## WILL REMOVE THE TRACKS

P. M. R. R. Makes Proposals Re The Nuisances At The Eau

Likely That Agreement will Prove Satisfactory to Harwich Council

Some time ago The Planet published the proposed agreement which the Pere Marquette Railway Company stated they were willing to live up to, with regard to the grievances at the Eau. This agreement was recently taken up by the Harwich Council, who approved of the suggestions therein made, and notified the railway company to that effect. This means that the Eau trouble is practically settled. The railway company have agreed to remove their southern track, which encroaches most upon the highway near the Crawford House. They undertake to remove the railway so that the only track which will encroach upon the highway will be the one along which the scales are located, and this removal, the railway company say, will be made without delay. The other track, which leads to the scales, encroaches only a short distance upon the highway, and the railway people think that the municipality should experience no inconvenience from it, and they undertake to operate the road so as not to create the nuisances heretofore complained of by the residents in that neighborhood. Orders will be given that no fresh coal or new fire shall be put in the engines while weighing cars, and in this way the smoke nuisance will be almost entirely avoided. Weighing at night will be discontinued altogether, and no switching will be done at night, unless absolutely necessary. The verandah or porch at the south of the Bungalow will henceforth be looked upon as part of the public highway. It is understood that these conditions will prove satisfactory to the Harwich Council.

## GIRL MAY SAVE FATHER

Houston, Va., June 26.—The trial of former Judge Loving, charged with the murder of Theodore Estes, was resumed yesterday. After an argument of an hour, Judge Barksdale permitted the defendant, who was on the stand, to relate a conversation with his brother-in-law, Harry Sneed, who told him of the alleged drugging of his daughter which led to the killing.

"This revelation came to me as a thunderbolt from a clear sky," said the defendant. "I loved my daughter and no power on earth could have restrained my hands."

Here the witness wept and several of his relatives also gave way to tears. Continuing Loving said: "In this condition of mind I went out intending to put that man to death. I got my shot gun and drove at once to Lovington. When I got there I called a boy and asked for Estes, but found he was at Oak Bridge. I went to Oak Bridge and I inquired for Estes. I learned that Estes was in a car at the station. I then turned my horse to a livery stable and got out of the buggy and loaded my gun. I saw Estes in the car with two negroes and waved them aside and said to Estes: 'You are the young man who takes ladies out driving and drugs and ruins them'."

"I heard no reply and when he made a motion as if to leave the car I shot him. I then surrendered myself to the nearest magistrate."

He was followed on the stand by Sneed, who corroborated him. Streaming from her eyes, Miss Elizabeth Loving, aged 19, testified of her alleged ruin by the young man, whom her parent shot to death.

Estes, she said, gave her a drink of whiskey from a flask he had in his pocket, while they were out bug-riding on the afternoon prior to his being killed. After taking the drink, she declared that she immediately began to feel dizzy and her head "spun around" as if she had been given some powerful drug. In this condition her escort drove her along an unfrequented road and then abused her.

She realized nothing more until she regained her senses in bed late that night at the home of County Clerk E. L. Kidd. On the following morning she related to her father on bending knees the statement she made yesterday.

The recital, the defence contends, so affected the mind of Judge Loving that he committed a crime which, according to his statement, could have been prevented by no power "except God Almighty."

## JIMMY BURNS GETS SOAKED

Noted Police Court Celebrity Goes To Kingston For Thirty Months

Hit Jaen Sing On Head With Catsup Bottle

Restaurant-keeper Jaen Sing, proprietor of the King street Chinese chop suey house, his head bound up in cotton, and smelling of strong liniments, was again a complainant in the City Police Court this morning. Jaen's sore head was the result of a blow from a catsup bottle in the hands of Jimmy Burns, during a lively mix-up in the eating house last night.

It seems that Burns and a private from the 24th Regiment had some words in the restaurant, which came near ending in a fight. Burns picked up a catsup bottle from the table he was sitting at and made for the door. Jaen Sing feared that a scrap was pending, and ordered Burns out, and when he attempted to give Burns some assistance out of the door, the prisoner turned and dealt him a heavy blow on the head with the bottle, inflicting quite a gash on the Chinaman's scalp.

Burns has quite a long and eventful record in both City and County Police Courts and the authorities have become tired of his promises of reform. He has been up in City Police Court ten times, and his County Police Court record is almost as bad. Crown Attorney H. D. Smith, who prosecuted, drew attention to these facts, and said that Burns had got about all the leniency from the Court in the past that he deserved. He had not profited by the mercy shown him in the past, but had abused it. He could hardly expect to get off with a light sentence.

