When He was six years old, Jesus would probably go with the other boys to the village school at Nazareth, sitting as they did on the floor, and hearing the instructions of some wise Rabbi or teacher from the synagogue. Here the whole time would be spent in the study of the Bible, and He learned, not only to read it in the difficult Hebrew

gathered their party together and, supposing that Jesus was with them, set out for home. When they had gone about a day's journey, they missed their boy, and thinking He must be with some of their friends, they began to search for Him. But He was nowhere to be found. In great trouble they returned to Jerusalem seeking for Jesus, and after three days they found Him sitting on the temple terraces, hearing and asking questions of the doctors or learned men, who at feast times sat here and instructed the people.

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And all who heard Him were astonished at His good understanding and answers; but Mary began to reprove Him for the anxiety Joseph and she had had for Him. Then Jesus answered, "How could you be troubled about Me? Did you not know that I would be in My Father's house?" From this time Mary knew that her son was no ordinary child. And He went home with them at once, and continued to obey His parents in all things, learning from Joseph the trade of a carpenter. Every day the child Jesus grew taller and wiser, and because the Spirit of God was upon Him, every one who knew Him loved Him.

The Preaching of John the Baptist

Lesson II. THE PREACHING OF JOHN THE BAPTIST Jan. 10, 1904

Matt. 3:1-12. Compare Mark 1:1-8; Luke 3:1-18—Memory Verses, 4-6. Golden Tert-Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.—Matt. 3:2.



1 In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judæ'a.

2 And saying, Repent ye : for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.

3 For this is he that was spoken of by the prophet Eavias, saying, The voice of one crying in the wilderness, Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.

4 And the same John had his raiment of camel's hair, and a leathern girdle about his loins: and his meat was locusts and wild honey.

5 Then went out to him Jeru'salem, and all Judæ'a, and all the region round about Jor'dan.

6 And were baptized of him in Jor'dan, confessing their sins.

7 But when he saw many of the Phar'isees and Sadd'ucces come to his baptism, he said unto them, O generation of vipers, who hath warned you to flee from the wrath to come?

8 Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance:

9 And think not to say within yourselves, We have A'braham to our father : for I say

unto you, that God is able of these stones to raise up children unto A'braham. 10 And now also the ax is laid unto the root of the trees : therefore every tree which bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire.

11 I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance: but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear : he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost, and with fire :

12 Whose fan is in his hand, and he will throughly purge his floor, and gather his wheat into the garner; but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire.

THE LESSON RETOLD

In Eastern countries, when a king went on a journey, heralds or forerunners were sent before the royal chariot, to tell the people who was coming and to see that the roads were safely mended and kept clean. Hundreds of years before Christ came, the prophet Isaiah had foretold that in the same way the hearts of the people should be prepared for the coming of Jesus the Messiah. The man whom God chose for this work was John the Baptist.

While Jesus had been growing up in Nazareth, John had been living in the wilderness of Judæa, preparing himself by much prayer and self-denial to be God's messenger to the people of Israel. Like the prophets of old, he wore a long coat of camel's hair, tied at the waist with a belt of skin, while his food was that of the poorest people of the desert, locusts and wild honey. When John was about th'rty years old he began to preach, not in the towns and cities, but in the wild country round the river Jordan. Here the people from Jerusalem and all places near by crowded to hear his strange message "Repent! Give up your sins! The kingdom of heaven is at hand." Soon, in spite of the great wickedness of both rulers and people at this time, thousands of persons turned from their sins through the preaching of John, and as a sign that they wished to belong to God, were baptized by him in the Jordan.

When the haughty scribes and Pharisees saw the people flocking to hear the new teacher, they also came, asking to be baptized. But John openly rebuked them saying, "Go and prove by your good works that you are the children of God. For, unless you change your evil ways, God will

surely cast you off, though you be the very_ descendants of Abraham," "The time is near," said John, "when a difference must be made between those who obey God and those who do not. As the gardener with his axe cuts down all dead trees for the fire, so God shall utterly destroy the wicked."

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Of his own work, John made very little, saying that he was not good enough even to be Christ's servant and to unfasten his shoes. "My work," he said to the people. "is to baptize you with water unto repentance, but when my Master comes, He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire. It is He who shall make the great separation between those who serve Him and those who do not. Like a farmer threshing grain, He shall gather all the good wheat into His storehouse, but shall burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire."

