

Report of Kirk-Session.

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It is well known that a great deal of the work of a Session cannot be tabulated. It is mainly spiritual in its character, and can be grasped only in its tangible results, yet if the Spirit of God has been indeed in our midst during the past year, manifest tokens of His presence should be seen in the life and work of the congregation. These tokens, we gratefully record, are not wanting. While we have not, as a Church, been blessed with a special outpouring of God's Spirit, His power has been working through the regular channels of His grace. Some of these tokens may be briefly enumerated. Our Communion roll has lengthened by the addition of those who have openly confessed Christ for the first time; the Sabbath School is growing stronger in numbers and in grace, as is evidenced by the scholars who have made a profession of faith in Christ; the Ladies' Aid Society is continuing its good work ; the Mission Band has been revivified and is redoubling its energy in the direction of charitable and missionary plans; the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor receiving a strong inspiration from the Convention advances in zealous labors in many directions. The Session records its interest in, and indebtedness to, each and all of these agencies, and wishes them God-speed, as auxiliaries in furthering the cause of Christ.

Deeply grateful for all God has wrought in our midst during the past year, the Session would earnestly urge upon all members a more regular attendance, not only at Communion Seasons but also at the ordinary services of the Church. While we have no doubt that when we measure ourselves by other Churches we have no reason to murmur concerning the attendance on Church ordinances; still such comparisons are not wise. Our aim should be, to be loyal to our Lord and Master and conscientiously consider His claims apon our time and presence at the Sabbath services and the Wednesday evening prayer-meeting. In respect to the latter, encouraging as it is in numbers on our Church roll. May this fact be well considered by all who could, if they would, attend this hour of prayer with little or no inconvenience.

We feel too, that the Sabbath School workers might be greatly cheered in their work by the presence of the parents at occasional session s of the School. If you cannot come during the whole hour,

With deep sorrow we record the death of two of our earnest workers, who were specially active as members of the Ladies' Aid Society, Mrs. Douglas Rutherford and Mrs. W. C. Jarvis. May God comfort and soothe the hearts in the homes from which they have been taken.

We close our report by calling special attention to the united effort about to be made by the Churches of our city under the leadership of the Rev. B. Fay Mills. We would earnestly urge upon the congregation the necessity of so arranging their business, social, and home duties, so as to keep themselves as free as possible to go hand and heart into this great work, constantly waiting upon God for His presence and power. For, as Mr. Mills truly says : "The Church and Pastor will receive the greatest benefit who are best prepared spiritually for the work, and ready to make the greatest sacrifices for its success."

May we suggest as our motto for 1894, the prayer, "Lord increase our faith."

It was moved, that for the ensuing year the names of contributors with the amount of their contributions be published in the annual report. An amendment was proposed to the effect that before proceeding to do so, information be obtained as to the practice in other Churches. On a vote being taken, the amendment was lost and the main motion carried.

The offices-bearers for 1894 were then elected.

Votes of thanks were awarded to the Choir and to the Board of Managers for the efficient manner in which they had discharged their duties during the year.

EIGHTH ANNUAL Beport of the Board of Managers.

To the Members and Adherents :---

Your Managers herewith present their report of the temporal affairs of the Church for the past year. You will find, in detail, in the Treasurer's statement—now in your hands,—a summary of all moneys received and expended during the year, and also a record of the Church's financial position to date.

In response to an appeal which the Board made in January last, they were enabled (with the balance carried over from 1892) to pay off one thousand dollars of the Church debt ; and from an estimate then made, they were encouraged to notify the mortgagee that they would be p December, support of and as a co to discount your permis the sum of motion, as i debt is now of interest e The Ma

nuary last, (2) to pay n estimate that they would be prepared to pay another thousand dollars on the 31st December, 1893. Their expectations as to income, (based on the support of increased numbers in the Church) were not fully realized, and as a consequence (in order not to break faith) they were obliged to discount the future to the extent of \$227.95, and also to anticipate your permission to transfer from Ordinary revenue to Building fund the sum of \$200.00, which action they now ask you to ratify by motion, as in the past. By the payment of this \$2000.00 the Church debt is now reduced to \$3000.00, and a saving of \$100.00 per annum of interest effected.

