Interesting Event at Port Williams

"Lily of the Valley" Division of the Sons of Temperance, at Port Williams, passed a very interesting epoch in its history on Monday evening. This society was organized forty-two years ago and has exerted a splendid influence for good in this community. During the past winter it has enjoyed great prosperity and now has a membership of over one hundred of the leading citizens of the place. The Division owns its hall, erected about twenty-six years ago. Recently it was decided to make an effort to pay off the mortgage which has stood against the property since its construction.

The members threw their energy into the undertaking with the result that a sufficient amount was raised and the debt paid. On Monday evening the mortgage was burned with due ceremony. G. W. P., R. S. Theakston, of Hantsport, and P. G. W. P., B. O. Davidson, of Wolfville, were present, and addressed the meeting. Mr. T. J. Borden, the only remaining charter member, gave an interesting history of the Division. Among other speakers were Mr. C. A. Patriquin, of Wolfville Division, and Mr. Robert Murphy, of "Lily of the Valley." The officers of the Division for the current quarter were installed by G. W. P. Theakston assisted by P. G. W. P. Davidson. A feature of the evening was the election of Mr. T. J. Borden as an honorary life member of the Division.

At the close of the evening delicious refreshments were served by the lady members. The whole affair was most successful and creditable to those in charge.

Song Recital in College Hall

Miss Ruth MacDonald who is to give a Song Recital in College Hall, April 16th, has recently returned from New York, where she has been coaching under a celebrated teacher of singing, Mr. Oscar Sarnger. Miss MacDonald's musical associations have been among the best. She has been associated with Miss Ethel Frank of the Boston Opera, Rachel Morton Harris, of New York, Kemp Stillings, violinist, of New York and Mr. Harveah Hubbard, Operallogist. She has held several church positions in Canada and the United States, and previous to coming to Wolfville was on the staff of the Canadian Conservatory of Music, Ottawa.

The Boston Transcript speaks of her as "a brilliant Soprano with a bright future." The Sun, Pelham, N. Y. says: "Her singing arouses the enthusiasm of her audience. She possesses a voice strikingly clear and of unusual range." The Ottawa Citizen, states: "Miss MacDonald's voice is a remarkably beautiful one, showing great flexibility and purity of tone and undoubted evidence of a natural gift. Her interpretation of the various songs gave proof of sound musicianship and a fertile imagination. Especially successful was her rendition of 'Ah, Fors'e Lui' (from 'La Traviata')."

Paid 10 a Seat For Private Showing

OF "AUCTION OF SOULS"—THE SENSATIONAL SCREEN EPOCH WAS VIEWED BY SOCIETY LEADERS BEFORE GIVEN TO PUBLIC

America's leading society people and leaders in sociological and political thought were the first to see "Auction of Souls," the unprecedented screen epoch to be presented at the Opera House April 19th and 20th. Before being shown publicly in motion picture theatres, it was exhibited privately in the larger cities of the East and West, where distinguished audiences looked at it in amazement.

In the Plaza hotel, New York, one of the greatest centres of distinction in the country, "Auction of Souls" had a private showing, under the supervision of Mrs. Oliver Harriman, chairman of the National Motion Picture Committee, and Mrs. George W. Vanderbilt, chairman of the New York committee. This exhibition lasted a week, in which time, 7,000 of New York's leaders in society and uplift paid \$10 each to see the picture.

Of course, in each instance, this money went as a benefit to the cause of the Committee for Relief of the Near East. The fact that this committee took "Auction of Souls" before the leaders of the country to drive home in their minds the need for sending relief to the Armenians bespeaks the picture's merits as a gripping portrayal of what happened when the Turks began the slaughter of thousands of Armenians.

The Nova Scotia board of censors permits "Auction of Souls" to be shown in order to enlist the practical aid and sympathy of Nova Scotians for the survivors of this terrible ordeal. Persons under 18 years of age will not be admitted.

