BIRDPOOR, Conn., Dec. 27.—Captain Hunter and two other members of the Salvation Army were arrested this afternoon, charged with violating the city ordinance by parading the streets last evening. They would each their own secretary, and were elected themselves by the officers of the County Societies for the term of three years, so the Board might have more independence. Carried unanimously.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 29. Mr. Fairweather—the report of the committee appointed to investigate monthly the business and status of the Stock Farm, which was adopted.

There was some discussion relative to the St. Leonard's Society and it was urged that no grant be allowed, the Society having failed to forward its accounts. It was finally moved by Mr. Anderson and seconded by Mr. Swin, that the board should authorize the secretary to allow the grant to St. Leonard's Society if its accounts be sent in and satisfactory before February 1st, 1884. Carried.

At the afternoon session, the secretary said there had been some disparaging remarks in the press about the herd books, which had been published down to 1881, that he would not again publish one without an order of the Board. He observed that the Province might see as well give up breeding pure blood stock, but he was publishing herd books, but if some of the remarks in the newspapers were an evidence of public opinion the only conclusion was that the people did not want the books.

The Board decided to have the herd books published as usual. "One of the objections of the Press is that the space occupied by the information is much greater than necessary. Practical printers are aware that the same information could be given in less space, which means a saving."—Eds. Advocate.

Mr. Reid proposed the publication of the Board's proceedings in French, but a contrary vote was taken by Messrs. Brown, Fairweather, Swin, the President and others, resulting in a resolution being passed to pursue the same course as last year.

A resolution was passed by the Board reaffirming the desirability of procuring correct statistics from the

Board of Agriculture. (Continued from last week.)

FREDERICTON, Dec. 28. The full board met at 10 o'clock. Mr. Reid moved the following resolutions for discussion:

Whereas, The law allowing the principal division of agricultural grants of \$500 for each county into four divisions having had a long trial without any good results, and in the opinion of the board, is discontinued and a law to advance united effort is placed in force.

Therefore resolved, That this Board request the Executive Government to bring before the Legislature at next session an act to embody each County in the Province into one society to be called the County Agricultural Society.

Whereas, The law creating this Board of Agriculture having been in force for some time has been found to be in many particulars to be a leading body to advance the country as a whole, and to be the best means of giving the agricultural interest its due influence.

Therefore resolved, That the Executive Government be requested to make the matter in hand and bring before the Legislature a law to give the agricultural interest its due influence.

Whereas, The Stock Farm, so called, was neither well conceived nor well treated to meet the requirements that a stock farm should be, and in the opinion of the board, it is a waste of money to maintain it without any equivalent return.

Therefore resolved, That the Executive Government be requested by this Board to take such action upon so profitable an expenditure, or make such other provision as may be deemed proper.

The afternoon was devoted to committee work. President McLean explained that he was not an advocate of the sale of the Stock Farm.

In the evening Mr. Reid's second resolution was taken up, and Mr. Reid spoke in support thereof at some length. He revived the past history of Government allowances to Agricultural Societies and their formation, giving it as his opinion that the agricultural interests of the country can be as well subserved by the Government as by the Board of Agriculture. He believed that annual Provincial Exhibitions might be made a success and a source of income to the country.

Mr. Anderson regarded the resolution as one of want of confidence in the board. From Mr. Reid's remarks it would be inferred that there had been a retrograde movement in the agricultural interests of the country. This he failed to see. As one member of the Board, he was not satisfied with the constitution of the Board and the farmers of the county, were of the same opinion. Their powers were too cramped and restricted to carry out their own resolutions, and they could only recommend to the Government, which alone had the power to act. The Board had recommended the purchase of a Stock Farm. It had been run two years and he was sorry to say the returns were not satisfactory. He did not know who managed that farm, but he expected it would be run by the members of the Board, and in his opinion, were the proper parties. He further defended the actions of the Board in the past.

Mr. Fairweather held that the farming interests had a right to ask the Government for a Board of Agriculture. It had been established, but had not accomplished what it ought, and it was because it was too much fettered by the Government. He, with other members, was of opinion that the Board should appoint its own secretary.