He was sentenced to two years and six months in Kingston Penitentiary. Burns says he has been following the race track for a living, and that he came up here from Windsor track yesterday. Jimmy Burns is a brother to the famous Jockey, Tommy Burns.

A middle-aged man, who had been too friendly with John Barley-corn, wore the regulation look of penitence when he came before Judge Houston this morning. The celebrant bears a good reputation, and this was his first appearance in Court. He was fined \$1 and costs—\$3.75 in all.

The Judge told him that he had better leave whiskey alone, or he would soon be a nervous wreck. The man made a sincere promise that he would never touch liquor again.

## VOICE FROM THE DEAD

Wilmington, Del., June 26.—As a coffin was being lowered into a grave at a negro funeral near Denton, Md., Sunday, Samuel Johnson, a negro ventriloquist, threw his voice into the opening and said, "Let me down easy." The mourners concluded it was the corpse speaking, and with a scream, they fled. The ball-beaters hurriedly dropped the coffin. Johnson was arrested for disorderly conduct and malicious mischief, and held in jail.

## LOOKS LIKE A MURDER.

Woman Found Hanging In Barn—Evidence of an Assault.

Hamilton, June 26.—Word has just been received here of a tragedy at Benford, a postoffice five miles south of Ancaster. Mrs. John Reinhardt was found dead in the barn by her husband when he returned home on Monday night. The woman was hanging by her neck and had evidently been strangled. From marks on her body it looked as if she might have been assaulted. When Crown Attorney Washington was notified he took charge of the case and ordered an investigation.

## A DOUBLE MURDER

Sudbury, Ont., June 26.—A double murder and suicide took place at Creighton Mine, some 12 miles from Sudbury, on the Manitoulin and North Shore Railway, about 11 o'clock on Saturday night. The victims were John Restula, his wife Sophia Restula, and the latter's paramour, Herman Vick, Jr., all Finlanders. The three bodies were found early Sunday morning on the railway track between three and four hundred yards west of the station, which is at the west end of the village.

Shot Wife First. Apparently Restula had shot his wife first in the back of the head, close to the neck. Vick, who had evidently started to run away, was shot in the back, under the left shoulder blade, and dropped within a few paces. Restula then turned the revolver, a 32-calibre, on himself, firing one shot near the left side of the throat, and another in the left breast. He fell close to his wife and all were found lying face downwards.

Vick Had a Weapon. In Vick's hand was a 32-calibre revolver, but not in very good working order and apparently discovering this fact, he had started to run away. Restula went to work at Crean Hill mine a short time ago, leaving his wife at Copper Cliff. Some two weeks ago she left there and went to Creighton Mine, where she took up with Vick, and they lived in a house at the Gertrude Mine, one and a half miles west of Creighton.

Restula was informed on Friday how his wife had acted, and on Saturday came to Sudbury and purchased a revolver in one of the hardware stores. Before leaving Crean Hill he told his foreman, Frank Anderson, that if he found his wife with Vick there would be some shooting, and he kept his word.

An inquest was held by Coroner Struthers on Monday, and a jury, of which J. C. Kelly was foreman, brought in a verdict in accordance with the facts as given above. Restula was about 25 years of age, and Vick about 23 years.

## IS IN FAVOR OF CHEERFUL FUNERALS

London, June 25.—The Rev. Frederick Spurr, one of the best known Baptist pastors in London, startled the mourners at the funeral of one of the deacons of his church on Thursday by officiating in a gray suit of clothes. When questioned on the subject, the pastor declared himself a believer in cheerful funerals.

"I am heartily sick of the paganism connected with Christian funerals. The deacon was 82 years of age. He had been a good Christian all his life, and died of old age, and so at his funeral I wore a gray suit, and we sang the Easter hymn."

## BANBURY WANTS EXTENSION.

Longer Time For Grant of Dominion to British Columbia.

London, June 25.—In the House of Commons in committee yesterday on the British North America bill, Sir F. Banbury moved as an amendment that the period during which the annual grant of £100,000 is to be made by the Dominion to the province of British Columbia should be extended from ten to thirty years. Banbury was speaking when the House adjourned. Churchill said it was a most disgraceful and flagrant act of obstruction.

## ALWAYS THE GRAFT.

Thirty years ago good old Alexander Mackenzie wrote this to a political friend:

"I would much like to be relieved of the public works department. It is the great spending department; the possible great jobbing department. Friends (I) expect to be benefited by offices they are unfit for, by contracts they are not entitled to, by advances not earned. Enemies ally themselves with friends, and push the friends to the front. Some attempt to storm the office. Some dig trenches at a distance, and approach in regular siege form. I feel like the besieged, lying on my arms night and day. I have offended at least twenty parliamentary supporters by my defense of the civil."