Base-ball League Formed

The Annapolis Valley Base-ball League was officially organized at Middleton on Tuesday last. The League is to be composed of teams from Wolfville, Kentville, Middleton, Bridgetown and Annapolis. Mayor G. N. Reigh, of Middleton acting as president and Fred Bath, of Bridgetown, as secretary. The Executive Committee is composed of one member from each Club. The winning team of this League will play off the Province for the Championship of Nova Scotia. In addition to this the D. & M. Co. have presented a silver cup to the team winning the Valley League and a gold medal to each of the players of the winning team. All players must be registered with the M. P. B. A. A. A. at least a week before the league opens. Carl Angus, one of Wolfville's most energetic base-ball fans, who represented the Wolfville G. W. V. A. at the initial meeting in Middleton, states that considerable interest is being taken throughout the Valley, and the "days of real sport" are about to be here. With sufficient practice and conscientious work the Wolfville team should give their opponents in the field a close run for the honors. In all twenty games will be played and the schedule will appear in THE ACADIAN next week.

Town Council Meeting

The Mayor and all the Councilors were present at the meeting of the Council on Wednesday evening.

The chief business was the passing of the estimates for the current year and fixing the rate of taxation.

The chief items of expenditure for the year will be:

Schools	\$8,500.00
Streets	3,500.00
Interest	3,500.00
Street Lighting	1,200.00
Fire and Water	1,200.00
Provincial Highway Tax	709.00

The rate of taxation was fixed at 3 per cent. made up as follows: \$1.00 on the hundred for Schools, \$1.65 for general, 25c. for Sewers, and 10c. for Highway Tax.

The petition of those living near the east boundry of the town again came up and after some discussion the petition was rejected, the vote being three for and three against, the Mayor giving the casting vote against.

Mrs. Black on behalf of the Daughters of the Empire, appeared before the Council asking action in the direction of securing the service of a district nurse. Mrs. Black lucidly explained the Order of Victorian Nurses and narrated the steps that had been taken by Sir Robert Borden Chapter. She asked that a public meeting be called for the consideration of the matter. Dr. Elliott was called upon and spoke strongly in favor of the undertaking. The Council voted that the Mayor should call a meeting of citizens at a convenient time to discuss the project.

The Recorder submitted the fire safeguard against possible fires in town, which was passed. The Clerk was instructed to send these by-laws for approval.

The usual batch of bills was read and ordered paid.

The application from the G. W. V. A. in carrying on their Club Rooms come up again, and Mr. G. H. Ruffee appeared on their behalf to give any information that might be required, but owing to the original communication having been mislaid by the Town Clerk it was decided that no action could be taken.

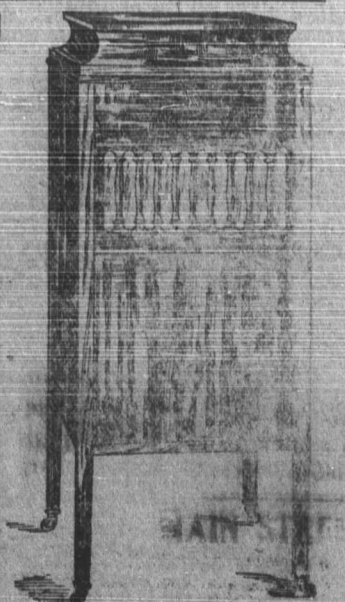

PUT THE "PATRIOTISM OF PEACE" INTO CIVIC CLUB ACTIVITY

When Dr. Cutten preached his never-to-be-forgotten sermon in the Baptist church on the subject—"The Vision and the Task," it is to be doubted if anyone who heard him, not excepting even himself, foresaw the great transformation that followed. But how abundantly verified has been his prophecy by the events that have happened in the year that is now ending.

