

COAL MINES



OAL WAS discovered in the Province of British Columbia in the year 1835 at Suquash on the Pacific Slope; and very shortly afterwards, through information given to the Hudson's Bay Co. by the Indians, at Nanaimo and Ladysmith. The Douglas seam at Nanaimo was discovered in the year 1850 and from this small beginning the industry has developed till we have the Canadian Western Fuel Co. operating Number One, Protection, Reserve and Harewood Mines, and also a new mine. which they have recently opened up on Wakesiah Farm. The Granby Consolidated operating a new mine at Cassidy, which is one of the most up to date mines today, having fine bath house with showers all ready for the men as soon as they come up from their work; first-class boarding house and a dining room fit for any hotel. The site is all laid out with nice boulevards, and the most modern cottages and bungalows. Closely adjoining these is a fine sports ground, where many exciting games of baseball are pulled off. The Grant Mine is another new mine which has great possibilities ahead of it, being only in its infancy as yet, and at the present time putting out about 100 tons a day. In addition to these, Cumberland, South Wellington. Extension and Jingle Pot mines are still going strong.



LUMBERING

O F THE many representative industries on Vancouver Island. none is more worthy of special mention than the Ladysmith Lumber Co. Ltd. 

FISHING

T HE Salmon Pack of British Columbia for the 1919 season amounted to 1.323.156 cases, valued at more than \$15,000,000, of which Vancouver Island's share was 276,519 cases, the Nanaimo Can. & Pack. Ltd. contributing 7,676 cases. The fishing grounds on the East coast run from Chemainus to Oyster River and on the West coast from Barclay Sound to Nitinat. Any fisherman, who enjoys trolling, can get all the sport he wants around our pretty harbor, between the months of May and October.




PORT ALBERNI ^{AND} SPROAT LAKE

I N THE way of scenic beauty Port Alberni is delightfully blessed. Situated as it is at the head of the Alberni Canal, which here broadens out into a beautiful land-locked harbor, and on ground which slopes gently from the edge of the water, the site is one such as is possessed by few citles in the world.

Five miles from Port Alberni is the famous Sproat Lake. This beautiful lake may well be called the Lucerne of Vancouver Island-it resembles the Swiss lake in many ways. The great majority of the lakes in British Columbia occupy depressions or excavations in a single line of valley. This is not the case with Sproat Lake, which branches from a central point, sending out four arms like a star-fish, occupying four distinct valleys, exactly as does Lake Lucerne. The western arms are bounded by rocky and often precipitous shores, rising up to high mountains, on which the snow stays till late in summer. Some of them are purple with heather towards their summits. whilst others are red with the rust of decomposing minerals.

The view of the Lake is a scene not readily forgotten. Looking through the trees, this sheet of water appears as a mirror reflecting the dark hills behind, to which the fleecy morning mists adds another element to the charm of the scenery. Then behind one hears the roar of the falls as the lake finds an outlet in a series of dashing cascades to the Somass River below. The lake also has many charms fo, the sportsman; wild geese and duck frequent its marshes; blue and willow grouse are plentiful: there are great numbers of black tailed deer, whilst wapiti, panther and black bear roam the vast forest recesses to the north west. Speckled trout abound in the lake and rivers. and many a delightful evening can be spent loading up a basket with shining beauties.