It was graft then and it is graft now. Wherever in Canada there has been a Grit Government, there has been unlimited graft. Things at Ottawa now are much as they were in Mackenzie's time, the only difference being that while Mackenzie stood guard over the public treasury, nobody now thinks it worth while trying to check the grafters. —Hamilton Spectator.

## OUT OF HIS ELEMENT.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice, "got into the wrong paddock," when he entered politics, said the Winnipeg Telegram recently. The saying had truth. In the law courts A. B. Aylesworth was a success. In politics he has been a glaring failure. He took into the House of Commons not the savvy, which should have characterized a new member and a legal gentleman, but an irritable boorishness which finds its only mate in the vicious ill-temper of Frank Oliver. Aylesworth, the parliamentarian, is a long drop from Aylesworth the private practitioner.

In a rural constituency in Ontario the other day the Minister of Justice made a speech that should be emblazoned in the national museum as a warning to future Canadians.

Grafting, the Minister of Justice acknowledged, goes on. It goes on in his own department, as he showed:

"I am acting as Minister of Public Works and only last week I had a case where a man held up the Government, and we were forced to pay fifty per cent. more than its value for a piece of land, but, if we went to law about it, in all probability the lawyers would get the difference, so I concluded to pay the man his price."

Behold the meek and accommodating Aylesworth in his grand act of giving a political hand-out. He gave the hand-out because "the lawyers would get the difference!" What lawyers! The Government has all kinds of lawyers working on yearly salary in the Justice Department of which A. B. Aylesworth is head. It has, also, A. B. Aylesworth himself and Hon. Jacques Bureau, Solicitor-General. Couldn't either of these gentlemen, or the Deputy Minister of Justice—who is an eminent K. C.—or some of the other lawyers in the Department, where they have many other K. C.'s and non-K. C.'s—take the brief and earn their salaries?

Certainly not. The Government is indisposed to fight its own friends.

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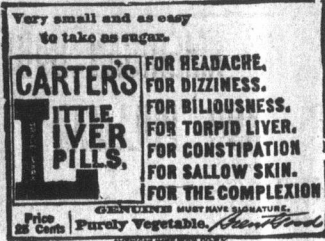

King's Plate on a Journey.

The King's gold plate, which is worth intrinsically more than \$5,000, will make several journeys between Windsor and London this summer, when there will be an exceptional number of state banquets to visiting royalties at Buckingham Palace.

The royal treasure is kept in strong rooms at Windsor Castle behind locks that are regarded as absolutely burglar proof. When the plate is removed to London, it is packed in express wagons, bearing the royal cipher, and guarded by a number of detectives.

These walk unobtrusively on each side of the wagons, and to the casual observer the wagons are in charge of the drivers only. ## IRISH HATE THE ENGLISH

Redmond Declares They Are as Much Rebels as in 1798.

English Rule Is Still Detested—Spirit of Their Forefathers Still Exists—Hurled Defiance at British Statesmen—To Use Force In Securing Home Rule—Question of Expediency When They Will Strike.

Dublin, June 25.—John E. Redmond delivered an address at Wexford Sunday at the ceremony attending the unveiling of a memorial to Wexfordians who fell at the battle of New Ross in 1798.

He gave a defiant warning to British statesmen, saying:

"We tell England that we hate her rule as bitterly as did our forefathers when they shed their blood on this spot."

"We tell her that we are as much rebels to her rule to-day as our forefathers were in '98."

"We tell her that she can change that hatred only by granting freedom, and so long as she withholds freedom, it will remain merely a question of expediency how and by what means we will strike at the power that holds our country in bondage."

Dublin, June 25.—Charles J. Dolan, member of the House of Commons for Leitrim, North, has now decided to resign his seat in the House and appeal to his constituents for re-election.

Mr. Dolan at a recent meeting of the National Directory of the United Irish League, supported resolutions calling upon the Irish members of Parliament to resign. These resolutions were defeated, and later Mr. Dolan wrote to the senior whip, severing his connection with the Irish party, but declined to resign his seat.

### BUSY WHILE IN JAIL.

Mayor Schmitz Vetoes Appropriation of \$720,000 and Refuses Tax Levy.

San Francisco, June 25.—The Appellate Court has taken Mayor Schmitz's application for a writ of habeas corpus and bail under advisement.