13 Then cometh Je'sus from Gal'ilee to Jor'dan unto John, to be baptized of him.

14 But John forbad him, saying, I have need to be baptized of thee, and comest thou to me?

15 And Je'sus answering said unto him, Suffer it to be so now : for thus it becometh us to fulfil all righteousness. Then he suffered him.

16 And Je'sus, when he was baptized, went up straightway out of the water : and, lo, the heavens were opened unto him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and lighting upon him :

17 And lo a voice from heaven, saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.

Ch. 4:1. Then was Je'sus led up of the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted of the devil.

2 And when he had fasted forty days and forty nights, he was afterwards an hungred.

3 And when the tempter came to him, he said, If thou be the Son of God, command that these stones be made bread.

4 But he answered and said, It is written, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God.

5 Tnen the devil taketh him up into the holy city, and setteth him on a pinnacle of the temple.

6 And saith unto him, If thou be the Son of God, cast thyself down : for it is written, He shall give His angels charge concerning thee : and in their hands they shall bear thee up, lest at any time thou dash thy foot against a stone. 7 Je'sus said unto him, It is written again, Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God.

8 Again, the devil taketh him up into an exceeding high mountain, and sheweth him all the kingdoms of the world, and the glory of them;

9 And saith unto him, All these things will I give thee, if thou wilt fall down and worship me.

10 Then saith Je'sus unto him, Get thee hence, Sa'tan : for it is written, Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve.

11 Then the devil leaveth him, and, behold, angels came and ministered unto him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day, as John was baptizing beside the river Jordan, he saw coming towards him the very Man of whom he had been preaching, Jesus the Son of God. Jesus asked John to baptize Him, but as He was about to enter the water, John stopped Him, saying that he was not good enough to baptize such an holy One as He, and that it would

· be more fitting for Jesus to baptize him. But Jesus insisted, saying that He wished to show the people that He belonged to God's kingdom; so John baptized Him. Suddenly, as Jesus and the Baptist were coming up out of the water, they saw the sky open and the Spirit of God coming down and resting upon Jesus, in the form of a dove. And they heard God's voice saying, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."

After His baptism Jesus was led by the Holy Spirit far away into the wilderness, where He spent forty days alone among the caves and rocks of the desert. During all this time He had nothing to eat and no companions but the wild beasts and birds. When He was almost dead with hunger and

loneliness, the tempter came and whispered, "Why should you die? Look at these stones beside you. If you are God's Son as He says, only speak the word and they will be changed to bread." But Jesus would not listen to Satan's proposal for a moment, and answered him with a verse from the Bible, saying, "It is written, man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word spoken by the mouth of God."

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Seeing he could not entangle Jesus in this way into wrong-doing, Satan tried another plan. Knowing His love and reverence for God's house, he carried Him away to the topmost tower of the temple, from which the city below looked no larger than an ant hill. "Now," he said, "throw Yourself down. God will take care of You. The Bible says, 'He shall give His angels charge over His people at all times." "It says also," answered Jesus, 'You must not presume upon the power of God, or put yourself in unnecessary danger.""

Then Satan, disappointed, tried a third time, to make Jesus do wrong. Taking Him up to the top of a very high mountain, he showed Him all the cities and palaces of the world, saying, "I will give You all these, if only You will fall down and worship me." But Jesus answered, "No, I will worship not one but God."

Then Satan, finding that Jesus was too strong and holy to be tempted by his cunning, went away. As soon as he was gone, the angels came bringing Jesus food and comfort, and He returned to the country of the Jordan, strong and ready to enter upon His new work of preaching and healing. Jesus Rejected at Nazareth

Lesson IV.

JESUS REJECTED AT NAZARETH Luke 4 : 16-30—Memory Verses, 18, 19.

Golden Tert-He came unto his own, and his own received him not.-John 1: 11.



16 And he came to Naz'areth, where he had been brought up: and, as his custom was, he went into the synagogue on the sabbath day, and stood up for to read.

January 24, 1904

17 And there was delivered unto him the book of the prophet Esa'ias. And when he had opened the book, he found the place where it was written,

18 The Spirit of the Lord *is* upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised,

19 To preach the acceptable year of the Lord.

20 And he closed the book, and he gave it again to the minister, and sat down. And the eyes of all them that were in the synagogue were fastened on him.

21 And he began to say unto them, This day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears.

22 And all bare him witness, and wondered at the gracious words which proceeded out of his mouth. And they said, Is not

this Jo'seph's son? 23 And he said unto them. Ye will surely say unto me this proverb, Physician, heal thyself: whatsoever we have heard done in Caper'naum, do also here in thy country.

