430 Lives Lost by the Sinking of the Victoria.

Ill-Fated Vessel Goes to the Bottom in 15 Minutes,

Being "Rammed" by Her Consort, the Camperdown.

Gladstone Makes the Announceent in Parliament-Intense Excite. ment and Sorrow Created by the News - The Ball to Have Taken Place in Buckingham Palace Postponed— De cription of the Costly Craft that So Easily Collapsed.

London, June 23.—As soon as the officers of the Victoria saw that there was danger of their ship foundering, orders were given to close the collision bulkheads in order to keep the water in the compartment into which the Camperdown had shoved her ram. The saliors tried to obey the order, but the ship was making water too fast to allow of closing the bulkheads, and while the men were still trying to shut them the ship with her immense gans and heavy top hamper turned over and carried them down.

INTENSE EXCITEMENT IN LONDON.
The news of the calamity has caused the most intense excitement, not only among the saw who had friends aboard the ill-fated by, but among all classes of the popularitation. So dense was the throng in the vicinity of the Admiralty office that the officials were compelled to summon the police to restrain the people.

The Victoria was a single turnet vessel, carrying two 110-ton guns, mounted in a forward turnet coated with eighteen inches of compound armor. She had one teninch gun firing aft, and a broadside auxiliary armament of twelve six-inch five-ton guns. Of artillery of a smaller nature she carried 21 quick-firing and eight machine guns. Her maximum speed was 16½ knots. She could stow 1,200 tons of coal in her bunkers, and her radius of action at ten knots speed with her full complement of coal was estimated at 10,000 knots. Her armored belt and bulkheads consisted of compound armor from 16 to 18 inches in thickness. She was britt at Elswick.

All official telegrams in regard to the loss of the ship will be sent at once to the Queen at Windsor Castle. Her Majesty has ordered the postponement of the State ball which was to have taken place at Buckingham Palace tonight.

MR. GLADSTONE INFORMED THE HOUSE.

Mr. Gladstone was greatly shocked when he received the news of the disaster. He informed the House of Commons of the accident and paid a glowing tribute to the worth of Vice-Admiral Tyron, who, he said, was one of the "ablest and most esteemed officers in the service. Mr. Gladstone said there were 611 officers, scamen and boys and 107 marines on board the ship. It was feared of this total of 718 souls 450 had been lost. He was sure the deepest sympathy of the House would be felt for the brave men who had found an early grave in the service of their country, and that it would be extended to their relatives and friends. Lord George Hamilton, formerly First Lord of the Admiralty, indored everything Mr. Gladstone had said, and expressed the deepest regret for the calamity that had befallen the country in the loss of so many brave officers and men.

Among those saved is Lord Richard Gillford, Vice-Admiral Tryon's flag lieutenant, and son and heir of the Earl of Clanwilliam. The details of the accident are very meager.

GERMAN SYMPATHY.

GERMAN SYMPATHY.

LONDON, June 23.—The Duke of Edinburg has received this dispatch from Emperor William: "Words cannot express our horror. We all sympathize with our British comrades. As tokens of our sympathy your ensign is flying from the mainmasts of our vessels, with our own ensign at half mast, according to my orders." The Duke of Edinburgh replied: "The British navy and nation feel deeply the sympathy expressed by your Majesty, and our brother efficers of the German navy for us in this great disaster."

A REMINISCENCE.

The accident to the Victoria has never been equaled in fatal results in the naval annals of recent times. The foundering of this newest type of warships calls to mind

The foundering of this newest type of warships calls to mind a similar accident, as far as great less of life is concerned, that befell the English line of battle ship Royal George, carrying 108 guns, was lying off Spithand. She had been keeled ever for repairs, when a sandden guat of wind caused her to keel over until the sca entered her open ports. She filled and went dewn with all on board, lacluding Rear Admiral Kernpenfelt. A number of women were on board at the time, and they, too, were drowned. Altogether about 600 persons lost their lives in that disaster.

THE CAMPERDOWN DAMAGED.

The Camperdown was severely damaged forward in the collision. Temporary repairs will be made and also will then start for home. It is said here that several times the Victoria had shown signs of weakness in her steering gear. One theory is that on account of this weakness she became unmanageable and could not be got out of the Camperdown's way.

THE LESSON OF THE DISASTER.

While the Victoria might have been unmatched as to efficiency in bombarding a scaper town or destroying see coast defense, she was decidedly too unwieldy for maneuvering off a seaboard. Naval engineering, it must be remembered, has not progressed as rapidly as naval architecture. The supendous a seaboard. The stupendous mass of the 10,000 ton warship cannot be displaced with the momentum a naval officer generally desires. It was thought that the twin screws were the desideratum so longed for. They proved themselves effective indeed, but the delay and waste of energy in propalsion of these leviathans is still the same. There is no doubt but that the foundering of the Victoria is mainly due to the defects pointed out shove. There is no doubt that either the Camperdown or the Victoria could not deaden the impetus received from the engines when required. Much has been said regarding the strength of our present ironclads. The present disaster illustrates too well the points of our present warship. If in mere maneuvering warships can be sunk in fifteen minutes, nothing doubtless will prevent them being out asunder in the carnest fight. Scarcely anything has been done to nullify the deathly action of the "ram." On the other hand the navles of the world have hardly given a thought to life-boat drill. FORWARD MOVEMENT.