Chief of Police Dinan and Acting Mayor Gallagher have clashed. Gallagher had signed, as mayor of San Francisco, a permit for a number of boxing bouts. Dinan refused to recognize the permit and would not allow the doors to open or the crowd to enter the place until the promoters of the fight got another permit signed by Mayor Schmitz.

From his cell in the jail Schmitz returned to the board of supervisors the municipal budget and a message vetoing the appropriation of \$720,000 for the reconstruction of the Gery street railroad.

Mayor Schmitz also objected to a special tax of 20 cents to raise revenue for the city government.

### ALASKA'S BIG BEARS.

Are the Finest Flesh Eating Animals in the World.

Very few persons really know that the largest flesh eating animals in the world are found in America. People generally believe that the African lion is the king of beasts, but he is not nearly as large or as powerful as an animal as the large brown bear of subarctic America. The bears are not as ferocious or combative as the lions, nor are they nearly as vicious as they are given credit for being; but the largest of them are much larger and more powerful than any of the lions. It is safe to say that the largest of the brown bears of the North would weigh three times as much as the largest specimen of lion, and is beyond all question greatly superior in strength. If brought together in combat, the bear would at first appear very clumsy, says Scribner's Magazine. It would not be capable of the quick rush or the catlike spring of the lion. It would not attack, but would remain entirely on the defensive, meeting its adversary with blows of such rapidity and terrific force as at once to illustrate its superiority not only in strength but in action. I do not believe that there is an animal in the world that can act more quickly or effectively or can aim its blows with greater certainty than the bear. The large brown bears of the Alaska peninsula, south of Behring Sea, are among the largest bears of the world, and it is evident that there is no part of the world outside of America in which such large flesh eating animals are found. The bears are flesh eaters, or carnivorous, yet there are none of them that depend upon flesh for food, and with most of them flesh comprises but a very small percentage of their food.

### DOCTOR'S WIFE SUICIDES.

Swallows Morphine Tablets Owing to Domestic Troubles.

Brockville, June 22.—Mrs. Sadie Mulholland, wife of Dr. W. Mulholland of Havelton, committed suicide by swallowing morphine tablets. The woman's act is thought to have been due to domestic troubles.

The couple had disagreed, and the doctor took their child to the home of his parents in Massena. It was during his absence that she took the fatal dose. Some hours later she was found in an unconscious condition, and soon afterwards died.

### BLEW HIS CLOTHING OFF.

Powder Explodes But Man Was Only Slightly Injured.

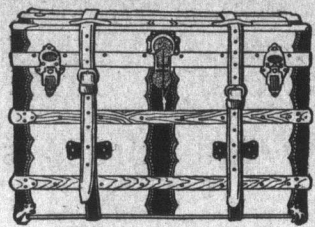

### SMALLPOX IS PREVALENT.

Serious Situation in Leeds and Grenville Counties, Ontario.

Dr. R. W. Bell, inspector of the Ontario Provincial Board of Health, who has returned from a visit to sections of Leeds and Grenville counties—the third visit made within a recent period—reports a serious condition of affairs in regard to smallpox. This is particularly true of Matilda and Edwardsburg townships, in Grenville, and around the village of Athens, the township of Bastard and Malorytown and vicinity, Leeds county. There has been and still is a large number of cases of the disease which has spread because of neglect. In some sections the disease has been allowed to make way for the past two or three months without apparently the slightest attempt to check it. It has possibly been mistaken for chickenpox in some instances, the doctor thinks, but in others information of the condition of affairs has been suppressed with the idea of preventing business losses in the localities. There has been little or no quarantine and an almost total disregard of disinfection. Not only recovered patients but members of their families who have been exposed to the disease have been allowed to go to school or work all the time. While in a majority of the cases the disease is of a mild type, there are some very severe cases in the county of Grenville, the doctor says. An unfortunate feature of the outbreak is that one or two local doctors are making light of it, and the people are taking their cue from them. In the places which he visited on previous trips Dr. Bell he found that the necessary precautions were being taken.

### Sailor Signs and Tokens.

There is a general idea that the sailor labors under more than one pet superstition popular tradition assigns to each individual, says a writer in The Youth's Companion, but those who know him best declare that "lars who go down to the sea in ships" are no more superstitious than any of their equals in training and opportunities.

In the past superstition was a part of every ship; it entered into its keel, climbed to its flags, ran at its launching, controlled its crew and cargo, evoked portents and governed its ventures and arrivals. A bit of stolen wood was always mortised into the keel to make a ship sail fast. A silver coin was placed in the mainmast step to insure lucky ventures. The modern christening by the wine bottle arose from the ancient libations poured on the deck by priests.