24 And he said, Verily I say unto you, No prophet is accepted in his own country.

25 But I tell you of a truth, many widows were in Israel in the days of Eli'as, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, when great famine was throughout all the land;

26 But unto none of them was Eli'as sent, save unto Sarep'ta, a city of Si'don, unto a woman that was a widow.

27 And many lepers were in Israel in the time of Elise'us the prophet; and none of them was cleansed, saving Na'aman the Syr'ian.

28 And all they in the synagogue, when they heard these things, were filled with wrath. 29 And rose up, and thrust him out of the city, and led him unto the brow of the hill whereon their city was built, that they migh cast him down headlong.

30 But he passing through the midst of them went his way.

THE LESSON RETOLD

When Jesus had been preaching and working wonders among the people of Judæa and Galilee for about a year, He came back on a visit to His old home in Nazareth. The first Sabbath after His return, He made His way to the synagogue which He had been accustomed to attend every Sabbath since He was a child. Seeing Him come in, the chief minister of the synagogue asked Jesus to preach, for all His old neighbors and acquaintances were anxious to hear Him, having heard wonderful reports of His preaching and the miracles He had wrought in other places. When Jesus had taken His place at the reading-desk, the attendant handed. Him the book or roll of the Old Testament. With the eyes of the whole congregation fastened upon Him, Jesus unrolled the parchment, and began to read the words of the prophet Isaiah describing His own work as the Saviour and Messiah. "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He hath anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor; He hath sent Me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to

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preach the acceptable year of the Lord."

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As He explained to the people, that He Himself was the Saviour of whom He had been reading, they were filled with astonishment and wonder. "Why," they said, "how can such a thing be possible? We have known this man all our lives. He, the son of Joseph the carpenter, calling Himself the Messiah!" And they were offended at Him.

Now, Jesus knew that they were also much dissatisfied because He had not shown His power in Nazareth by some such miracle as He had done at Capernaum, in healing the nobleman's son. And feeling their distrust of Him, He said with deep disappointment, "It is said, a prophet is never honored by his own people and country. Remember Elisha and his work for those outside His own nation, how he helped the widow of Sarepta, and Naaman the Syrian leper, who, though heathen, showed more faith towards God's messenger in the time of sickness and famine, than did the suffering and starving Israelites themselves."

At the very mention of "heathen" and "lepers," the angry and jealous Nazarenes now rushed upon Jesus in fury, and dragging Him from the synagogue to the top of the hill upon which their town was built, and which Jesus must often have climbed as a boy, they would have thrown Him over the precipice to be killed upon the rocks beneath. But Jesus hid Himself among the crowd, and leaving Nazareth, where he Had been so cruelly received by those who should have been His best friends, He made His home in Capernauri.

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1 And it came to pass, that, as the people pressed upon him to hear the word of God, he stood by the lake of Gennes'aret.

began to sink. 8 When Si'mon Pe'ter saw it, he fell down at Je'sus' knees, saying, Depart from me : for I am a sinful man, O Lord.

9 For he was astonished, and all that were with him, at the draught of the fishes which they had taken :

10 And so was also James, and John, the sons of Zeb'edee, which were partners with Si'mon. And Je'sus said unto Si'mon, Fear not; from henceforth thou shalt catch men.

11 And when they had brought their ships to land, they forsook all, and followed him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One morning Jesus was standing on the shore of Lake Galilee, the crowd, in their anxiety to hear the word of God, elbowing and pressing him to the very water's edge. Drawn up on the white sand, were two fishing boats belonging to Simon Peter and his partners, James and John. These had just returned from an unlucky night's fishing, in which they had toiled hard, but had caught nothing. Thoy were now mending and cleaning their nets not far from where Jesus stood.

As soon as Jesus saw Beter, He stepped into his boat, and asked him to push off a little from the shore. Then, using the seat of the boat for His pulpit, Jesus sat and preached to the people on the land, all of whom could easily see and hear Him. At the call of Jesus, Peter had willingly left his net-mending, and when the sermon was ended, Jesus did not forget to reward his kindness. "Peter," He said graciously, "suppose you push out into deep water, and let down your net." 21 And they went into Caper'naum; and straightway on the sabbath day he entered into the synagogue, and taught.

