FREIGHT RATES TO BE SOUGHT BY INCREASE IN

Advance in Rates To Be Permitted or Taxpayers Must Calculate On Payment of Heavy Deficit-Same Order Will Apply To Canadian Pacific Railway.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—The Canadian National Railways will at an early date make an application to the railway commission for an increase in freight rates. Whether the Canadian Pacific will be a party to the application or not makes little difference. Whatever increase is ordered will apply to that company also.

The only alternative to an increase in rates on the National Railways is the payment by the people of heavy deficits in the operation of their system. Prospective deficits during the coming fiscal year are heavy.

The last increase in freight rates was made under the war-time measures act, and in the face of fairly strong opposition from boards of trade. EXPERTS RECOMMEND STATE INSURANCE IN

Suggestion Is Made As an Amendment to Workmen's Compensation Act.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 18.—State insurance for Manitoba was the recommendation made yesterday by the experts called in by the Government to assist a joint committee which has been considering suggested amendments to the workmen's compensation act. These are Miles M. Dawson, actuary, from New York, and F. W. Dinsdale, who is in charge of the labor legislation in British Columbia. They suggest that the scheme be carried out by a commissioner and two directors representing employers and employees. They also sioner and two directors representing employers and employees. They also recommend the increase of compensation from 55 to 66 1-3 per cent of the carnings, and the increase of the allowances to widows from \$20 to \$30 per month, and to children from \$5 to \$7.50.

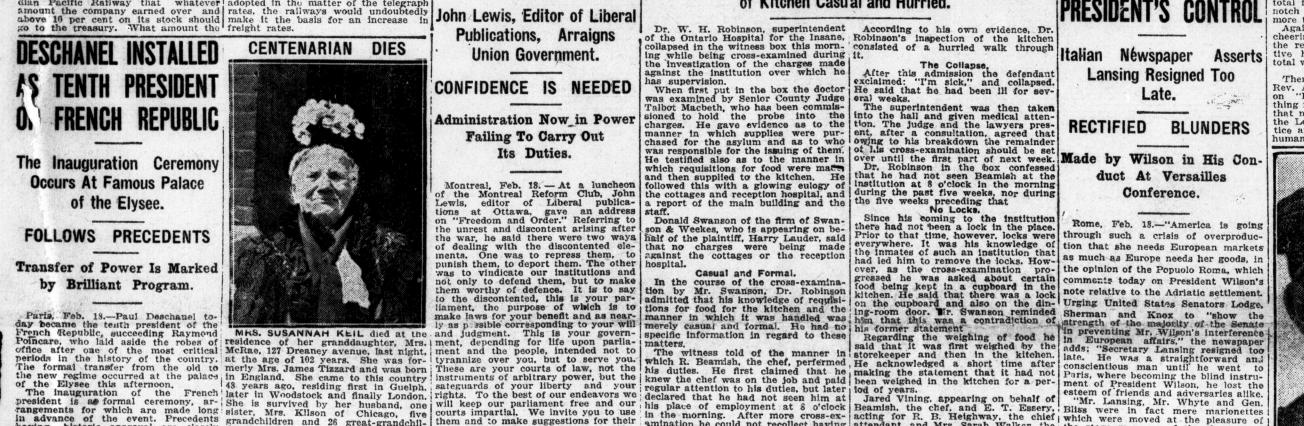

U.S. Will Become Involved In New War If She Shirks Duty

New York, Feb. 18.—A warning that the United States will be involved in another European war within ten years unless she accepts her share of the responsibility of putting Europe and Asia on their feet again, was uttered by Henry Morgenthau, former American ambassador to Turkey, in an address before the students of Columbia University.

Mr. Morgenthau declared that the United States, in refusing to accept a mandate for Constantinople, had lost an advantage which it can

never regain. After asserting that "the magnificent talk of self-determination all died away," and that the nations of Europe are "going back to the old order," the former ambassador continued: "Unless militarism is destroyed and the new order of things established I predict that all you young men who fought in the late war will be called upon again to bear arms in an European war and that all of you who were too young two years ago will receive your first call for service."

AIR FORCES WILL BE USED BY BRITAIN IN **DEFENCE OF FAR EAST** Hon. Winston Churchill Declares Bases Have Been Established.

IN COLONIAL CITIES

Aeroplanes To Play Big Part in Persia and Mesopotamia.

Washington, Feb. 18 .- Great Britain relies largely upon her air forces for relies largely upon her air forces for the defence of Persia and Mesopotamia, according to official advices received here. Hon. Winston Churchill, British war minister, recently informed Parlia-ment that air bases have been estab-lished at Bagdad and Karachi, the latter a port on the Arabian Sea, and the terminus of an important railway. Military experts here attach great im-portance to this advice because it is an innovation in military stratery in the innovation in military strategy in two particulars. It is the first time, the authorities say, that air forces have been relied upon to so large a degree purely for defence. Also the impossipurely for defence. Also the impossibility of conducting operations in desert regions has been overcome by carrying on the operations in the air. British authorities have feared that Bolshevik troops who have penetrated Turkestan might enter Afghanistan and take Persia from the flank. It is believed that the aerial forces have been organized partially to meet this threatened danger.



The prohibiting of fish and fiesh at the same meal during Lent has been abolished.

The Lenten fast and abstinence cease at 12 o'clock noon on Holy Saturday.

