

MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT BY COMMISSION.

These specific provisions for publicity have created a general spirit that demands the bringing of everything in connection with the city government out into the open. Campaigns are conducted practically altogether in open meetings, bundreds of which occur in every city election; and every meeting of the city council is mit utely reported in the daily newspapers. The result is that public opinion, well informed and intelligent, moulds that action of the city council.

The power of this public opinion is rendered still more effective by provisions for an essential part of the Des Moines plan—the Initiative, the Referendum, and the Recail.

Having thus provided for intelligent, active and effective by public opinion, making the city government responsible to the people for its every act, the next thing to importance, indeed the great object, is to give the means of efficient administration. It is therefore in vested with every power incident to city government legislative, executive and judicial—so that there can be no excuse for inefficiency.