22 And they were astonished at his doctrine: for he taught them as one that had authority, and not as the scribes. 23 And there was in their synagogue a

23 And there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit; and he cried out.

24 Saying, Let us alone; what have we to do with thee, thou Jesus of Naz'areth? art thou come to destroy us? I know thee who thou art, the Holy One of God.

25 And Je'sus rebuked him, saying, Hold thy peace, and come out of him.

26 And when the unclean spirit had torn him, and cried with a loud voice, he came out of him.

27 And they were all amazed, insomuch that they questioned among themselves, saving, What thing is this? what new doctrine is this? for with authority commandeth he even the unclean spirits, and they do obey him. 28 And immediately his fame spread

abroad throughout all the region round about Gal'ilee. 29 And forthwith when they were come out of the synagogue, they entered into the house of Si'mon and An'drew, with James and John.

30 But Si'mon's wife's mother lay sick of a fever, and anon they tell him of her.

31 And he came and took her by the hand, and lifted her up; and immediately the fever left her, and she ministered unto them.

32 And at even, when the sun did set, they brought unto him all that were diseased, and them that were possessed with devils.

33 And all the city was gathered together at the door.

34 And he healed many that were sick of divers diseases, and cast out many devils; and suffered not the devils to speak, because they knew him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

After He had been driven out of Nazareth, Jesus went to live in Capernaum, a town on the shore of the Lake of Galilee. On the first Sabbath afterward He took with Him His newly chosen disciples, and went into the synagogue there, where the people were gathered in crowds to hear Him.

The preaching of Jesus was very different from that of the scribes, to whom the Jews were accustomed to listen every Sabbath. For, while they repeated, over and over again, the endless rules and difficult sayings of the old Rabbis, concerning the length of feasts, the keeping of the Sabbath, and so forth, Jesus said very little about rules, but explained God's word in such a new and interesting way, that even a child could understand Him in all that He said.

As the people were sitting in the synagogue eagerly listening to His every word, a man with an unclean spirit, a terrible disease such as no doctor could cure, came in, and upon seeing Jesus, began shouting and making a great noise. At the interruption Jesus paused and, turning to the evil spirit, said quietly, "Come out of him." Immediately the spirit obeyed, and came out in a rage, leaving the man cured but lying weak and wounded upon the floor. In their astonishment the people scattered hither and thither, telling every one what had been done and saying, "Who can this man be who can do such things? We never saw the like of this before !" This is indeed a wonderful man.

From the synagogue Jesus went home to dinner to Simon's house, where Simon's mother-in-law lay very ill with a fever. As soon as He heard of it, Jesus went to the sick woman's bedside, and taking her by the hand, lifted her up; and at once she became strong and well and able to wait upon them at dinner.

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Soon every one in Capernaum had heard where Jesus was staying. And at sundown, the Sabbath and the heat of the day being over, people from every part of Capernaum and the country nearby, came hurrying to Simon's house, some carrying their sick on mattresses, others leading their blind and lame friends by the hand, to see if Jesus would help them also. Seeing nearly the whole city gathered at the door, Jesus went out and, laying His hands upon those who were sick, He healed them; and quieting and curing all such as had evil spirits, He sent the whole multitude rejoicing to their homes.



Jesus Forgives Sins

Lesson VII.

JESUS FORGIVES SINS

February 14, 1904

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Mark 2:1-12. Compare Luke 5:17-26-Memory Verses, 3-5.

Golden Tert-The Son of man hath power on earth to forgive sins.-Mark 2: 10.



1 And again he entered into Caper'naum after some days; and it was noised that he was in the house.

2 And straightway many were gathered together, insomuch that there was no room to receive *them*, no, not so much as about the door : and he preached the word unto them.

3 And they come unto him, bringing one sick of the palsy, which was borne of four.

4 And when they could not come nigh unto him for the press, they uncovered the roof where he was: and when they had broken *it* up, they let down the bed wherein the sick of the palsy lay.

5 When Je'sus saw their faith, he said unto the sick of the palsy, Son, thy sins be forgiven thee.

6 But there were certain of the scribes sitting there, and reasoning in their hearts,

7 Why doth this man thus speak blasphemies? who can forgive sins but God only?

8 And immediately when Je'sus perceived in his spirit that they so reasoned within themselves, he said unto them, Why reason ye these things in your hearts?

9 Whether is it easier to say to the sick of the palsy, *Thy* sins be forgiven thee; or to say, Arise, and take up thy bed, and walk?