On a sailing ship lawyers, women and the clergy are looked upon with disfavor, as they are supposed to bring ill luck. Every black cat that comes on board "carries a gale in her tail." Whistling is much against the prophecies of sea life. If one whistles for a breeze he is only too apt to bring a tornado. Ship bells are blessed, and to this day if a mistake is made in striking one it is immediately struck backward to break the spell.

The belief in the desertion of a sinking ship by rats is founded on reason, for rats like to be dry footed, and when a vessel is unsafe it becomes leaky under deck and too wet for the creatures' comfort. Between three and four hundred shots were exchanged with the moonshiners in the darkness.

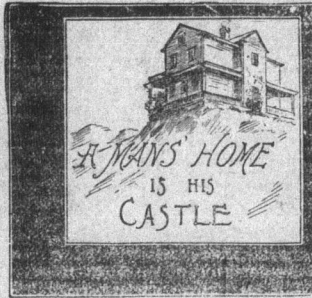

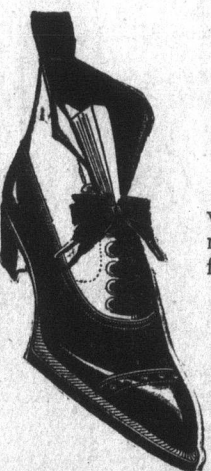

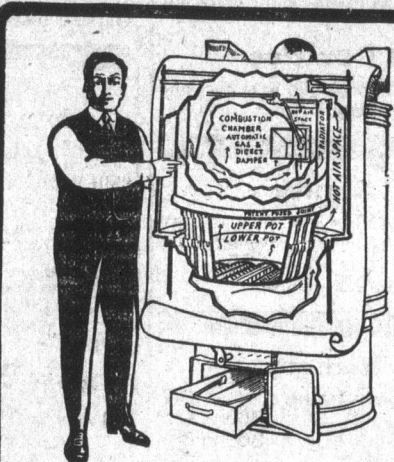

One of the men injured is in a serious condition, but will recover. The other two were only slightly hurt. Several hundred dollars in property damage was done. Ouimet was a young, unmarried man.

## CALLS IT BLUFF ACTION

Crown Pleads For Further Delay  
in Emmerson Case

Crockett's Counsel Makes Vigorous Protest—Says Crown Has No Real Intention of Going On—Judge Landry Again Adjourns—Refuse Reference to Supreme Court, But Grants Reserve Case.

Fredericton, N.B., June 25.—Decision was rendered yesterday on one count against the Emmerson forces in the prosecution of Mr. Crockett, but the crown had more obstacles to prevent the progress of the trial. Judge Landry refused to refer the question raised in the demurrer to the supreme court of New Brunswick, as the crown had requested him to do, but J. H. Barry, K.C., of Fredericton, had another application ready for reserved case. This the court granted, and then the question arose as to whether the trial should proceed before a decision was obtained on the reserved case.

"The practice," said the judge, "of referring to the court important questions arising on circuits might lead to abuse, and to much unnecessary and vexatious delay. Each time such a practice would be invoked and allowed the proceedings at circuits would have to be stopped and put off to another circuit, and one can readily see how often recourse would be had to such a practice if once established."

Judge Landry adjourned proceedings until this morning.

Mr. Barry then moved for adjournment of the trial of the indictment. "I might point out," said he, "that while we have day after day against the plea, there is on the record the denial of all the statements of fact. The question of fact has yet to be tried. Where questions of law and fact occur in the same case, questions of law are always decided first."

**Will Not Make Reference.**  
To Mr. Hazen's objections, Judge Landry replied: "Does it not seem very evident," he said, "that you can't go on? If the crown says we are ready you would have to apply for an adjournment to get your witnesses."

"We make no such application," replied Mr. Hazen. "We can send for our witnesses."

"Because of the action of the crown we ask you to dismiss this application as our absolute legal right. My learned friend's sole ground is the reserved case. It is not sufficient."

Mr. Hazen, insisting that his client, Mr. Crockett, was entitled to a speedy trial, grew indignant at the continued delay.

"I say boldly," he declared, "and knowing it to be true, that from first to the last there has been no bona fide intention of the crown to go on. The defence, because of Mr. Pugsley's intimation on Friday, had no witnesses in court yesterday, although all of Mr. Crockett's counsel were there. The crown attorney was not present in court, nor Mr. Emmerson himself, who apparently confident of adjournment, has left for Toronto."

