

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

After a long discussion the bill to amend the School Act was passed.

The Secretary commended the bill; Mr. Burns in the chair, to extend the provisions of the School Act to the line of railway from Richmond to Kingston, provided that has should be built in preference to that proposed by the bill and under contract.

It also provides that \$30,000 be expended on any road under the Act the company shall be entitled to receive \$8,000.

THE DEBATE OF THE DAY being moved, the House went into committee on supplementary estimates; Mr. Keane in the chair.

After a long and sometimes exciting discussion, they were agreed to as follows:

To cover excess of expenditure for the year ending 31st October, 1874, \$40,468; to cover excess of expenditure for the year ending 31st October, 1874, \$6,944.41; towards the consolidation and revision of the statutes, \$3,000; to meet expenses of printing the revised statutes, \$2,000; addition to the salary of the Deputy Provincial Secretary, \$500; addition to the salary of the Chief Draughtsman, Crown Land Office, \$500; additional pay for steam services, \$500; additional pay for a Judge's Chamber in St. John, \$150; in aid of an exhibition to be held by the Manufacturers and Mechanics' Association, \$1,000; to meet expenditure in aid of the civil power in connection with recent disturbances in the County of Gloucester, \$10,000; to pay for reporting the debates of the House during the present session, \$1,500.

The usual supply bills were passed.

The House is to be prorogued at 12 to-morrow.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Frederickton, April 9.

The Bill to establish a police force and lock-up at Carleton was committed; Hon. Mr. Seely in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Young explained the necessity there was for the bill, owing to the late disturbances at Carleton. It authorizes permissively the appointment of a police magistrate and the formation of a police force of three or four men, whose services may be called for if necessary, and dispensed with when not necessary; and it establishes a lock-up; the amount to be raised not to exceed \$500, to be assessed on five parishes. The police magistrate is not to be paid by salary, but by the fees he may collect.

Hon. Mr. Haslington thought no harm could accrue and no interest would suffer if the bill was allowed to stand over until the next meeting of the Legislature.

After a few remarks from Hon. Messrs. Seely and Young, the bill passed without discussion.

The bill to amend the Act relating to Kent railway passed.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

(Special Telegram to the Tribune.)

FREDERICTON, April 10.

The Surveyor General this morning announced that the Government, having considered the matter of equalization of the stumpage chargeable under the timber regulations have come to the conclusion to fix the rate on spruce and pine saw logs at 60 cents per M. for the whole Province and that the stumpage on bark and unseasoned lumber shall be 10 cents, instead of 15 cents, as prescribed by the regulations. Further, that on the licenses being renewed on the 1st July next no increase on these rates will be made.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

FREDERICTON, April 10.

A bill to provide for the repairs of roads, bridges and other public purposes read and passed.

A bill to provide for the defraying of certain expenses of the Civil Government read and passed.

The Salary Grant Bill, Legislature Proposed.

The House was prorogued to-day. At half-past twelve the Governor and Aldermen were met in the Council Chamber by the Speaker and members of the House, and His Honor assented to 150 bills passed during the session.

In the speech, His Honor in relieving the members from further attendance, expressed himself gratified by the diligence with which the business of the country had been carried on. He referred to the act relating to rates and taxes, which he had just established, and more justly of taxation, &c. Also to the amendment to the Attachment Act of which he approved. He trusted that beneficial effects would result from the changes in the management of our agricultural interests. The act relating to Crown Lands and stumpage would apply a want. Reference was made to extension of Joint Stock Company Act, the Act protecting property of drunks and, to that from the establishment of Reformatories, which His Honor deemed a measure of great moment.

His Honor says that "No subject of greater moment could have engaged your attention; the want of such institutions has been, from time to time, referred to by Her Majesty's Judges in the course of their administration of the criminal law. His Honor wishes to express his regret that their proper management and control has been delayed the passage of such an act, but you have at length wisely determined on the establishment of such institutions upon a public basis, and from your own actions I anticipate the best result.

After thanking the House for their liberal provision for public service, His Honor, with the usual compliments, prorogued the House until the 15th inst.