Last Friday evening, Dr. Cutten hazarded another prophecy. He said that if Captain Chute became the Apostle of that New Nova Scotia for which he had so eloquently pleaded, the chairman had no doubt that the task would be accomplished. It will be remembered that Captain Chute strove earnestly to inspire the young people with the spirit of the Patriotism of Peace, to exert themselves to tackle the great tasks that needed to be performed in Nova Scotia for the benefit of the Province as a whole. But he prefaced his appeal with the axiom that "if you be loyal in small things, there will be no need to worry about your loyalty in great things". It is with this portion of his message that I am concerned at the moment. The double-tracking of the D. A. and C. G. railroads, the building of an adequate fleet of steam Trawlers, the establishment along the shore of a series of Schools of Navigation that will again send forth Nova Scotian sons as (master) mariners on the Seven Seas, and the "side-tracking" of Premier Murray if he fail to accomplish these tasks—or, at any rate, to facilitate their achievement—are mighty projects, that will require all the audacity and impetuosity of youth that the gallant Captain can command when he returns in the Fall to lead the fight for his Native Province.

In the meantime, Wolfville Citizens have their Civic Club to boost, their Board of Trade to revive, their G. W. V. A., Boy Scouts, Tuxis Boys, Give Service Girls and Girl Guides to support, and their Schools, Academy and University, Churches and the Inter-Church Movement, all to keep on flourishing, also a Memorial Hospital and a Municipal Building to build that will require a pentecostal outpouring of the spirit of "Patriotism of Peace" that, for all time, and worthily will commemorate that splendid patriotism that won the war.

Nothing succeeds like success. A successful Civic Club would spell the success of all the others in the list just mentioned, and many more. Already much has been done by the Club, and much more good has been wrought than, as yet, has been published. The annual report of this Club, when completed, will be an interesting document, which will encourage the members to exert greater efforts, and will inspire those committees, which, hitherto, have not distinguished themselves for activity, forthwith to tackle the duties assigned to them with vim and zeal that will compel success. 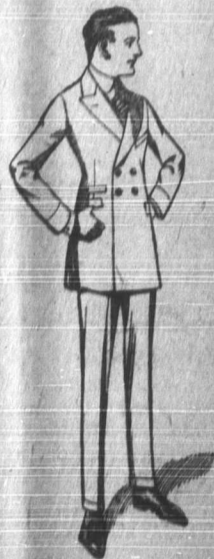
United States Hockeyists

A Montreal despatch says:—Local hockey fans read with much interest that the United States have selected their hockey team to compete in the Olympic games at Antwerp next month, as they will be Canada's chief opponent. The players chosen to represent Uncle Sam and the Stars and Stripes one would generally suppose would be loyal and true American citizens, but Canadian hockey followers are having many quiet smiles to themselves for they realize in looking over the list that with one or two exceptions the players are "Canucks", but the biggest laugh is provided when they announce that they are going to send over with an amateur team to compete for the amateur championship of the world, a professional hockey player none less than George P. Geran.

No later than the season of 1917-18 at the Westmount arena this same player was seen with the Wanderers in the National Hockey League. There is little doubt that he has never been reinstated, in fact the rules would not permit of it, yet he will be a member of the real amateur team which will represent United States who will play the game for the love of it, but find it profitable enough every fall to leave their Canadian homes and play hockey in their respective United States cities during the winter season. And yet there is no particular reason for for singling out Geran any more than any other Canadian who migrate south every winter. For Small who was slated for the defence played on the old Boston arena team back in 1915, which was generally recognized as a professional team although they were never really outlawed as such.

EXTRACTS FROM REPORT OF PROVINCIAL CONVENTION HELD IN TORONTO

Dr. Detwiler, of Kitchener, gave a most illuminating address on the wonderful mission of that protective agency, the Travellers' Aid. So important is this deemed, that Dr. Detwiler has been engaged to tour the province to exploit the work and secure local representatives to assist. Mrs. Ward, of Toronto District, also bore testimony to the effective work of the several matrons supported by her district.

Mrs. Ward, the energetic president of Toronto District, gave a most satisfactory account of the Travellers' Aid in her city. Special appeal was made to the unions of the smaller places to help—particularly through Surprise soap wrappers—as the almost total number of girls helped come from the rural districts and outlying towns.