10 But that ye may know that the Son of man hath power on earth to forgive sins, (he saith to the sick of the palsy.)

11 I say unto thee, Arise, and take up thy bed, and go thy way into thine house.

12 And immediately he arose, took up the bed, and went forth before them all; insomuch that they were all amazed, and glorified God, saving, We never saw it on this fashion.

THE LESSON RETOLD

From Capernaum Jesus went to many other places preaching the gospel. On his return to Capernaum, the whole town, hearing where He was, came jostling and elbowing against one another in their efforts to see Him. Soon the house became so crowded that not one more person could get in, no matter how he shoved and pushed. The doorway, the yard, and even the street, were so packed that the way to Jesus was completely blocked.

There was a poor cripple living in the town, who in some way had missed seeing Jesus on the Sabbath evening when He had cured so many sick folk, and hearing that He was again in Capernaum, the sick man persuaded four of his friends to carry him, bed and all, to Jesus, believing He would cure him. But when they came to the house, they were too late. Push and struggle as they would through the crowd, there was no way of getting near enough to speak to Jesus.

In their disappointment, they thought of a strange plan. "Let us try taking him up by the outside staircase of the house and letting him down by ropes through the roof," said one of the friends. So they got the man upon the roof, where they quickly unfastened enough loose tiles to let him through, over the spot where Jesus sat. What was the surprise of those in the house, when they heard the thumping on the roof, and presently saw a mattress being let down through the ceiling upon their very heads !

At once Jesus stopped preaching, and, pleased with the faith and perseverance of the sick man and his friends, He said, "Son, thy sins are forgiven." But the scribes who were sitting watching to catch Jesus, if possible, in a mistake, now found fault, saying angrily, "How can this man forgive sins? Would he take upon himself the power that belongs to God only?"

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When Jesus saw their rage, He said quietly, "Tell me which is the easier thing to say, 'Thy sins be forgiven,' or 'Arise, take up thy bed and walk'"? But they did not answer. Then Jesus, to prove that He had power to forgive sins, said to the sick man, "Arise and take up thy bed, and go thy way into thine house." And immediately the man, who had not walked for years, sat up and finding his strength returned stood upon his feet, and throwing his mattress over his shoulder walked out of the house, well, before them all. Then his friends and the scribes and all who saw it were amazed, and they praised and glorified God, saying, "Did any one ever see such a thing as this?"

Lesson VIII.

JESUS AND THE SABBATH

February 21, 1904

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Matt. 12: 1-13. Compare Luke 6: 1-11-Memory Verses, 6-8. Golden Tert-It is lawful to do well on the sabbath day.-Matt. 12: 12.



1 At that time Je'sus went on the sabbath day through the corn; and his disciples were an hungred, and began to pluck the ears of corn and to eat.

2 But when the Phar'isees saw *it*, they said unto him, Behold, thy disciples do that which is not lawful to do upon the sabbath day.

3 But he said unto them, Have ye not read what Da'vid did, when he was an hungred, and they that were with him;

4 How he entered into the house of God, and did eat the shewbread, which was not lawful for him to eat, neither for them which were with him, but only for the priests?

5 Or have ye not read in the law, how that on the sabbath days the priests in the temple profane the sabbath, and are blameless? 6 But I say unto you, That in this place

is one greater than the temple.

7 But if ye had kn wn what *this* meaneth, I will have mercy, and not sacrifice, ye would not have condemned the guiltless.

8 For the Son of man is Lord, even of the sabbath day.

9 And when he was departed thence, he went into their synagogue :

10 And, behold, there was a man which had his hand withered. And they asked him, saying, Is it lawful to head on the sabbath days? that they might accuse him.

11 And he said unto them, What man shall there be among you, that shall have one sheep, and if it fall into a pit on the sabbath day, will he not lay hold on it, and lift it out? 12 How much then is a man better than a sheep? Wherefore it is lawful to do well on the sabbath days.

13 Then saith he to the man, Stretch forth thine hand. And he stretched it forth; and it was restored whole, like as the other.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The great enemies of Jesus, besides the scribes, were the Pharisees, who were continually on the watch to see if they could catch Him or His followers breaking any of their strict rules or customs. Finding that they could not catch Him in His words, they now set themselves to watch how He kept the Sabbath.

One Sabbath, as Jesus was walking through the wheat fields, his hungry disciples pulled off a few ripe ears of corn, and rubbing them between their hands blew away the chaff and began to eat the grain which was left. When the Pharisees saw this they came to Jesus, saying, "Your disciples have broken the Sabbath. Our rules say a man shall not even so much as step on the grass on that day, or pull fruit from the tree."