Persons under 21 years of age, or those who have reached their 60th year are not bound by the law of fasting, and all persons in ill-health or engaged in hard labor or have any other legitimate excuse, may be dispensed from both the law of fast and of abstinence. The precept of abstinence obliges all who have completed their 7th year, and even those who have passed the age of 60. A person dispensed from abstinence is not thereby dispensed from fasting and vice versa, if he is allowed several needs a day, this does not mean that he need not keep the abstinence. In this, as in other cases, a dispensation obtained under false pretences is invalid.

United States." Men long ago learned that the man who has no case is usually first to raise the cry of danger or alarm. For no other reason than that it may be that their pocketbooks will cease to bulge with the tribute they exact from eight million consumers in Canada. We had some examples of these gentlemen's methods even in war years, and know what to expect. There are industries in Canada today that have not hesitated in their advertising directed to investors to boast of being able to compete with United States manufacturers without protection, though enjoying the highest protection. Is there any justification whatever for protection in cases of this kind?

Mr. King's declaration in favor of downward revision contemplates, first of all, careful inquiry to determine what industries still need protection, what ones do not. Unquestionably there were industries twenty years ago that would never have survived save for the tariff. But the trouble is that these infants want to stay at the bottle when they should be out battling their own way, and getting ahead by their own efforts. LET US GIVE OUR JEWELS.

[Quebec Telegraph.] It has remained for a Canadian in England Lord Beaverbrook, to make a suggestion for aiding the authorities in meeting the pressing demand of the United States to be paid in gold for the dvances made for war purposes to the European Allies in general, and to Great Britain, who financed all the others, in particular. In reply to Mr. Glass, who as secretary of the United States treasury, says to Europe, "Pay America in gold," Lord Beaverbrook urges the British ministry to invite the people to bring their trinkets to the treasury, whether watch chains, necklaces, bracelets, earrings, brooches of the gold plate of the rich. The idea is to have the value of these gold articles appraised by the treas ury department, and to have their place taken by interest-bearing bonds to be handed to the depost tor. The sacrifice thus made for patriotic sentiment would thus materialize as an investment. This is what France did in 1871, and there is apparently no good reason why the same could not be d ne by Britain in 1920. The proceeds from this gold would cancel a good part of Britain's debt to 'te United States, and thus greatly help the country to cope with the crisis in exchange during the tcy ing period of the next twelve or fifteen months Daily Express boldly claims that these gold trinkets alone would suffice to entirely wipe off the American debt and bring the pound sterling to a value of five dollars. Mr. Asquith has already in one of his Paisley speeches spoken approvingly of the proposal as practical politics. Bold and startling the project undoubtedly is, but it is rather a wonder that it was not earlier thought of, for it is intensely effective and patriotic, as one of the London papers has already declared, and as will readily appear if a national crusade, founded upon immediately undertaken and supported by all parties and newspapers. And if Britain does it. there is no reason why Canada should not do it too.

CAUGHNAWAGA. [Exchange.]

She did not have to salvaged, but when repairs were made she rose into her natural element, showed her "heels" to the gull, and bore her weary passengers to safety.



Steam or hot water radiators, unfortunately, do warm the air of apartments even if ventilation is inacequate. Hot air furnaces do not work sausfactorily unless ventilation is fairly

The air inlet of the hot air furnace should be from the outside, never from should be from the outside, never from the cellar or, worse still, from a room of the house. The largest possible volume of outside air should be admitted through the air inlet, consistent with comfort. An air outlet should be provided near the roof. A hot air furnace register which belches forth a scorphing blast is wholly unbyginging. nace register which belches forth a scorching blast is wholly unhygienic; it means that insufficient cold air is being admitted through the air inlet. The registers should give forth warm air, not hot air. The temperature of the room thus warmed should be temperate, not torrid. From 60 to 67 degrees Fahrenheit may be considered a hygienic temperature in a furnace-heated apartment; a higher temperature than that is depressing and unwholesome. Elderly and enfeebled individuals imagine they need more heat; they do, imagine they need more heat; they do, but not from the atmosphere they breathe. Their body warmth should be maintained by additional clothing, though it is well to remember that the

less clothing one wears at any time, consistent with physical comfort, the better for health.

The hot air furnace does dry out the air, but not more than the radiator does. If the apartment is constantly overheated, it is practically impossible to maintain anything like normal to maintain anything like normal humidity in the air by any apparatus available for the private dwelling. But if the temperature is kept below 68 degrees Fahrenheit, a fair approach to proper moisture in the air may be maintained if the water pots of the furnace are large and well filled. It requires something like 75 gallons of water daily, evaporated in the air, to maintain fair humidity in an artificially heated dwelling of average size in cold heated dwelling of average size in cold winter weather. The evaporation of a few gallons of water dally would there-fore make little impression on atmos-

fore make little impression on atmospheric aridity.

As a matter of economy, efficiency and hygiene, let the householder rest assured that the hot air furnace is thoroughly correct. Hot water or steam hearing may be necessary for large buildings or rambling dwellings which cannot be economically warmed with the hot air furnace.





Duncan, B.S.A., writing in the Agricultural Cazette for January states that the following quantities were distributed: 1,890 bushels of potatoes: 422 bushels of grain: 12,575 packages of root seeds; 30,700 packages of flower seeds, and 11,045 dozens of eggs of a bred-to-lay strain of Barred Plymouth Rocks. These figures give some idea of the magnitude of the school fair movement in Ontario.

The first school fair was organized in 1909, with three schools taking part. Ten years later 357 rural school fairs were held in the province, and the pupils had 69,848 home plots and made 111,823 entries. It is estimated that about 250 people saw the first school fair in which 55 pupils took part, while last fall 92,600 children and 107,590 adults attended the school fairs in Ontario.