The Managers would request that permission be granted by the congregation to the Board of 1894, to expend whatever money may be necessary for repairs during the year.

To those who have lately thrown in their lot with us, or who may propose doing so, we would not appear as either needy or importunate—as happily we are neither—but would ask them, in conjunction with those who have so liberally and loyally supported the Church from its inception, to give their hearty encouragement to the work of the Managers for 1894.

It would be superfluous to recapitulate here, the items as given on the Treasurer's statement, but we commend them to your careful consideration. We would, however, here note the fact, that an esteemed member of the Church has donated the sum of \$200.00 as the nucleus of a fund for a new church building.

The Managers consider that they are justified in recommending an increase of \$100.00 per annum to the Pastor's stipend,—and would tender their thanks to the Pastor, Kirk-session, and the various organizations of the Church, for their co-operation during the past year.

THE SCHEMES OF OUR CHURCH.

The imperative obligation of Christ's Church to send the Gospel to the destitute at home and abroad, rests on our Lord's own specific word. It is not a question of the "Church may," but of "she ought," and "she shall," if true to the Spirit of Christ dwelling within her, and what is true of the Church is true of every member.

For the practical guidance and information of the congregation, the various Schemes of our Church are herewith set forth with brief notes :---

I. Home Missions .- For convenience, these Missions are divided into two sections, Eastern and Western, the latter including all Home Mission fields between Quebec Province and British Columbia; the former, the fields in the Maritime Provinces. Our section is the Western. The work of these Missions is to supply the ordinances of religion to our brethren in thinly settled and destitute regions, that without our help would be left without them. Last year 342 fields containing 990 preaching stations, with an average Sabbath attendance of 35,171, were supplied with ordinances. Most of these settlers are very poor, yet out of their deep poverty, they, last year, contributed \$63,553, besides building churches and manses. It is estimated that \$68,000 will be required for this work this year.

II. Augmentation Fund.—This is a branch of Home Missions. The object of the fund is to assist weak congregations so that they may be able to support a regular pastor all the year round. An important safeguard to this fund, and that also acts as a stimulus to liberality, is that assistance is given only on condition that each communicant gives at least \$4.50 per annum. The scheme is a recent one, being only in operation since 1883, yet so well has it worked that 220 congregations have become self-supporting. The estimate for this year is \$31,000.

III. Foreign Missions.—These Missions are carried on among the Indians of the North-West and British Columbia; in Trinidad; in the New Hebrides; in Formosa, China; in Honan, China; in Central India; among the Chinese in British Columbia; and the Jews in Palestine. While prosecuting vigorously her great Home Mission work, our Church has kept well before her the last commission of our Lord, "Go ye into *all* the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." The estimates for this year are \$115,000.

IV. French Evangelization.—The work of this Board should be very near to the hearts of the Churches of this Province. It is Home Mission work carried on in our midst among our French Catholic fellow-subjects by several agencies, such as colportage, mission schools, and a regular ministry. Last year 89 laborers were employed, and \$56,000 are needed for the work this year.

V. The Colleges.—The importance of this work cannot be over-stated. The Presbyterian Church has always believed in having an educated ministry, and therefore has stood well by her Colleges. This historic position should not be receded from. But as a matter of fact, our Colleges at present are poorly sustained. They deserve larger and better support. For Montreal, Queen's, and Knox, the three Colleges that concern us as a Church in the west, the sum of \$14,500 is asked for this year.

VI. Manitoba College.—This College started a few years ago, to meet the growing demands of our Home Mission work, is set apart fo was held during t tical syn

few years ork, is set apart for special aid. Last year a very successful summer session was held, with a view of leaving students free to supply needy fields during the winter. Its claims are pressing, and worthy of our practical sympathy.

VII. Widows' and Orphans' Fund,—There are between 80 and 90 widows dependent on this Fund, receiving the small allowance of \$150 a year. The number of needy ones and the small annuity are sufficient surely to open our hearts towards this Fund.

VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.—Dependent on this Fund are about 80 aged Ministers, who receive \$225 as an annuity. An effort is being made to put this Fund on a better footing. It would be a shame to assume that a fund such as this and the one above, should require to be pressed upon our liberality. They are such as every Christian heart cheerfully responds to.

IX. The Assembly Fund.—This is a small Fund to meet the expenses of printing and distributing the minutes of the General Assembly, and to assist the work of several important committees that have no funds of their own available.

All these Schemes are worthy of our heartiest support. There is not one of them superfluous or unnecessary. They all touch the very heart-life of our Church, and are controlled and directed generally by an equal number of laymen and ministers of known ability and experience. Let each of us lay well to heart and conscience our bounden duty towards these Schemes. The last two years shew a decrease in our missionary givings, and this in the face of an increased membership. We must sow bountifully if we are to reap bountifully. "Freely ve have received, freely give."

EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT Melville Church Ladies' Aid Soriety.

The Ladies' Aid Society have pleasure in presenting their eighth Annual Report of work done, during the year 1893.

This Society at its first meeting of the year, decided to continue the work of clothing three inmates of the Mackay Institute, besides which they have made up and sold a number of articles, and cheerfully given their services whenever required.

The ladies of the congregation who were unable to attend the usual meetings have by their liberal contributions assisted very materially.

It is with deep regret we record the "passing away" of two of our most energetic workers, Mrs. Rutherford and Mrs. Jarvis. But we feel that our loss is their gain.

We look forward to another year blessed by God as in past times.

It was felt that our offerings for missionary purposes were not increasing in proportion to our growth as a school; in order therefore to promote a more earnest interest in missions amongst our scholars, we have set apart the first Sabbath of each month, when a short talk is given to our pupils by one of the teachers, or some competent person, giving information in regard to one or other of the missions to which we subscribe.

LIBRARY.—We were extremely fortunate during the past year, in obtaining additions to the library fund.

Our Superintendent gave us a most interesting and profitable lime-light exhibition of views taken from "The World's Fair," which was largely attended, the proceds from which amounted to \$52.85. This with an additional contribution of \$20.00 from two of our young scholars, Masters Brenton and Howard Archibald, to whom we desire to express our heartfelt thanks, will enable us to place before the members of our School many new and delightful books.

The library at present numbers 1015 volumes.

MISSION BAND.—The Mission Band has sprung into renewed life and activity under the directorship of Miss Kerr and several very able helpers. The attendance at their meeting on Friday afternoons is very good, and it is an interesting sight to watch the little ones dressing dolls for the children in the hospitals, or making little garments for their less favored brothers and sisters in the "Great Lone Land."

PICNIC.—Our annual picnic was a grand success financially as well as otherwise. An exceptionally fine day, the happy family groups, the smiling faces of the little ones that spread sunshine everywhere, the boating, the driving, as well as various other amusements, all contributed to make the day at Ste. Rose one long to be remembered in the annals of our Sunday School.

We are pleased to note that several of our pupils have taken a stand for Christ and have identified themselves with the Church. Although we are not always permitted to see how far our work has been successful, yet it is always encouraging when we *are* privileged to see the fruit of our labours.

It is with deep sorrow that we record the death of two members of our Sabbath School. One of our teachers, Miss Tillie Smith, was during the summer called upon to lay down the cross and receive the crown. Her presence is sadly missed. Lorne Nelson, one of our young scholars, was also called to the Home above.

We look to the future with hopeful hearts, seeking God's aid and blessing in our work.

Report of Melville Church Mission Band.

The first meeting of the Band for 1893-94, was held in the church parlor on Friday, November 10th, there being present 32 children. The following were elected officers for 1894.

The membership fee was reduced from twenty-five cents to ten cents. It was decided to continue the work of last year, namely: the clothing of a Child at the Mackay Institute, and the support of a Cot in the General Hospital. Also to make up a box to be sent to the North-West, which will be ready in the spring. Extra work was taken up at Christmas time, when gifts were made and distributed among the poor children in the city.