**LOCAL OPTION IN OWEN SOUND.**  
Supreme Court Upholds Decision and Bylaw Stands.

Ottawa, June 25.—In the Supreme Court yesterday judgment was given in the case of Sinclair v. Owen Sound, the appeal being dismissed with costs. This was a case affecting a local option bylaw in the town of Owen Sound. Judge Mabee quashed the bylaw. His judgment was reversed by the Exchequer Division, which decision was affirmed by the Court of Appeal. The Supreme Court has dismissed the appeal and affirmed the decision of the Court of Appeal.

**FATAL FOOTBALL INJURY.**

Victim Said Blow Was Accident and Refused Name.

New York, June 25.—Matthew J. Burke died in a hospital in Long Island City yesterday of injuries received Saturday last in a football game. In a scrimmage he was struck over the kidneys and died of the resulting hemorrhage.

He insisted that the blow was an accident and refused to give the name of the man with whom he came in contact.

**Trial a Week Hence.**

Belleville, June 25.—Dorland Foote, the young self-confessed firebug who started a fire in the Queen's Hotel stables, No. 1 firehall and the Jenkins & Sons' stable, was up before the magistrate yesterday morning, and his case was enlarged for another week.

The girl, Amy Babcock, who Dorland says, incited him to commit arson, also had her case enlarged.

**Young Lad Resuscitated.**

Ottawa, June 25.—The value of the school training given in the physiology was strongly evidenced when George Turcotte, a 12-year-old lad, was resuscitated by intelligent efforts of a few boys, after he had been rescued from the Rideau Canal and brought on shore in an unconscious condition.

**Found Dead On Prairie.**

Winnipeg, Man., June 25.—Robert Harwood, pianist, was found dead on the prairie near Freeman's Lake, Harwood, who was a native of England, was a cocaine fiend and a heavy drinker. A previous musician at the same resort was found dead on the prairie about a year ago in a similar manner.

**Ship Wrecked.**

Santiago, Chile, June 25.—The Pacific Steam Navigation Co.'s coasting steamer, Santiago, a vessel of 1,366 tons, trading between Panama and the south coast of South America, has been wrecked fifty miles north of Corral.

One passenger and one officer were saved.

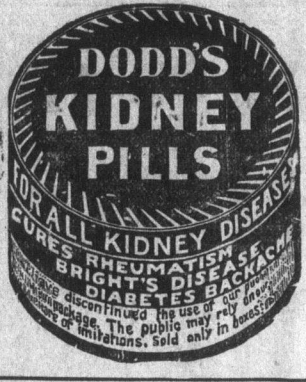

## HAYWOOD DEFENCE BEGINS.

**Counsel Darrow Tells of Founding of Miners' Federation**

Boise, Idaho, June 25.—The largest crowd of the Haywood trial attended the defence yesterday morning. Promptly at 10 o'clock Sheriff Hodgins called for order, the doors were closed and Charles S. Darrow began the opening statement.

"Haywood's wife and daughter were present and his mother was in her usual place at his side. Mr. Darrow took a friendly attitude with the jurors, standing close to them, with hands in his pockets and opening his argument in conventional tones.

"You have heard the evidence and the theory of the state," he said. "It is now our story. This case, like everything else, has had two sides. Nominally Haywood is charged with the murder of Governor Steunenberg. The state has gone into a wide field to show its case. Mr. Hawley told you the Western Federation of Miners from its inception was a terrible conspiracy to kill, to control politics, to gather money to hire lawyers, and other criminal purposes."

"Mr. Darrow related the history of the Western Federation of Miners, telling the jury the organization was born in the jail beneath where they sat, and that James H. Hawley was the godfather and first attorney of the Western Federation of Miners."

Mr. Hawley continued their attorney for a long time. If there was anything criminal in their appropriating money for a lawyer, the miners did not know it.

"The federation is an industrial, not a murderous organization," he characterized Orchard.

Mr. Darrow characterized Orchard during his address as follows:

"Harry Orchard was a cheap soldier of fortune, a shoe-string gambler who had never done a day's work in his life. He owned a sixteenth share of the Hercules mine, but sold it because of his needs and continued his gambling."

"We will show that he did not participate in most of the crimes, of which he has here boasted. I don't like to take any of the bloom off a peach like that, but while we will show he is not the murderer he boasts himself, we will compensate him by proving him to be the most monumental liar that ever existed."

"If Orchard to-day held his one-sixteenth interest in the Hercules mine he would be worth half a million dollars, but I think he would rather have what he has got, because it is more valuable to the newspapers."

