A FATAL WRECK ON C. P. R. IN THE WEST

Several Other Passengers Injured—The Second Accident at the Same Place in a Very Few Days.



A FATAL ACCIEENT AT NEW STEEL BRIDGE

James Canney Instantly Killed by Falling Fifty Feet—His Body Badly

FREDERICTON, July 28.—Word was received in the city this morning of a fatal accident which occurred at Pokiok shortly after four o'clok yesterday afternoon, the victim being James Cannery, of this city, aged 38. Cannery was employed by the Canada Foundry in the erection of the new steel bridge across the St. John at Pokiok and while wheeling a truck he lost his balance and fell some 50 feet upon the rocks below. Death was instantaneous, the skull being fractured, and the breast being smashed by the fall. The remains were brought to the city this morning. The deceased was a son of the late William Cannery, of St. Mary's and was unmarried. He is survived by three sisters and two brothers the latter being John and William of this city.

TROOPS CALLED OUT IN BOMBAY TO QUELL RIOT

The Military Have Had to Fire on the Mob Repeatedly.

BOMBAY, July 27—Twenty thousand Indian mill hands went on strike here Friday morning out of sympathy with Tilak, the editor of a sedition spread-ing sheet, and who has been transporting sheet, and who has been transported for six years. As was expected, much rioting took place. In the afternoon the affair assumed more serious proportions, and unfortunately much loss of life occurred. It looks as if a crisis had been reached in the long brewing unrest which has threatened the peace of the country for some time.

NOT AIMING AT THE ISOLATION OF GERMANY

Foreign Secretary Grey Makes an Important Speech

Out of Which is Taken Much More Than He Said-Britain's Position Regarding Persia.

LONDON, July 28.—The Macedonian question was raised in the House of Commons last night. Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of Foreign Affairs, said that the situation had changed suddenly and greatly in the last few days, as Turkey herself was going to improve the whole government and the country to benefit Mussulmans and Christians alike. It was better, he said, that the Macedonia questionshould thus be settled by the Turks themselves than that partial reforms should be pressed upon reluctant and obstructive authorities. 'We ought for the present," added

the secretary, "to preserve an expect-ant and sympathetic attitude toward these changes."

He deprecated the idea of interven-

He deprecated the idea of intervention in Persia unless the Persian subjects became threatening.

Sir Edward took occasion to repudiate in warm terms the idea that Great Britain's policy was aimed at the isolation of Germany or that she had any reluctance to be on good terms with Germany. He said that while Great Britain must be free to make arrangements like those with Russial and France, in order to remove the causes of friction, such policy implied no enmity toward other powers.

The foreign secretary's reference to Germany, which was drawn out by a discreet speech by Sir Charles Dilke, was rather unexpected and was much canvassed afterwards in the lobbles, where it was regarded by many as intended to counteract the bad impression likely to be produced in Germany by Lord Cromer's speech in the House last Monday when he declared that it was the first duty of the government to prepare for the European conflict, which probably would be forced upon Great Britain before many years.

The inference also was drawn that the government was desirous of arriving at an understanding with Germany similar to that already reached with France and Russia.

HOLLAND WILL NOT USE ANY VIOLENCE

Trouble With Venezuela Has Not Yet

THE HAGUE, July 28.—The talk of a bombardment by Holland of any Veneuelan port or ports or even a naval demonstration in Venezuelan waters as a result of the difficulties between the Netherlands and the government of President Castro, was today characterized in official circles as premature. The rupture between the Netherlands and Venezuela, it was explained, was up to the present time, diplomatic only.

CAPT. S. MUSGRAVE HAS BEEN EXPLORING

He Studied the Flora and the Fauna in the Interior.

WILDS OF COLOMBIA

NEW YORK, July 27—Captain S. Musgrave, of the Eritish army, was one of the passengers to arrive aboard the Royal Mail steam packet Atrato from the United States of Colombia. Gaptain Musgrave has been on a twenty months' exploring expedition down in the United States of Colombia, where he rode over a thousand miles in the interior from Bogota, the apital to the source of the river Orinoco. Captain Musgrave, who was in charge of Lord Roberts' armored train in the Boer war, has brought from Colombia several specimens of animal life. He has been doing zoological research work, and he is returning to England with an ant-eater alive, known as tamendua. He has one of the finest and most valuable collections of butterflies in the world, which he got at Mosa, where the government


