SUNDAY CARS TO PORT, APRIL 24 ANNOUNCEMENT IS NOW

Beginning Sunday Next the London and Lake Erie Railway and Transportation Company Will Operate a Regular Schedule -First Car Will Leave at 7 o'Clock in the Morning.

Sunday cars will be run to Port Stanley and St. Thomas on Sunday The management of the London and Lake Eric Railway and Transportation Company, known formerly as the Southwestern Traction Company, today announced that the regular Sunday schedule will be commenced Sunday next, April 24.

The first car out of London will start at 7 a.m., and cars will regular hourly intervals from that time until the evening. The fare will be the regular week-end fare, which will allow for a return on Monday, as at the present time,

MANAGEMENT CONFIDENT.

The Dominion charter gives the company undoubted rights to operate cars on the Sabbath, the management claim, and there will be no attempt to interfere with the company.

We will operate cars on Sunday, commencing on Sunday next," said Manager Mower, when asked by The Advertiser concerning the company's plans. "We will run the regular daily schedule as in operation at the present time. We expect no trouble, as our charter covers the ground thoroughly We have decided that the week-end fares will operate on this day." CASE OF THE P. M.

"There is nothing to prevent the Pere Marquette operating cars to Port Stanley on Sunday. This statement was made by a prominent lawyer, who is widely read on

railroad law, to The Advertiser, today.

"The road is operated under a Dominion charter, the same as the Grand Trunk, the C. P. R., or any other company," he continued. "The management have undoubted rights to run trains on Sunday. More recently, the London and Lake Erie Company were granted the right to operate cars on Sunday. All are under Dominion charter, and if the Pere Marquette so decide, I fancy there is nothing to prevent them."

So far as the agreement with the city is concerned, I fancy there is nothing to prevent Sunday cars. The contract, as I read it, compels company to maintain a certain schedule every day, Sunday excepted, there is nothing in that to prevent the company running on Sunday."

DID NOT PAY FORMERLY. The same gentleman expressed his opinion that Sunday cars were abandoned on the L. and P. S. R., not because of legal difficulties, but because they would not pay. If the company are of the opinion that they will pay there is nothing to prevent them from running, if they so desire.

As for handling coal on Sunday, there is not so much certainty, although it is understood that they can do so.

Mayor Beattle is awaiting the opinion of City Solicitor Meredith on the subject before calling a meeting of the L. and P. S. board to deal with the request of the company. This opinion will be ready in a very few days and then a meeting will be called.

A BALLAST TRAIN DROPPED INTO LAKE

Four Perished in Disaster On Transcontinental Construction Near La Tuque.

Quebec, April 19 .- According to the latest news the catastrophe on the Transcontinental Railway nappened at Lake MacDonald, 40 miles from La Tuque. A viaduct built on the shores of the lake at a height of 75 feet, fell train composed of six wagons heavily loaded, and 40 men were precipitated into the lake, which is 15 feet deep. Four men were crushed to death and 23 others were more or less injured. The others escaped.

A channel 200 feet wide and 16 fee deep has been dredged in Kettle Creek at the bridge where the docks of the Ontario Navigation Company are being built at Port Stanley.

For some days the Government have had a dredge at work. The stream has been widened from 135 to 200 feet, and has been dredged a uniform depth of 16 feet.



THE BRITISH BUDGET

London, April 19 .- In the House of Commons this evening Hon. David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, reintroduced the budget of 1909-10. The changes are few and are chiefly of a verbal nature.

The chancellor dealt at length with the financial position. He declared that he realized that the present deficit of \$131,240,-000 would be more than wiped out when all arrears had been collected, and that there would be an actual surplus of \$14,800,-000. If the budget had been passed as usual last year, he said there would have been a surplus of \$21,000,000.

The Chancellor commented upon the remarkable decrease of 32 per cent in the consumption of whiskey, which he attributed to the extra duty imposed. The gross revenue from spirits as compared with the estimated figures was \$14,000,000.




