THE CAUSE.

An inquiry into the causes of the accident shows that the second train left Vincennes at the regulation interval of five minutes after the first train. The latter train was delayed at St. Mande, owing to an enormous crowd of expursionists. The station master at Vincennes blames the driver of the second train for the accident. When this train was starting, the station master advised the driver to go slowly, as there was a train in front of him, but the man paid no heed to the advice, and went ahead at full speed. This driver at first alleged that all the signals indicated that the line was clear, but an inquiry confirms the report of the officials at St. Mande and Vincennes, that danger signals were shown. The driver now asserts that he has been the victim of an act of revenge on the part of some one who severed communication with the Westinghouse air brake, thus preventing him from bringing brake, thus preventing him from bringing the train to a standstill the instant he per-ceived the lights in the rear of the station-

ceived she lights in the rear of the stationary train.

The stoker of the second train declares that when the train left Vincennes the signal discs indicated that there was no danger chead. On reaching Pont Tournelle, close to the station of St. Mande, where the line curves, he caught sight of the red lamps on the rear of the front train. He then tried to put on the brakes, but they failed to act properly.

A leading official of the railway blames the public for crowding into the rear van, which, he cays, was intended to remain empty. The greatest number of dead were found beneath the ruins of this van.

ENOUGH EVIDENCE TO HANG ON Saturday asserted that it was certainly time to change the Government if it were proved that Sir Hector Langevin, chief in the great spending Department of Public Works, knowingly connived to rob the taxpayers. This man is, we believe, a type of citizen who can be reasoned with. To all such as he let us recall the circumstances of the latest swindle exposed before the Committee of Investigation at Ottawa.

One could go back to the evidence adduced in the Kingston, Quebec and British Columbia contract scandals and the Bay of Chalcurs railway rascality in proof of the contention that Sir Hector acted either as a fool or a knave in managing his department while these huge steals were taking place. But there is no need for going back as far as that. The evidence given by several re-liable witnesses, all of them Conservatives, in exposure of what must now be known as the Langevin Block Scandal is enough to condemn Sir Hector in the minds of all right-thinking persons. It is enough to destroy the fair fame of his associates in the Cabinet, who were appealed to, but refused to interfere in the interests of justice between man and man and between the contractor and the public. The Langevin block is a large addition to the Parliamentary Buildings at Ottawa. It has been constructed within the last year or two, at vast cost to the country, under the supervision of Sir Hector Langevin. The contractor for the mason work was a Mr. Charlebois, who, in former years, had been declared by Sir John Macdonald as an improper person to intrust with a contract for a great public work. But by the exme influence over Sir Hector, he managed to secure the contract for the mason work of the Langevin block and a justice, except the Minister's favor, was he entitled to. This man Charlebois was given the exclusive right to enter into the building, and as the contracts for the roofing, the plumbing and other works connected with the completion of the structure were let to others, he was enabled to go to them and say, "I have sole control of this building, If you wish to work here, you must pay me toll. I want 25 per cent. of your contract Confronted with such a demand as this, backed up by a clause in their con-tracts which deprived them of the right to enter upon the building except by arrangement with Charlebois, more than one of contractors either refused to sign or threw up the contracts, permitting the favorite of the Minister to obtain the contract at virtually his own figures. For example, a man contracted to put in the heating ap-paratus for \$15,550, but before he could begin his work he was compelled, through agreement of Charlebois with Langevin, to pay \$3,750 to that grab-all. Even more astardly was the exaction demanded from the contractors for the iron roof. These men offered to do the work for \$42,975, and hoped to make \$8,000 or \$9,000 by the transaction. But before they began work they were told by Sir Hector Langevin that they must pay the usual 25 per cent. of the contract price to Charlebois. This startling proviso, which was not embraced in the