The Saloon Blind Will Have to Go.

And Every Vote Possible Must Be Polled for the Plebiscite-Decre ase of Drinking.

OTTAWA, June, 24.—The saloon blind and the plebiscite questions came in for considerable discussion at the meeting of the United Temperance Association. The saloon blind must go, and every vote possible must be pelled for the plebiscite, was the decision of the meeting. Provincial License Inspector J. K. Stewart, who is now here, says the temperance sentiment in Ontario is growing day by day. This is evidenced by the returns which point to the unmistakable fact that the people are drinking less than they were a few years ago. Last year the committments in the Province caused by drunkenness were 2,736, being 1,716 less than when the Scott Act was in force in 1888.

In 1888 the Scott Act was in force in 57 license districts. Mr. Stewart says that although the population is increasing the number of licenses issued is decreasing, having decreased 100 last year. In three years 1,500 persons went out of the liquor business, transferring !their licenses to others. SERMONS ON TAP

Novel and Economical Scheme for Securing Good Peaching at a Low Price.

curing Good Peaching at a Low Price.

A sermon factory, with new ideas and plenty of capital back of it, is one of the new industries now on the road to incorporation and success. Several parties versed in the possibilities of the phonograph are the organizers. It is proposed to construct several large phonographs for use in county churches where ministers are only heard once a month. The congregations will be taxed \$50 per year for the use of the instruments, and a charge of \$1 for each cylinder or tube containing an able sermon by Talmaze, Dixon or the representative expounder of the different creeds of the congregations desiring the phonographic sermons, will be made. Music by eminent soloists will also be furnished by the sermon company, and churches that have only had one service a month, or one every fortnight, will in the future have services every Sabbath at an annual cost of not over \$125 per year.

A regular catalogue, containing a list of the sermons on tap, figuratively speaking, will be mailed once a month to every congregation, and the deacons of the respective churches can make their selections from the list of bottled pulpit eloquence and write or telegraph for the sermons they may desire for the ensuing month's services. The village blacksmith can easily insert the tubes, and the cost of good preaching will be reduced to a minimum.—[Cincinnati Enquirer.

"Another feature of the educational department will be the monthly meetings, which will, to a large extent, if not altogether, take the place of the ordinary weekly lodge meetings. We believe that these meetings will stimulate hands.

"We shall reduce expenses by consolidation in the matter of halls or meeting places. Workingmen, especially those whose employment is purely physical and continuous, are not deep thinkers, and it would be a wonderful thing if they ware."

"A meeting for the perfection of the American railway union's organization will be held in Chicago on June 20, and the plans so far as they have been decided upon may be roughly outlined as follows: The entire country will be divided into districts, of which there will be 12. From Chicago 12 organizers, one for each district, will be sent out, and they will go from center to center organizing first district head-quarters for sub-divisions. The boundaries of the divisions have not yet been fixed. The sub-divisions will be subordinate, of course, to the district capitals, and each subordinate organization will be entitled to delegates in proportion to its membership, say one to every 200. There will be no yearly state conventions nor grand conventions—these cost from \$35,000 to \$60,000 each—but there will be a quadrennial convention of the lentire order and 60 days before the holding of a quadrennial convention to loges or unions will elect delegates who will meet at the dustrict capitals and choose delegates to the quadrennial convention. Each district will be entitled to delegates in proportion to its membership, It is proposed that the quadrennial conventions shall do its work in a day or at most two days, and that its businers shall be mainly the electing of a board of directors of say 20 or 30 practica railroad men.

It is expected that the district chiefs will make most of the addresses spoken of in the educational scheme, and if they have served as chiefs, in various parts of the country they will thereby become much better qualified to make these addresses valuable to the men.

"We propose to make this an organization of rugged workingmen. We shall include every branch of the railroad employment from the lowest to the highest, and without doing away with special

organizations we shall strive to bring all under one common fold.



He is the happy possessor of 46 grandchildren, and has at present 26 great-grandchildren.







BEST COW FOR THE MILK DAIRYMAN, Opinion of a Man Who Makes the Milk

There are some Holsteins that give milk as rich as any Jerseys, but others give much poorer milk, and the average is on the whole not so rich as Jersey milk. The color of Holstein milk is too licht and one whise reastein milk is too light, and our chief rea-son for keeping Jerseys is to give our milk a higher color."

"How de you plan to color all the milk

properly?"
"We put two milkers on Holsteins to one on Jerseys, and all pour their milk together into the tank that supplies the cooler. Our milk is acrated and cooled as soon as drawn from the cow, and when in this way it is strained directly into the tank all together it is well mixed and colored."

"Have you tried Guernseys?"

"We are just beginning with them. I have bought a good bull and am now after some good cows. A cross of Guernsey bull and Holstein cows ought to give about the right milkman's cow, with a large flow of well colored milk."

