





Women Are Especially Fitted to Judge Other Women-They Are Not Taken in by a Beautiful Murderess, as Are Men Jurors, Yet They Understand Women's Hearts and Motives as No Man Can.

Mrs. Clarence M. Smith, New York, chairman of the National Women's party, wrote to the attorney-generals in twenty-three states where there are feminine jurors and asked whether women have been successful as



Every answer was favorable. the attorney-generals stating they found that, as a rule, a higher type of juror is obtained from the women than from the men; that women make fewer claims for exemption than men, and that they have better reasons for such claims; that they are no more swayed by their emotions than men are, and that generally women jurors arrived at a more correct verdict in criminal cases than

In refutation of the claim that vomen would decide a case by their hearts instead of their heads, Assistant Attorney Pratt, of Minnesota, cites a murder case he re cently prosecuted where the jury was half men and half women. "The wife of the defendant had

a small baby in court, of which was made," he relates, "and I noticed that the women jurors were sibly affected by the exhibition and that their emotions and sympathies ere strongly engaged. At least two were in tears when they retired, but

ne verdict of guilty was promptly returned." Thus is the woman juror justified, as anybody who knows anything bout women could have told you all along she would be.

For the feminine sex has all the qualities that go to make a good juror-quickness in apprehension and catching a point; keen observation; sympathy tempered by cynicism; undying curiosity; intuition that enables her to guess right nine times out of ten; a personal experience in camouflage that makes her able to see through pretence and tell what is real and what is done for effect and, at least, a fair sense of justice.

Also, every mother of a family has had a daily experience for years in hearing both sides of the quarrels between her children and between her servants, and thus is skilled in settling delicate points of ethics and law.

Of course, in a country in which the very palladium of our liberties is he right to be tried by a jury of our peers there should always have been vomen jurors, because no exclusively man jury is any more capable of inderstanding the reactions of a woman than any jury composed wholly of vomen is capable of probing the motives of a man. Men and women are ever equal. They are always in different classes.

Therefore, in especial, every crime "passionel," as the French say, and very case involving the relationships of men and women, and every case which children are concerned, should be tried before a mixed jury of both

This would alter many verdicts, because an American jury composed entirely of the sterner sex is sentimentally gone to seed when the defendant happens to be a young and pretty woman. All that a murderess has to do is to have large, wistful blue eyes and roll them at the twelve good men and true in the jury box to have them bring in a verdict of "not guilty." No amount of evidence will offset a peaches-and-cream complexion and hair with a natural wave in it, and if the slayer has, in addition, a willowy figure, it makes gunplay a perfectly safe indoor sport for her.

Also any good-looking woman can make a man jury believe that she i e innocent victim in a breach of promise suit, and that she is entitled to oney to heal her hurt heart, or that she has a double personality, and that r good self doesn't know when her bad self shoplifts in a department ore. But no woman could bamboozle another woman with any such flimsy stories, no matter if she were as beautiful as a houri.

Pulchritude would never be any alibi for crime if women vere trying a sister woman. They would know to a nicety just how a coman inveigles a man into popping the question, and they could diagnose to a scratch how hurt such a one's heart was, if the man broke his engagement. They know the lust of clothes that makes a woman steal to get pretty things. But, on the other hand, they would also undersignd the mad despair, the desperation, that sometimes makes a woman slay the man she loves rather than lose him to another; the frantic shame that makes a girl kill her nameless child, and they know that often even a woman who isn't a good woman is a good mother.

But a woman jury would not melt down under a woman's tears into dden mass, as a man jury does, for women can assay a woman's tears. They know when she is weeping because of passionate remorse and a oken heart, and when she is crying for effect and revenue only. They have ed that little game too often themselves to be fooled by it. Moreover, ey would know with an uncanny sureness how much truth a woman was peaking on the witness stand, and whether she did certain things or refrained from doing them.

Certainly, the cause of justice will be served by woman jurors. And more than that, they will set many busy men free who find jury duty a great burden. Indeed, it would be for the good of all concerned if there could be an especial class of women of intelligence, of middle age-women who are wise in the knowledge of life and experience, and who have the leisure to give to it-who could be called to do this service to their country DOROTHY DIX.






