Six Shot Dead and Twenty-Five Injured

IN FIGHT FOR NEGRO PRISONERS

When Smoke Cleared Away 31 Armed Rioters Lay on the Pavements-Four Soldiers Wounded.

Evansville, Ind., July 7. - Six shot dead and 25 injured, four fatally, is the outcome of the race riots that have caused a reign of terror in this city

during the past four days. At 10:30 last night the Evansville company of Indiana National Guards, assisted by 200 special deputy-sheriffs, sworn in during the day, while guarding the county jail, in which were 16 negro prisoners, poured a deadly volley of buckshot and bullets into a crowd of several thousand people. The ratepayers felt that the retaining wall should be constructed by the city out of the general fund, but the aldermen thought otherwise and decided to have the work done only on the condition that it be

added to the cost of the walk. WILL BUY COKE NOW. The shortest clause in the report created the longest talk. It recom-mended that the tender of the City Gas Company be accepted for the supply of 300 to 500 tons of coke for the sewer beds, at \$4 25 a ton, to be delivered immediately. The recommendation met with opposition for the reason that the cost was to be borne by the board of works out of the street appropriation, and in reply to this the supporters of the proposion reminded the council that last year there was a large supply of coke at the beds and that it was drawn to the city and sold to relieve the people during the coal shortage. It was further stated that the proceeds of the sales did not pass into the possession of the board of works, nor was any allwance made by the fire and light committee for it. The recommendation of the committee finally carried, on the casting vote of the mayor. Those who voted for the purchase were Ald. Stevenson, Greenlees, Saunders, Cooper and Wy-



May alone saw a falling off of more than \$8,000 compared with the same month a year ago, and the preceding two months of this year also showed up poorly owing to the uneasiness of existing conditions in local cigar manufacturing circles, it being generally understood at the time that a strike was to take place. ARE EXPLORED

Flinders Petrie Tells of the Results of His Excavations at Abydos.

London, July 6.-Flinders Petrie, the

Egyptologist, has given an account of the season's excavations at Abydos. The clearance of the old temple site, comprising over several acres, revealed in a depth of about 20 feet ten successive temples ranging in age from about 5000 to 500 B. C., enabling the changes from age to age through the whole Egyptian history to be seen at one spot. The separation of these buildings was an affair of anatomy rather than spade work. The mud and brick walls were so commingled with the soil that incessant cutting with a sharp knive was the only way to distinguish the brick work. Often only a single course of bricks or a thin foundation of sand was all that told of the great buildings which had existed for centuries. The main results as regards religion is that Osiris wasn't the original god of Abydos. The most striking change was seen about the fourth dynasty, when the temple was abolished and only a great hearth of burnt offering is found full of votive clay substitutes for sacrifices. This exactly agrees with the account of Herodotus that Cheops had closed the temples and forbidden This materializing of his tory was made a reality by the finding of an ivory statuette of Cheops. It is of the finest work, showing for the first time the face and character of the great builder and organizer who made the Egyptian government and civilization what they were for thous-

There is part of a large globular vase of green glaze with Menes' name inlaid in purple. Thus polichrome glazing is taken back a thousand years before it was previously known to exist. carving, especially a figure of the aged king, which for subtlety of character stands in the first rank. Such work is comparable to the finest work Greece or Italy.

The great fort long known at Shunet ez Zebibis is now connected with the remains. Another fort has been discovered between Shunet and the Coptic Deir, and these buildings prove to have been the fortified residences of the igs of the second dynasty. There are some large decrees of the fifth and sixth dynasties, and also the oldest example of iron yet known, which is of the sixth dynasty.






