GOVERNMENT SAYS NO ORGAN PROSPECT OF

LITTLE PROSPECT OF COALITION IN **DOMINION CABINET**

Ottawa Journal-Press, "In The Know," Declares Change Is Not Necessary-More Rumors of Cabinet Shifts.

Toronto, May 28 .- There appears today no prospect of a coalition Government to handle the conscription problem.

Any hopes held by coalitionists were dissipated this morning by an editorial in the Ottawa Journal-Press, whose president, P. D. Ross, is conceded to be a strong confidante of Sir Robert Borden, and probably more "in the know" than the Borden cabinet itself.

The Journal-Press said today: "The Borden Government needs no coalition with the spirit that has prevailed among Liberal politicians. It stakes itself upon conscription."

They all emphasize the necessity of not only defending the country against the enemy, but of an immediate advance to relieve the pressure upon the Allies, which Germany has been able to exert by transferring the bulk of her troops from the eastern to the western front.

Twenty-Five Thousand Express Sympathy For Britain and Allies

AT THE SPANISH CAPITAL

There was great enthusiasm among the people, who were estimated to number 25,000. A counter demonstration by German-philes was forbidden by the authori-es in order to prevent possible dis-urbances. Conspicuous among the decorations the great bull ring were the names thirty-six torpedoed Spanish vessels huge letters. The speakers included the leaders of the progressive party Spain. RAIDERS OF ENEMY REPULSED BY BRITISH

London, May 28-1:45 p.m.-"Hostile raiding parties were repulsed last night northwest of Cherisy, and south of Lens," says today's official report on the Franco-Belgian front operations.

"We inflicted a number of casualties on the enemy by rifle and machine gun fire and secured prisoners. Successful raids were made by us north of Armentieres, and in the neighborhood of Wytschaete. Our troops reached the German support line and captured between 20 and 30 prisoners."

Dispatches from Brazil indicate that it is merely a question of days, if not of hours, before the Brazilian pardiament follows the lead of the administration and aligns Brazil will join nations now fighting the Central Powers. A new crisis is threatened between Spain and Germany, through the sinking of & Spanish passenger ship with a heavy loss of life. The Struggle Raging About Craonne Is Slowly Bending the Enemy's Line and May Compel Another Big Retirement.

Special Cable to The Advertiser.] (By Henry Wood.)

With French Armies, Near Craonne, May 28 .- Steadily through one entire week a battle has been raging around Craonne, which may ultimately force Germany's retirement to the Meuse.

The French communiques have not mentioned the fighting except incidently, but it has continued incessantly, bitterly, and victoriously for the French.

Driving a Wedge.

Already the French troops have descended from Paon Plateau into the Vailey of the Miette. Today they were steadily driving a two-edged and fatal wedge into the Germans.

Once this wedge is sufficiently plunged into the enemy's front, the French can turn either north or south—or in both directions, simultaneously. A successful movement in either direction will be sufficient to force a German retirement to the Meuse The to save the Hindenburg front northward through Laon, St. Quentin, Cambrai, and Donai.

Already the battle has advanced sufficiently to insure these results if it continues favorable to the French, but sev.

In Small Bites.

The Craonne battle has had no spectacular mention in the daily official statements, because the French, instead of launching immense assaults on an extended front, have temporarily adopted the strategy of capturing small bits of line at a time, by small and almost daily attacks. The past week has witnessed steady advances of the wedge toward Corbeny. Meanwhile the French have completely captured all observatories dominating the Allette Valley, by a battle fought with tactics similar to those being pursued on the Craonne sector. In Small Bites.

Further successes reported today north of the Moronvilliers Crest is one other menace to the German line, which may force their retirement. Another wedge is being driven here into the big bend in the German front. This is far behind the present German line against which the British are battering to the north.





As a result it was decided to add 42 games to the present schedule, increasing it to 154 games.



LAVERGNE MAKES FIERY STATEMENTS AT QUEBEC MEETING

Says French and Catholics Should Disobey Conscription.

TALKS AGAINST ENGLAND

Says War Could Have Been Averted in July, 1914.

QUEBEC, May 27. - Speaking at an anti-conscription meeting at Loretteville, today, Armand Lavergne formet member of Parliament for Montmagny said: "I believe I should say that, if the Government passes this damned law, if you have a heart, if you are still descendants of those who wrested the country from the Iroquois, of those who ascended the scaffold crying 'Vive a liberte,' 'Vive l'independence,' you of

la liberte.' Vive l'independence,' you of those who have written with their French and Catholic blood an epic such as no other act can show, you should take a pledge to disobey it.'

Over five thousand persons cheered wildly the words of the speaker as he denounced the Government for the proposed measure.

Mr. Lavergne stated that it was England who wished the war of today to crush Germany. "She may have a good reason for this from her own point of view," said the speaker, "but we have nothing against the Germans. If Sir Edward Grey had consented to say that England would aid France in July, 1914, as M. Cambon had requested, this war would have been averted. But he would not do this, but waited to the 5th of August. The war has increased Canada's debt to two billions, and after

I am not against conscription for the defence of Canada, because I believe it is the duty of all citizens to give their pure blood for this country, but I love my own enough to tell them they should not give one drop to defend England. If we have to spill it, let us begin as our fathers did by doing so for the defence of liberty."

The speaker then condemned the Government for trying to send Canada's sons to "butchery" without consulting the people and uttered the words quoted in the opening paragraphs, which made a great impression on the crowd. The meeting at Loretteville lasted four hours.