"What do you feed?"

Good Butter In Warm Weather.

The question often arises how cream should be handled during warm weather to get the best results with the butter. It must be remembered that correct flavor scores 50 points, and here is where the most important work is done. Every day's cream must be made a special study. The observant butter maker will notice three very marked stages in the ripening of cream—viz, a flat acid, a sharp acid and a sour acid. The first acid has a flat, insipid taste, with very little odor. At this stage the cream should be thoroughly stirred, getting the air through it as much as possible. With the gradual thickening of the cream there approaches the borderland of the second stage of acid.

Now the skill of the butter maker is

put to the test. He must so develop the acid and regulate the temperature that his ideal churning point is reached and have the cream in the churn and under motion within 15 minutes after he en-ters the creamery in the morning. No exact rule can be laid down for every man to work by. The danger now lies in overrheading not in too little. What in overripening, not in too little. 


PERSPECTIVE VIEW.



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SPRAYING ORCHARDS.

Coddling Moth and Woolly Aphis—A Spraying Outst Described. F. L. Washburn, entomologist of the Oregon experiment station, after three years' observation on the habits of the coddling moth, expresses the belief that orchardists begin to spray too early for this pest and names as the time for the first spraying just after the blossoms have fallen. At the Oregon station, where the several insecticides have been tested, the combination that gave best satisfaction consisted of a pound of IXL (a comparatively new insecticide) to every 16 gallons of water, and to this paris een added in the proportions of a pound green added in the proportions.

to every 200 gallons of liquid. About 15 pounds of whale oil soap (soft soap would have been as efficacious) were added to this 200 gallons. The IXL was crushed to pieces about the size of a hen's egg and sufficient het water poured on to cover it. It was then added to the water, as well as the soap, which latter had first been thoroughly dissolved. The paris green was then added and the mixture kept stirred when spraying. It has been expedient to mix the paris green with a small amount of water first and then pour the creamy mass into the spraying liquid. When not in use, this tank fits into a brick furnace and is used for compounding any insecticide which re-quires heat. A desirable addition is a tackle to hoist the tank when full from off the furnace and to roll it onto the

About a bushel of seed will plant an acre, dropping four to six in a hill. Of course the variety and size govern the quantity required. With a modern planter 10 to 12 acres can be planted in the day. LAWNS AND WALKS.

to Reep Them Free From Annual Biennial and Perennial Weeds. How

Intensive cultivation allows no weeds to appear, but then comparatively few persons practice it. Annual weeds die after the season's growth and require no special treatment. The biennial species may be held in check by preventing them from seeding, as by mowing them when coming into flower. The perennial species, which live indefinitely, often require par-

ticular treatment.

Weeds in lawns are to be prevented by a liberal use of commercial manures by a liberal use of commercial manures and clean grass seed sown thickly. For-tunately grass can stand more cutting than weeds, and therefore most peren-nial weeds may be kept down by fre-quent mowings with a good lawn mower. Those that do not succumb to this fre-quent cutting must be cut off below the surface with a spud and the crowns pulled out, or a little oil of vitriol may

be poured upon the crown of each plant.
Walks ought to be made so that weeds Walks ought to be made so that weeks cannot grow in them. Professor L. H. Bailey tells in the "Horticulturist's Rule-book" that this can be done by making a deep stone foundation and then filling in between the stones with cinders, coal ashes and other similar materials. when weeds become established they can be destroyed with hot brine applied with a watering pot. Another remedy consists in sprinkling the walks with car-bolic acid solution in the proportions of one ounce of acid to a gallon of water. This will also destroy ants.

I keep a sharp lookout for mildew and apply sulphur on the diseased branches. In England they use sulphide of potassium—1 ounce dissolved in 4 gallons of sium—I ounce dissolved in 4 galions of water—syringing the plants with the same, which is quite as effective as sul-phur and not so unsightly. I shall try this solution the coming spring should occasion require. For green fly I use a solution of whale oil soap. When the buds are just beginning to

show, I water with liquid manure from the barn cellar and repeat it when the bads have fully formed, also just before they begin to open. As soon as the buds are large enough I disbud where I want fine flowers, leaving only one bud on each flower shoot. After flowering-about the 10th to the 15th of July-I prune all the vigorous growing varieties, such as Paul Neyron, Antoine Mouton, Alfred Co-Neyron, Antoine Mouton, Alfred Co-lomb, Ulrich Brunner, Gloire Lyonnaise, Le Reine, Duke of Connaught, Louis Van Houtte and Anna de Diesbach, cutting out most of the old wood that has flowered. Then I sow some guano, rich in ammonia, and fork it in. They will then make a fine growth and produce nice flowers in September and until frest

Some of the petunias do well as trellis plants.

Pear Orchards. At a meeting of the Western New York Horticultural society the fact was brought out in a discussion that but few pear orchards have done well in fruit yield when only one kind was grown by reason of imperfect pollenization. Set-ting several different kinds obviates this difficulty.
