way the knife point will be smeared with a milky looking substance, in which, by the aid of a

nicroscope, can be seen tiny eggs hav-

ing the general shape of minute oys-

If the same proceeding is gone through with for the male and the two fluids mixed in salt water, fertilization will occur in about ten minutes, and in about an hour the first development of the egg begins. After twenty-four hours the shells begin to come, and the oysters are in a fair way to grow up. At the first impregnation, although many male sperms adhere to one egg, it is shown by the microscope that if more than one enters the egg a monstrosity results which will not develop. The greatest difficulty at present is to keep the minute oyster fry from escaping from the sea water tank in which they are developed, but this problem is in a fair way of solution, and the day may not be far off when the oysterman can get his oyster seed in the earliest stages of its development and ready to "set" on the shells plant-