**CHINA ACCEPTS RED CROSS.**

**When Assured That It Has No Religious Significance.**

The Hague, June 25.—The third committee of the international peace conference met yesterday in the Hall of Knights, behind closed doors. The sub-committee was divided into two sub-committees. The program of the first sub-committee includes the questions of the bombardment of harbors, etc., the laying of mines and torpedoes, and the adoption of the red cross in sea war. The second sub-committee will discuss the treatment of belligerent ships in neutral harbors, etc.

After Gen. Porter (United States), and the German delegate, Dr. Krieger, had presented propositions regarding the adoption of the red cross in sea war, Sir Ernest M. Satow (Great Britain) reserved the right to present a proposition referring to the use of torpedoes.

The Chinese delegation stated officially that they would accept the red cross after explanations had been received showing that the cross is merely the Swiss coat of arms and not a religious emblem.

Turkhan Pacha declared that Turkey, instead of the red cross, would maintain the red crescent.

An official communication issued yesterday says "Russia has not presented a proposition regarding the opening of hostilities. She merely supported a proposition to that effect."

## SERVIAN WEDDINGS.

**The Bride Collects the Gifts, Which Must Be in Money.**

If you receive an invitation to a wedding in Little Serbia on the west side, you must not buy a present and take it with you or send it. That would be bad form, and the bride would probably feel insulted, but when you want to the wedding you would take with you the price of the present in money.

At the wedding you would find several hundred men and women all making strange motions and talking in a strange, excited manner.

After the guests had assembled—and everybody in the colony would be welcomed—a young woman would pass around the wedding cake. Behind her would come the bride carrying a silver platter, and upon this she would collect the money given as presents. At the majority of weddings the platter is piled high with silver dollars, and around the edges are bills of various denominations, from \$5 to \$20. It is not uncommon for a bride to receive \$1,000 in cash. This amount, it must be remembered, is given by men who are mostly laborers in the packing houses.

Sometimes the groom passes cigars, and every guest will take a cigar and hand him a dollar. Another custom is to place a dollar in the large glass of whisky and every man take a drink, each drink costing a dollar.

These weddings are a great feast for the guest, and there is always plenty to eat, and sometimes the groom rents a hall where all may dance.

## STOP PELAGIC SEALING.

**Japan Complies With Request Pending Result of Conference.**

Ottawa, June 25.—The Government has advised that the Japanese Government ordered a suspension of pelagic sealing in the neighborhood of Robben Bank, a noted sealing ground off the coast of Saghalien Island, which was formerly held by Russia.

The rookery the only one held by the Japanese, passed into possession of the Mikado's Government as part of the spoils of war.

This action is in compliance with the proposal of the United States Government to suspend sealing in that region until some agreement is concluded in the forthcoming conference at Washington of Great Britain, the United States and Russia regarding pelagic sealing in Behring Sea.

The prohibition of sealing off Robben Bank, which the Japanese have renamed Seal Island, will have the effect of diverting the large fleet of schooners to Behring Sea and Copper Islands sealing grounds.

## ANTI-MILITARISTS FIRM.

**Defy Law and Insist On Continuing Propaganda.**

Paris, June 25.—The trial of ten anti-militarists, who signed the manifesto which was placed on the walls of Paris on May 1, appealing to the soldiers to join the workmen and fight against capital, began here yesterday, with Gustave Pere as principal counsel for the defence.

When interrogated, the accused maintained a defiant attitude, lauding the mutineers of the 17th Regiment, at Agde, and affirming their determinations to continue the anti-military propaganda.

## BANDIT CHIEF IS BUSY.

**Is Destroying Villages and Waging War in Northern Persia.**

St. Petersburg, June 25.—A special despatch from Teheran, Persia, says the situation in the northern part of Azerbaijan Province is becoming serious. The bandit chief, Martuz Khuli Khan, assisted by Kurds, is waging war on the population and destroying villages. Constant fighting is occurring in Mazen, 132 miles from Tabriz. The commander of Persian troops, with six field guns, are being despatched to Makn from Tabriz.

## Murderer Electrocuted.

New York, June 25.—John Johnson, a wife murderer, was put to death in the electrical chair in Sing Sing Prison early yesterday. The jail officials pronounce the electrocution a successful one. Only two contacts were given. Johnson murdered his wife, Catherine, in Yonkers, two years ago, in the presence of their two young children. He had been an ex-convict, had treated his wife badly and shot her when she threatened to leave him.

