NEWFOUNDLAND.

Improvement in the Colony's Financial Position.

St. Johns, Nfld., April 5.-The budget presented to the Colonial Legislature on Friday night reviewed the colony's financial history for the past three years. For the year ending June, 1896, the surplus was \$235,000, and was obtained by reducing the appropriations for all public services under the general retrenchment scheme. For the year ending June, 1897, the figures have not been finalized, the Receiver General being only able to state that the revenue is exceeding expectations while he is not in a position to deal with the expenditures until the close of the fiscal period. For the year ending June, 1898, it is estimated that the revenue will reach nearly the same figure. The public debt will then amount to over \$18,000,000, involving an annual interest of \$661,000. The imports during the last fiscal year amounted to \$5,986,000, and exports to \$6,622,000. The Government announces its intention to appoint a commission representing the different interests involved to revise the colonial tariff during the coming summer, so that the new schedule of duties can be put in operation next year.

> A London evening paper publishes a sensational story descriptive of a fracas in the Raleigh Club in the West End of London, the members of which are chiefly military officers and civilians connected with the best social circles. According to the paper a member of the club, a Mr. Mackie, while in the supper room a night or two ago, made a disparaging remark regarding the mother of a fellow member, Mr. Gerard O'Shea, who is the son of Capt. O'Shea and Mrs. O'Shea Parnell. Young O'Shea, who was present, resented the remark as grossly insulting and threw the contents of his glass into Mackie's face Further hostilities were prevented by the other clubmen in the room, but eventually O'Shea met Mackie after he had gone down stairs preparatory to leaving the building and struck him a heavy blow in the jaw, knocking him down. In falling Mackie's head struck against a fender, rendering him unconscious. Mackie was picked up and removed to a bed, where, after remaining some time, and not regain-ing consciousness, a doctor was called. The physician was unable to bring him to his senses, and some of the most eminent specialists in London, together with a number of trained nurses, were summoned and have since been in at endance upon him. He is now suffer ing from the effects of concus the brain. The paper adds that Mr. O'Shea tendered his resignation as a nember of the Raleigh Club, and also laid the facts before his father. Capt. 

Goldwin Smith Suggests the Need of Consideration.

From the Weekly Sun, Toronto.

The Transatlantic market, to which, since our neighbors have returned to the vomit of protection, the Canadians are being advised to direct their energies, has, compared to the continental market, obvious disadvantages of a commercial kind, such as the cost of freight, the uncertainty involved in distance, and the risk to perishable goods. But there is another disadyantage connected with the market in Europe, which just now is being vividly brought before our eyes. There may be any day a European war. Several times in the last ten years war has been imminent; it is now more imminent than ever Before very long. minent than ever. Before very long, apparently, it must come. The tension has for some time been intolerable. In fact, nothing has kept the peace but the dread of a conflict, with the new weapon of destruction and under untried conditions. Supposing war to come, what would be the con equence to our transatlantic trade? The fleet of Great Britain is no doubt far stronger than that of any of her

rivals; probably it is a match for those of any two of them. It would secure her own ports from attack; but it could hardly prevent an enemy's cruisers from getting to sea and cutting up or seriously impeding the trade b tween her and her colonies. The rates of insurance, at all events, would rise to war figures. We might secure neutrality by obtaining independence, but the very people who seek to divert our industry to the European market denounce the idea of independence, and

cling to political connection with the mother country.

Let us have patience before we rush into a policy of retaliation. As I sai before, there is still a powerful free W. 