But Jesus said, "Have you not read what

David did one day, when he was fleeing from King Saul? How when his men were almost overcome with hunger and had no other place to go, he went into the temple and asked and received some of the holy bread, which no one but the priests was allowed to eat? Or think again, how the priests in the temple have to work on the Sabbath in performing the services, and yet you do not blame them ! I say unto you, in this field you are now speaking to One who is greater even than the temple, and is Lord of it and of the Sabbath day." Then pointing to His disciples, Jesus said to the Pharisees, "You would not have been so ready to blame these my friends, if you had understood better the words of the old prophet, who said that God is more pleased when His servants show kindness and mercy to others,

than when they offer Him sacrifices."

On another Sabbath day Jesus went into the synagogue, where he saw a man with his right hand withered up and helpless. And the Pharisees, again hoping that they might entrap Him, asked, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath day?" Then Jesus asked them a question, saying, "Suppose one of you had a sheep, and it should fall into a hole on the Sabbath, would you not quickly pull it out? If, as you agree, it is right to help a sheep out of danger on the Sabbath, how much better to help a fellowman, who is worth so much more. Where fore, it is lawful to do well on the Sabbath day."

Then Jesus said to the man with the helpless hand, "Stretch out your hand." And when he stretched it out, it was made whole and strong like the other.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One of the reasons the people flocked in such numbers to hear Jesus, was because of the wonderful stories He told. These stories were called parables. - They were stories with a meaning. Through them it was easy for even the common people to understand Jesus' teaching, for in them He spoke of the simple and ordinary things of everyday life; not like the learned and pompous Rabbis, whom it was impossible for any but the learned to understand.

Jesus knew that among the crowds that followed Him every day were some, who, though they called Him Master, were not His true friends. To these Jesus said, "Not everyone that saith unto Me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of My Father which is in heaven. At the last day many will say to Me, 'Lord, Lord, have we not preached in Thy name? and in Thy name have cast out devils? and in Thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I

say unto them, 'I never knew you : depart from Me, ye that work iniquity?"

To show the difference between those who were His true servants and those who were not, Jesus told the parable of two men, each of whom wanted to build himself a house. They both of them lived in a mountainous country, where in the winter great rushing streams came pouring down the steep hill-sides, over-flowing the valleys and carrying away trees, fences, houses and everything else that came in their path. In summer these same river-beds would dry up leaving only bare sand and gravel until the next winter, when the rush of waters began again.

The first man who wanted to build, looked about, until he found a solid rock out of reach of the water, and built his house, there, making it as strong and firm as he could. That winter when the rain fell, and **1** the floods came, and the winds blew, his house stood firm, for it was founded upon a

rock, and nothing could shake it. But the second man was not so careful. For taking to account of the coming flood, he built his house in the middle of the dry and sandy river-bed, so that when the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew, it fell to pieces with a great crash, and was washed away by the waves, because it was built upon the sand.

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"Of the two builders," said Jesus, "He who wisely built his house upon the rock, is like the man who hears My words and obeys them. While the foolish man who built his house upon the sand, is a picture of him who hears My words and does not obey them.

When Jesus had finished this parable, the people were again astonished at His words, for He taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes.

JESUS CALMS THE STORM

Mark 4 : 35-41-Memory Verses, 37-39.

Golden Text—He maketh the storm a calm, so that the waves thereof are still.— Ps. 107 : 29.



35 And the same day, when the even was come, he saith unto them, Let us pass over unto the other side.

36 And when they had sent away the multitude, they took him even as he was in the ship. And there were also with him other little ships.

37 And there arose a great storm of wind, and the waves beat into the ship, so that it was now full.

38 And he was in the hinder part of the ship, asleep on a pillow: and they awake him, and say unto him, Mastef, carest thou not that we perish?

39 And he arose, and rebuked the wind, and said unto the sea, Peace, be still. And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm.

40 And he said unto them, Why are ye so fearful? how is it that ye have no faith?

4I And they feared exceedingly, and said one to another, What manner of man is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?