Mr. Brown could defend the action of the Board beyond censure. He agreed with Mr. Anderson in saying that the Board could not, under its present organization, meet the expectations of the farmers. They should elect their own secretary, and be elected themselves by the members of the County Societies for the term of three years, so the Board might have more independence. He also advocated one representative for each county.

Mr. Swin expressed himself as favoring the vote expressed by the last speaker. several agricultural societies, through their secretaries, and referring such officers to regulation page 44, agricultural report of 1880.

There was a long and animated discussion on Mr. Reid's third resolution with reference to the Stock Farm. Messrs. Colwell and Anderson declared themselves in favor of a stock farm and thought there never was a time when the province required to build up live stock more than the present. The exportation of meat from New Brunswick to foreign countries was being carried on, on a scale that displays the necessity of maintaining such an institution. Thought however that the farm should be controlled by the Board itself.

Mr. Brown fully endorsed Mr. Anderson's remarks. He thought if the farm were not what it was intended to be, the Government should abandon it and get one that is. There must be something wrong when \$170 per head has to be paid per year to feed the stock on it. The cost of running the farm for 12 months was \$3,838. The sum of \$900 yearly was paid for leasing the land and the crop taken off it was worth only \$1,000 per year. He recommended moving the farm to McLean's.

On recess the discussion was continued. Mr. Brown moved an amendment to Mr. Reid's resolution, and it was seconded by Mr. Swin. It was as follows:—

Whereas, The stock farm had now been carried on for upwards of two years and the results are not satisfactory, but from the information before the board we are unable to determine whether the fault is in the management or in the farm, or partially in each; we therefore recommend the Government to take such action as may be deemed the best means of applying a remedy in preference to abandoning the enterprise, should it be found that the farm is unsuitable for the purpose intended, we recommend that one third of the farm be sold, and the management placed more directly under the control of the Board.

Mr. Brown and Mr. Swin supported the amendment with extensive remarks. Mr. Swin said that the loss of a stock farm to the country would be a great one, and it would be had policy to pass any resolution that might occasion it. It would be an expensive job to break up the farm, and it would be less judicious even than leaving it, and he thought the board should not be held responsible for the mismanagement in locating and running the farm, for it had nothing to do with either.

Messrs. Fairweather, Anderson, Colwell, and the Secretary were in favor of carrying on the enterprise. The amendment was carried by a majority of 10 to 10.

Another of Mr. Reid's resolutions recommended the Government to convert the recognized agricultural societies in each county into one agricultural society in each, was taken up, and an amendment offered by Mr. Anderson and seconded by Mr. Fairweather, deprecating the amalgamating of the societies in each county, as detrimental to the smaller societies, was carried.

A proposition from Mr. Reid to give a resolution fixing the grant to societies pro rata, according to the number of their members, was rejected.

A motion from Mr. Anderson, denying grants to any society unless its returns are in on Dec. 1st of the year, was carried unanimously, the resolution to take effect in 1884.

Before adjournment of the session, the Vice-president was called to the chair, and a vote of thanks was proposed to the President, Hon. D. McLellan, for the able and satisfactory manner in which he presided over the deliberations of the Board.

All the members spoke very complimentary of the pleasing manner in which Mr. McLellan presided, and the latter appropriately responded.

The Board then adjourned sine die.

El Mahdi. LONDON, Dec. 27.—A Snakin dispatch of the 18th inst., states that the rebels are menacing Riwayeh, and an Egyptian gunboat will embark the inhabitants of that place.

Cairo, Dec. 27.—Thirteen hundred Egyptian troops were ordered to Khairoum from Fashoda. They met with no resistance on the way. These troops will raise the garrison at Khairoum to 4,000 men.

A female slave, who was captured by El Mahdi after the slaying of the Khairoum chief, her master, and who recently returned from El Mahdi's posts to El Mahdi in great fear and had sent his family to a place of safety, and that the neighboring tribes have refused to help him.

An emissary of El Mahdi has been arrested at Minch, which is about 40 miles above Khairoum. He declared that he was in intention to proceed to Cairo and Mecca.
