DESPERADO ESCAPED

Only a Joke at First.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 9.-Masked and dressed in movie masquerading costume, a bandit entered a private home, where seven or eight men were playing cards or watching the game about midnight last night. In the melee which followed a brusque command to hand over valuables, Thos. J. Roberts. a pioneer hotelman of Vancouver, was shot dead, and Harry Eames, a logger, was seriously wounded. The bandit, after lining the remaining players up against the wall, backed out of the house to a waiting taxicab and made his escape. When the bandit entered the room,

GERMANS CAN HOLD OUT LONG TIME YET SAYS HIGH OFFICIAL PREMIER APPEALS

Deputy Chief of the Kaiser's General Staff Is Optimistic Yet.

Amsterdam, Sept. 9.—In a lecture on the war in Berlin, Lieut.-Gen. Baron von Freytag-Loringhoven, deputy chief of the general staff, contended that the present crisis on the western front was less serious than many others during the course of the war.

British Patrols Have Occupied the Towns of Vermand and Vendelles -Poilus Hold Crozat Canal Along Its Entire Length.

London, Sept. 9, 1 p.m.-Pushing ahead today on the front between Peronne and St. Quentin, British patrols have occupied the towns of Vermand, five miles northwest of St. Quentin, and Vendelles, two miles north of Vermand.

The British this morning were attacking Gouzeaucourt, southeast of Havrincourt Wood. They are on the western and northern edges of Epehy, within two and a half miles of the Hindenburg line, opposite Le Catelat, and their patrols are reported to have passed through the village.

Field Marshal Haig's armies in force this morning advanced in the area west and northwest of St. Quentin and are now five miles from the Hindenburg line. They are still pressing forward. The British made a formidable thrust this morning north of the Arras-Camb road.

In Flanders, it is stated that the Germans have removed their artillery to the east of the Lys River.

French troops now hold the Crozat Canal practically along its whole length. They are only four miles from St. Quentin, and their cavalry patrols are close to La Fere.

Players Thought That It Was BRITISH REPULSE GERMAN RAIDS IN ARLEUX-EN-GOHELLE REGION

London, Sept. 9 .- Last night passed in quiet along the British front in Northern France and Flanders, except for artillery activity and minor raiding operations, according to today's war office

Mr. Griffith evidently felt that his subject was too big for petty heroics, and he wisely selected to approach it in a simple manner. He has shown the tragedy of a French village, one unit in the world tragedy, overwhelmed by the German Invasion. He follows the method that he used in his story of the American Civil War. Great panoramas of the war are shown that give an idea of the size of the catastrophe, and then the tragedy is epitomized in single incidents—the partings, the sufferings or the heroisms of the characters whose experiences form the thread of the plot. The story opens in the village shortly before the war. The love affair between the Boy and the Girl is unfolded, with tiffs and misunderstandings and moments of romance. Then on the day set for the wedding comes the call to arms. The Boy departs without any idea of the seriousness of the affair. The Germans arrive, and the defenders are thrown back. The French village falls into the hands of the invaders, who capture the Girl. She faces terrible experiences of slavery and worse, but is finally rescued by the Boy. Everything happens in and about the one French village.