The crowds that now followed Jesus had grown so large, that no building could possibly hold all who were anxious to hear His gracious words and to see the miracles which He did. For this reason Jesus often taught out of doors, on a hillside, beside the seashore, or wherever the people came together. One of His favorite preaching places was beside the lake of Galilee, where the rocks sloped down to the edge of the water in such a way as to make a convenient place for the people to sit, while the Master preached to them from a little boat anchored a few feet away from the shore. It was beside this lake that Jesus told some of His most beautiful parables, amongst others, the " Parable of the Sower," and the "Parable of the Grain of Mustard Seed."

One day, when He had been preaching in this spot from morning until evening, and the sun had already begun to set, Jesus said to His disciples, "Let us now cross over to the other side of the lake." Jesus was tired with the work and teaching of the day, and it was time that He and His disciples should rest. So they made ready the boat, and as

soon as He had sent the people home, Jesus and His disciples, without waiting even to eat, set out for the opposite shore. Along with them were a number of other little boats, some on their way out for a night's fishing, and some carrying the people who had been with Jesus all day, to their homes in the towns and villages along the lake.

As soon as He and His disciples were started, Jesus went back to the stern end of the vessel, and, being very weary, lay down to sleep. But the ship had hardly got half way across, when suddenly the sky grew black and angry-looking, and before the disciples had time to get ready for it, they were overtaken by a great wind-storm, so that the waves kept beating over the sides of the boat. Every minute the storm grew louder and stronger, but Jesus still lay quietly asleep on His pillow.

Then the frightened disciples, keeling unable to manage the boat any longer, and in terror lest they should be drowned, came to Jesus and awakened Him quickly, saying, "Master, carest Thou not that we perish?" Immediately Jesus got up, and seeing the

raging of the storm, He rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Peace, be still." Instantly the wind fell, and the waves of the lake, which only a moment before had been foaming and boiling with fury, went down and became caim and smooth as glass.

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When all was quiet, Jesus turned to the frightened disciples and asked, "Why were you so frightened? How is it that you did not trust Me to take care of you?" But they could not answer, being as much terrified at what Jesus had now done as they had been before at the storm. Then, as soon as they could speak for excitement and wonder, they began to say to one another, "What manner of man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey Him?"

Death of John the Baptist

DEATH OF JOHN THE BAPTIST

March 13, 1904

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Matt. 14: 1-12. Compare Mark 6: 14-29-Memory Verses, 9-11. Golden Text-Be thou faithful unto death, and I will, ive thee a crown of life.-Rev. 2:10.

> 1 At that time Her'od the tetrarch heard of the fame of Je'sus.

> 2 And said unto his servants. This is John the Baptist; he is risen from the dead; and therefore mighty works do shew forth themselves in him.

> 3 For Her'od had laid hold on John, and bound him, and put him in prison for Hero'dias' sake, his brother Phil'ip's wife.

> 4 For John said unto him, It is not lawful for thee to have her.

> 5 And when he would have put him to death, he feared the multitude, because they counted him as a propriet.

> 6 But when Her'od's birthday was kept, the daughter of Hero'clas danced before them, and pleased Her'od.

> 7 Whereupon he promised with an oath to give her whatsoever she would ask.

> 8 And she, being before instructed of her mother, said, Give me here John Baptist's head in a charger.

> 9. And the king was sorry; nevertheless for the oath's sake, and them which sat with him at meat, he commanded it to be given

her. 10 And he sent, and beheaded John in the prison. 11 And his head was brought in a charger, and given to the damsel ; and she brought it to her mother.

12 And his disciples came and took up the body, and buried it, and went and told Je'sus.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The name of the king who ruled over the part of the country in which Jesus lived, was Herod Antipas, a cruel and wicked man, who cared little for what was just and upright. Among other crimes he had lately stolen his brother Philip's wife, Herodias, and married her ; but the people were afraid ot him, so he was allowed to behave just as he pleased.

There was one man who was not afraid of Herod, and this was John the Baptist, who plainly rebuked the king for his sin. For this reason Herodias hated John, and persuaded Herod to shut him in a dark, underground prison beneath the palace. Here John spent many weary months, not knowing what day he might be put to death. But for the present Herod did not dare to kill him, for fear of offending the people, who all looked upon John as a prophet.

While the Baptist was in prison, the time drew near for Herod's birthday to be kept. On the day appointed to honor it, the king held a great banquet in the palace, to which he invited all the chief men of the kingdom. After dinner, when Herod and his guests were enjoying themselves over their wine, Salome, the young daughter of Herodias, came in and danced before them. This unexpected performance so delighted Herod, who was halt foolish with the wine he had taken, that he now swore in a loud voice before the whole room, that, as a reward, he would give the girl anything she asked, even if it were the half of his kingdom.

