ARCHITECT IS PAID IN FULL BEFORE WORK ON HOUSES COMPLETE

Commissioner D. J. Tallant LORD AND LADY
Declares He Will Find Out Who Authorized Payment.

Despite the fact that none of the houses on Pine Lawn and Garfield avenue, in course of construction for the London Housing Commission, are companied to the control of the pleted, according to information tained at the city hall today, Architect McBride has been paid his full commission, amounting to \$4,295, on all these dwellings.

"The houses are not completed until they are turned over to the commission by the contractors, and none of them have been taken over as finished yet," J. W. Cunliffe, chairman of the London Housing Commission, informed The Ad-

vertiser this morning. "I do not see why Architect McBride should have been paid before his work was completed," said D. J. Tallant, a member of the housing commission, who asserts that Mr. McBride received pay-ments in 1920. "I do not know who authorized him to be paid, but I am going to find out."

 Could Have Saved Money.
 Commissioner Taliant produced figures to show that Architect McBride received a 2 per cent commission on building figures for the Pine Lawn houses, total-ing \$143,559.61, and Garfield avenue construction amounting to \$80,509, ag-

gregating \$224,008.61.

"We could have obtained the services of Building Inspector Piper at \$10 per house, totalling \$580 expenses, in contrast to \$4,295. Sacrifice or Compromise, British Empire's Choice

"Now then to our posts and let our swords speak for us."-Sheridan.

Seven years ago today at midnight, by Greenwich time, as one man, the whole manhood of the British Empire uttered as with a single voice the spirit of these words spoken by Rolla to his friend Alonzo in Sheridan's tragedy, "Pizarro."

All day the Empire and the world had watched with close intentness for the reply that German almightiness would give to Britain's declaration that the raping of Belgium would be causus belli. As hour after hour passed the cloud of war darkened, while the dread of uncertainty and the fear of the unknown clutched tighter and tighter at the hearts of men

In this city, where the clocks await the tardy arrival of the sun from the East five hours later than it reaches the heart of the Empire, distance to some degree toned down the intensity of suspense, yet even here the shadow of a great terror was felt, and the dread of impending sorrow marched side by side with business and with pleasure. At every corner, in every business office, at the meal table, in the peace of home, on the street, and in the summer camps, men with bated breath asked:

"What will Britain do if Germany refuses to withdraw from Belgium?" At about 8 o'clock in the evening Canadian wires carried throughout the Dominion the brief message:

"Great Britain has declared war on Germany." A few seconds later the bulletins at the newspaper offices told the story to the waiting throngs in the streets.

For the space of a moment the eager chatter of argument as to Germany's probable answer ceased, and dead silence reigned. Suddenly a voice started the National Anthem, and the prayer, "God Save Our King," rang through the streets, followed by rounds of cheer-

ing, and then a hurried scurrying of feet as the crowd dispersed to carry the news farther afield and to those tied at home. At Victoria Park the band of the Sixth Hussars was in place ready

to commence an announced band concert. The different instruments were being tuned up when the arrival of a messenger boy caused a pause. in the intense silence which followed someone announced the news, another pause, then the band broke into the National Anthem, the large crowd joining in the singing of it. Again cheers marked the close of the Empire's prayer, and the program proceeded, but scant attention was paid to it, the meaning of the great decision overwhelming every other thought.



their forefathers. An account of the journey of the indomitable Le Caron was given by Dean Harris, and at a later stage and listened while the premier of Ontario, Hon. E. C. Caron, discussed the relations existing between the ficulties in regard to meeting




