Mr. Samuel, under-secretary of the home office, in opposing it, said the Government would nevertheless actively go on with the miners' eighthour bill, whereupon ex-Premier Balfour ridiculed the Government for seeking to curtail the hours of miners, whose health explained why they lived gone the way of many others. 

SEES AGAIN

Port Huron Girl Who Crosses Ocean Finds Sight in Germany,

New York, March 18 .- After 20 years of blindness, many of them spent in selfsupport, and a journey to Europe alone to undergo an operation-the forlorn hope of a darkened life-Alice Hollis, of Port Huron, Mich., has had her sight restored and will shortly return to America, the happiest woman in the world.

The news of Miss Hollis's marvelous recovery reached here yesterday from Wiesbaden, Germany, where she had been undergoing treatment in the sanatorium of Dr. Pagenstecher, a famous oculist, in a letter from the brave sufferer herself, to Walter G. Holmes, president and manager of the Matilda Ziegler Magazine for the Blind, No. 306 West Fifty-third street. It is a sequel to a remarkable story of

courage and devotion. When Alice Hollis was 13 an inflammation threatened her sight, and a doctor who attended her used caustic in the eyes, only increasing the trouble. The child was sent to the Michigan School for the Blind at Lansing, and emerged accomplished in

music among other things. Miss Hollis became a teacher of the piano, and during her mother's declining years was enabled to add to their com-

forts as well as support herself. A short time ago a blind man in Port Huron, who was a close friend of Miss Hollis, crossed the ocean to take the baths at Wiesbaden. While there he heard much of the celebrated oculist and his work. He entered the sanatorium and returned to his home in Port Huron a "sighted" man, to used the pathetic ex-pression of the blind. From that moment never ceased to urge Miss Hollis to take the same chance.

Goes Across Alone.

After correspondence with the doctor and much careful saving, the blind woman bought a ticket from the Holland-American agent in Port Huron and came to New York, to sail on Feb. 12, on the steamship Statender. She had consulted many specialists here and in the west and had been offered no hope. She was without friends in New York, but as a reader of the Magazine for the Blind, she wrote Mr. Holmes, asking that he meet her at the train and take her to