## Three Distinct Tornadoes.

Medicine Lodge, Kans., June 25.—Three distinct tornadoes struck Medicine Lodge late Sunday night, destroying 25 houses in the northern part of the town. Six persons were injured seriously and one is missing.

## MUTINOUS TROOPS REMOVED.

**Marched to Train and Sent to Secret Destination.**

Beziers, France, June 25.—The mutinous soldiers of the Seventeenth Infantry have been transferred from Agde without notice. Three other regiments quietly marched into that town yesterday, surrounded the barracks and escorted the mutineers to a train, in which they were loaded. A large number of the mutineers came to Beziers without permission, and were arrested on their return. The destination of the mutineers is kept secret, but it is believed to be Briançon, in the Department of Hautes Alpes, far from the scene of their insubordination.

## An Incipient Mutiny.

Paris, June 25.—A delegation from Nimes visited Premier Clemenceau yesterday and pleaded for the release of M. Ferroul, ex-mayor of Marbonne, and the imprisoned members of the committee of Argeliers and the quashing of the proceedings against the resigned mayors and others members of the municipalities.

Clemenceau replied that the Government would show clemency at the proper time.

An incipient mutiny occurred yesterday at the barracks of Avignon, fifty miles from Marseilles. Some soldiers hissed Col. St. James and sang a revolutionary song, forcing the colonel to retire. Later Lieut. Col. Dalbès addressed the men and restored order.

## FOR HIS DAUGHTER'S HONOR.

**Father Takes Vengeance For Supposed Outrage.**

Houston, Va., June 25.—The trial of former Judge W. G. Loving, of Nelson County, for the murder of Theodore Estes, son of Sheriff M. R. Estes, of Nelson County, began in the Circuit Court here yesterday. Judge Barkdale presided.

Judge Loving, armed with a double-barrelled shotgun, instantly killed young Estes, while he was unloading a car of fertilizer in Oak Ridge, on April 22. The shooting was the sequel to the buggy ride taken on the evening prior to the homicide, by young Estes and Miss Elizabeth Loving, the 19-year-old daughter of Judge Loving. The girl, when brought home, had been drinking, and it is alleged that her escort had maltreated her. Acting under the impulse that his daughter had been drugged and assaulted, Judge Loving immediately went in search of Estes. After the shooting he said: "I shot to kill. Every drop of blood in my body called for vengeance. I would have gone a hundred miles to kill him."

The plea of the defence will be emotional insanity and the "unwritten law." The relatives of young Estes, whose family connections extend to the Governor of this State, will exert every effort to clear the memory of the dead man from any stain of wrong doing.

### FIGHT DUEL WITH WHITE HOT IRON

A Pittsburg despatch says: As one result of a trifling joke two men fought here the worst duel in or out of the code, the duel with white-hot iron bars. They were Louis Yurick and Adam Bulick. They fought in the Twenty-ninth street mills of the Carnegie Steel Company.

The duel followed close on the practical joke. Saturday morning, after the night's work, Yurick threw himself down on a bench in front of his furnace. He was soon fast asleep. In a spirit of fun, Bulick, who found him there, took Yurick's shoes and hid them. When Yurick awoke he was in bad humor. He accused Bulick of having taken his shoes and Bulick admitted it. Yurick instantly seized a cold bar from the floor, and started after the joker. Bulick seized another and defended himself, blow for blow. Both men had formerly been cavalry soldiers in the United States army and both were expert fencers. The blows that landed were of slashing kind and were painful. Yurick became infuriated as a result, and leaping to the furnace, pulled out a white-hot bar.

Before he could attack Bulick that man also pulled one of the bars out of the furnace and rushed on Yurick. The original assailant, now on the offensive, turned viciously and swung the eight-foot bar in a circle about him. Bulick had to fall back to avoid him, and the crowd of workmen that had been drawn by the combat, fell back, too. Had the weapon been of sword or battleaxe the men might have chanced a rush on Yurick. With the white-hot iron circling him, however, it seemed like courting death for every one concerned to attempt to seize him. The crowd left a ring for the combatants, and Bulick, advancing with his bar, forced Yurick into direct combat. In a second they were handling the bars like two-handed Japanese swords.

Each time the bars came together there was a shower of sparks, and each time one of the bars touched the opposing fencer there was an odor of burned flesh. For fully fifteen minutes the men fenced. The bars slowly cooled as the men's strength waned, but were still red hot when the two finally fell from exhaustion. Each man had many severe scars when the battle ended. A patrol wagon was hurriedly called and both men were taken to the jail hospital. They were charged with assault and battery.
