Fire Damages H. H. Hatfield's House

From the fire itself but trifling damage resulted as compared with that from the deluge of water and the smoke; but the firemen were as sparing with the water as the circumstances would permit.

Practically all the household effects were safely removed, but it will be some weeks before the building can be made habitable again.

Dollar Weekly Passing

The dollar weekly will soon be an institution of the past. One after another these rural publications are being forced to raise subscription rates in order to meet their own increasing costs. The stupendous height which print paper has reached is the dominating element in the problem, but is only one of the many ways in which the newspaper publisher finds the cost of his product increased beyond all estimates. It is claimed that more than 350 American weeklies have been forced to suspend publication on account of these increasing costs. For the greater number, however, the other alternative will be the one adopted—that is, raising the subscription price above the time honored flat dollar per year. The dollar weekly has had an honorable history and the country owes it more than it knows. No apology is needed if the price that sufficed half a century ago is now found inadequate.—Ex.

CARLETON CO. COUNCIL

The Finances In Good Condition Inspector McLean's Report on Scott Act—Ferry Discussed.

County Council met in annual session Tuesday, Jan. 16, Warden Tracey in the chair. The session opened with God Save the King. Those present were: Aberdeen—D. Lamont, Samuel Hemphill. Brighton—Ed. Morgan, Fred Smith. Northampton—H. A. Phillips, Arthur Gibson. Peel—E. W. Melville, Frank Tompkins. Richmond—Alex. Bell, Ezra Flemming. Simonds—John Perry, Odur Shaw. Wicklow—Carey Estey, Rennie Tracey.

Wilmot—Harry Carvell, Wilmot Anderson. Kent—John Kinney, J. W. Gallagher. Woodstock Parish—Robert Moxon, Chas. Clark. Wakefield—Wm. G. Kearney, Albert G. Bell. Woodstock Town—James W. Gallagher.

The Warden welcomed the members to whom he wished a Happy and Prosperous New Year. Conditions so far as the war was concerned he was sorry to say had not changed very much. He regretted the illness of Coun. Stevens and hoped he would soon be restored to good health and strength. While not agreeing with the apportionment of Patriotic Fund, he felt sure the people of the county would rise to the occasion and do their full duty. The amount to be raised would mean a large increase but we must meet it and do all we can in the cause that effects us all.

The minutes of last session were read and approved. The following communication from Coun. H. D. Stevens was read by the Warden:

Moved that the communication be accepted and that the Warden be a committee to visit Coun. Stevens and express our regrets. Carried.

Adjourned till 2 o'clock. Council met at 2 o'clock.

Coun. Tompkins reported for committee on ferries. Investigated and gathered that people are much in favor of retaining the old ferry. Mr. Hallett was willing to operate it at all open seasons. I was told the other ferry could hardly give a crossing at night at all. What is known as the Hatheway ferry should be continued in operation and Mr. Hallett granted a license.

Coun. Perry said he never could succeed in getting a committee together, in order to adjust this ferry matter. I have talked to a few who wanted the upper ferry continued in operation.

Coun. Clark—I have never heard anything about it until today. Coun. Melville moved report be accepted and a license granted for Mr. Hallett. He presented a petition in favor of this ferry and at request of Coun. Kinney read the names.

Coun. Morgan seconded the motion. Coun. Estey—I'm in favor of part of the motion. By-law states that Councillors should act in their own parishes. This last part of this motion is infringing on the rights of the councillors. This petition does not ask for a license.

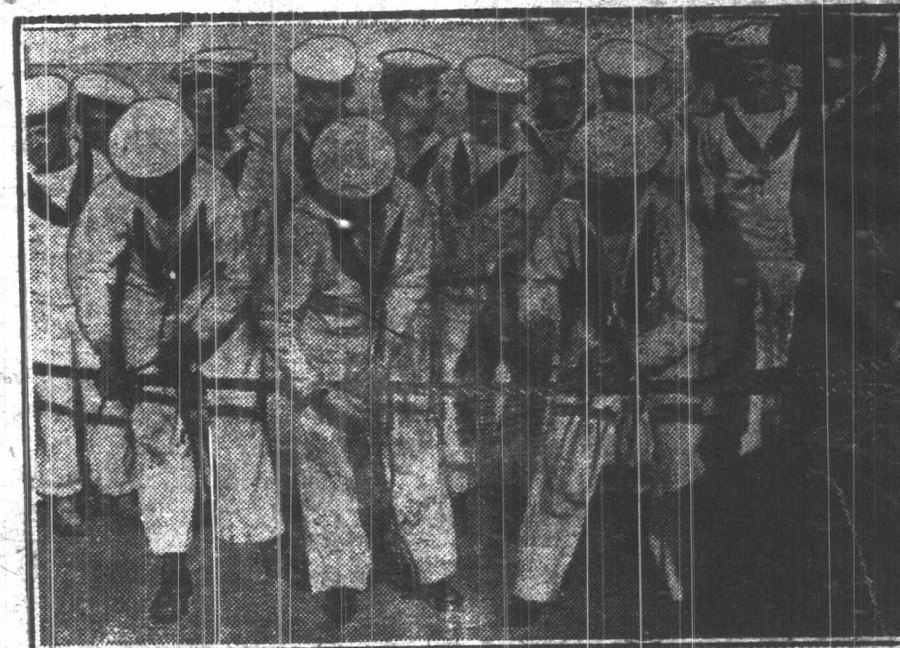