Not knowing what to ask for, Salome flew to her mother, saying, "What shall I ask ?" "Go quickly," said the wicked Herodias, "and say to the king, 'Give me here John the Baptist's head in a basin."" So the girl obeyed. When Herod heard what she asked, he repented of his promise, but rather than appear foolish before his guests, who were

anxiously watching to see what he would do, he sent a soldier and had John beheaded in the prison. And his head was immediately brought in a basin and given to the girl, who in turn gave it to her mother. When John's friends and disciples heard what had been done, they were very sorry; and they took their brave master's dead body and laid it lovingly in a grave, and went and told Jesus.

Now when Herod came to himself, he was afraid because of what he had done, knowing John to have been a good man. And when after a time he heard of the preaching and miracles of Jesus, he cried out in terror, "This is no other than John the Baptist. He is risen from the dead, and so is able to do these great wonders that we hear of." So his guilty conscience troubled him.

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Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand

Lesson XII. JESUS FEEDS THE FIVE THOUSAND

March 20, 1904

Matt. 14 : 13-28. Compare Mark 6: 30-56 ; Luke 9 : 10-17—Memory Verses, 20, 21. Golden Tert—Jesus said unto them, I am the bread of life.—John 6 : 35.



13 When Je'sus heard of it, he departed thence by ship into a desert place apart : and when the people had heard *thereof*, they followed him on foot out of the cities.

14 And Je'sus went forth, and saw a great multitude, and was moved with compassion toward them, and he healed their sick.

15 And when it was evening, his disciples came to him, saying, This is a desert place, and the time is now past; send the multitude away, that they may go into the villages, and buy themselves victuals.

16 But Je'sus said unto them, They need not depart ; give ye them to eat.

17 And they say unto him, We have here but five loaves, and two fishes.

18 He said, Bring them hither to me.

19 And he commanded the multitude to sit down on the grass and took the five loaves, and the two fishes, and looking up to heaven, he blessed, and brake, and gave the loaves to *his* disciples, and the disciples to the multitude.

20 And they did all eat, and were filled : and they took up of the fragments that re-

mained twelve baskets full. 21 And they that had eaten were about five thousand men, beside women and children.

22 And straightway Je'sus constrained his disciples to get into a ship, and to go before him unto the other side, while he sent the multitude away.

23 And when he had sent the multitudes away, he went up into a mountain apart to pray; and when the evening was come, he was there alone.

THE LESSON RETOLD

When the news reached Jesus of the cruel death of His faithful friend and forerunner, John the Baptist, He immediately left Galilee and crossing the lake came to a quiet country place near Bethsaida, where he might rest and be alone with His disciples. But when the people saw where He was going, they followed Him on foot around the end of the shore, so that when Jesus landed He again found thousands of people, with many also who were sick, gathered to meet Him. Tired and sad though He was, Jesus would not disappoint them, and He not only cured all who needed healing, but preached to them His heavenly Father and His kingdom.

It was now late in the afternoon, and the people had been with Jesus all day without having had anything to eat. There were no shops near, where they could buy food, and as they had not brought any with them, everybody, and particularly the little children, had grown very hungry and tired. Then the disciples came to Jesus, saying, "It is time these people were sent home. Let them go at once and buy food for themselves in the villages round about." But Jesus said, "Give ye them to eat."

While the disciples were wondering what Jesus could mean, a boy came running to them with five small thin bread-cakes or biscuits, and two small fishes. "It is impossible," said the disciples, "to do anything with so little. If they were to be divided among all these people, there would not be even a crumb for each one." "Bring them to Me," said Jesus, and turning to the people He told them to sit down in good order on the grass, where the disciples arranged them in groups of hundreds and fifties, leaving a path between each group. When they were all seated, it was counted that there were more than five thousand men, besides women and children.

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Jesus now took the five loaves and two fishes in His hands, and looking up to heaven, He asked God's blessing upon them. Then breaking them in pieces, He handed them to His disciples, who in turn passed them to the people. Though there were so many, Jesus made the food enough for all, and when everybody was satisfied, there was still some to spare. But Jesus would not waste anything. He told the disciples to save what was not used, and they gathered up twelve baskets full of the pieces that were left, which was more bread and fish than there had been at the beginning.

Jesus now persuaded the worn-out disciples to get into their boat and return to the other side of the lake, while He sent the people home, after which He went up alone to the top of a mountain to pray.
