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


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
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


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ECLIPSES FOR 1911.

II. An Annuiar Eclipse of the Sun October 21st, invisible here, but visible to the greater part of Asia, Australia, and portions of the Pacifio and Indian Oceans adjacent thereto.

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GRPORAL TOM KING of the Royal Marines spun a fine yarn nine years ago on the Esplanade at Portsmouth, England, to a couple of landsmen—a bank clerk and a man who did nothing but think and smoke. The Corporal had been away for three years, fighting savage blacks on the West Coast of Africa, and semi-civilized Mohammedans on the East Coast. Then he had come home invalided, but was one, more in the pink of health and "fit for a fight, a frolic or a footrace." Of course he had to cut down his story a good deal, but, as he said, to start with, "It is not romance, it is history, and what I am telling you is borne out by the Government records. We took part in three small wars with the natives—The Brass River Expedition, the Mwelè affair, and the Benin Expedition to the 'City of Blood.' That was all on the West Coast. Besides this we bombarded and captured Zanzibar, on the East Coast."

But the Corporal Tom King, of nine years ago, is the Sergeant Tom King of to-day. He has been promoted for duty well done for his good service and experience. When he first went away to Africa, about sixteen years ago, he was on the first class cruiser "St. George," flagship on the South African station. She sailed from Portsmouth in November, 1894, and left Simon's Bay about the 1st of January following, to run up the West Coast. Now listen to the Corporal:—

"At a place called Brass River, we heard that a tribe of Brass men, under King Koko, had looted a native town called Akassa, near the mouth of the River Niger, and captured 16 Kroo boys and two English telegraph clerks.

"We were ordered to punish the beggars, and the gunboats 'Widgeon' and 'Thrush' took us on board. We went up the Brass River a bit, but found the water very shallow, so we took to the steam launches, the cutter and pinnace. By and by we came to a small stockaded island and just around the point there was a regular little navy of small war canoes, full of savages and waiting for us.

"What a row they made, yelling, beating tom-toms and blowing on horns, thinking it would scare us off! Then we gave them a little 'civilized musie' from some six-pound and three-pound shot and a few volleys from our small Maxim machine guns. All that were not killed or wounded went paddling off like water rats up a small creek.

"However, we went after the Brass men again in the cutter and pinnace and found them at their stronghold, Nimbi, further up the river. We were towed by the stcam launches, and the enemy opened fire on us from the swamps on our starboard side. Although we gave 'em some more medicine from our machine guns, it was our war-rockets, which made a most unearthly hissing, howling noise that fairly demoralised the niggers.

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"Then we were quiet along the coast for a few months, from March till July, 1895, when there was some trouble with the Mwelè natives and we punished them a bit. This expedition lasted nearly a whole month. After that we went down to Simon's Town again and refitte 4.

"There was not much doing after that till August 26th, 1896, when, up on the East Coast, 've bombarded Zanzibar. The old Sultan—his name was Said-Hamid-Bin-Thwain—hac' died a suspicious death, and his nephew. Said Khalid, who had mounted the throne, was encouraging the slave trade an I making profit out of it. He was impudent when he was urged to give up the traffie, and Admiral Sir Harry Rawson sent word to this Sultan that if his flag was flying at nine o'clock next morning the Palace would be blown to smithereens.

"Next day the flag was still there and the Admiral landed a party and opened the ball with an attack by the Marines. The Sultan's troops trie '*o squirt vitriol into our frees with syringes from the verandah of the Palace, so the ships were ordered to prepare for action. A few rounds of solid shot did the business. The native women and children ran all over the place shrieking, the walls of the Palace gaped with holes, the flag staff was shot away and Sultan Khalid, and his chief officers, trying to escape, were all bagged by a squad of Marines.

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he he le. ne "We took possession of the ruined Palace and City—and what a sight it was. About 700 of the Zanzibaris, soldiers and eivilians, men, women, and children, had been killed or wounded. The Palace walls were riddled with cannon shot, and the harem and guard house, or royal barracks, were smoking ruins. Marines and seamen were placed on duty everywhere to guard property and put out the fires.

"The worst part of our service on that African Commission was the famous Benin expedition in the Spring of 1897. Again the fleet assembled at the Brass River and then moved along the coast to Forcados. On February 8th the small vessels started up the Benin River to Warigi, 55 miles, where a base of supplies had been formed. The river was very picturesque, narrow and crooked, with heavy forests all along the banks. No enemy to be seen. We landed on the North bank and marched through the woods to Ceri and Ologbo. Here the fighting began, but we shelled the blacks in the woods and they scampered; but all the way up to Benin, the 'City of Blood,' there was fighting after that.

"On the way we came across places where they had nailed or hung up to trees the bodies of black prisoners. It was said that some of these were offered as 'snerifices,' to stop our advance. The places looked like shambles. In the course of the fighting they killed two of our commissioned officers and several men and wounded some others and for that we simply sailed in and bayonetted a lot of savages.

"We captured and destroyed their chief city, Benin, the 'City of Blood,' and there we saw more of their 'human sacrifices,' but it is not pleasant to think of or to talk about. On February 22nd we began the return march to Warigi and very glad we were to be leaving the infernal country. It was hot, feverish and unhealthy. We were always defending ourselves against the mosquitoes and other nasty vermin. They crawled over us while we were trying to sleep and the dew was so heavy that we could wring it out of our blankets in the mornings.

"When we had been out to sea again only four days I was struck down with a nasty malarial fever. In fact our decks were pretty well crowded with our own mcn, all down with fever. For 14 days all I had was lime juice and condensed milk. When we got back to Simon's Town I went into hospital, and six weeks afterwards I was invalided home. On the way home my chum, another invalid, and I used to talk about the good square meals we would have in dear Old England.