Mrs. Deltor, reporting on Citizenship, urged the imperative necessity of women informing themselves re the intelligent use of the ballot. Study up the law—municipal and provincial; attend the local nominations; secure women trustees, and keep alert to anything and everything which will promote good citizenship. This will include wise oversight of the children—citizens in the making.

Mrs. Maxwell again pressed her old and wise plea that women feel their responsibility to accept office as school trustees, as so many problems arise which can be dealt with more effectively by women. Our superintendents must be cheered to note the increasing number of women who are taking head in this matter, and also that those who have served on school boards have invariably made good.

Canada's Huge Coal Bill.

Canada's coal bill with the United States last year reached the sum of \$70,603,005 for a total tonnage of 21,411,813 tons, according to a return tabled in the Commons by Hon. A. L. Sifton, Secretary of State. Canada's 1919 exports of coal were valued at \$10,380,196, and her total production in 1919 was 13,076,300 tons, of which 73,893 tons were anthracite. In the ten years from 1910 to 1919, the value of Canadian home production coal exported mounted from \$5,031,221 for 1,826,330 tons, to \$10,169,722 for 1,826,830 tons. Thus with only 300 tons more coal exported the value was more than doubled.

tinguishing itself just now is the Educational, because the Citizens were never so hungry as now for a better understanding of questions affecting their civic government and welfare. This Committee might do worse than establish the Forum Government in Wolfville. Then there is another matter which very vitally effects the welfare of the Club itself. I mean its own home. Its very name is suggestive of sociability. A very moderate subscription per member per quarter should provide adequate temporary premises, amply appointed for the comfortable accommodation of members, who may turn in for sociable moments any working day of the week between 10 a. m. and 10 p. m., and where, on Sunday afternoon an organized adult Bible Class of the Wolfville citizens may meet. I say temporary advisedly, because I believe that a thoroughly alive Civic Club, such as I see in the vision, will "see to it" that a Memorial building, worthy of Wolfville and those who have sacrificed themselves for it, will, at no distant date, be erected, and which will be the centre and the home of all its uplifting and government activities. Let the Citizens get a glimpse of "the vision," and then watch them "tuck up their sleeves," and tackle "the task". A CITIZEN.

Remove Spare Tire When Washing Car

When having the car washed, it is advisable to remove the spare tire from the rack, whether it is mounted on a rim or not. If it is not mounted it is particularly imperative that the casing be removed.

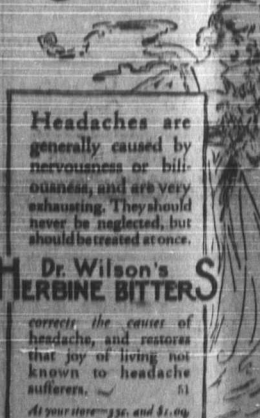
Water gets inside the casing, and, unless inspection is made, it remains there until entirely absorbed.

If the water permeates the casing it is certain to prove destructive. In case of failure to remove the tire first, then it becomes essential to sponge out the water and wipe perfectly dry. When the tire is mounted on a rim there is practically no likelihood of the water permeating the casing but it will collect around the rim, causing it to rust and making it very hard to remove the casing when it becomes necessary to make a repair.

After driving in the rain it is more necessary to remove all signs of water from the spare tires than it is to wipe off the body of the car.

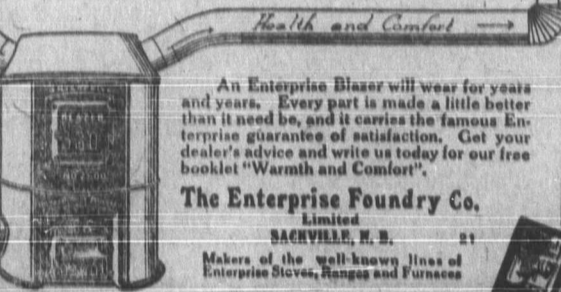

Unreasonable Conditions

Attention is drawn to some curious anomalies in the existing temperance laws. Montreal wholesale dealers may use the mails to advertise their goods in Nova Scotia, but no paper published in the province is permitted to publish liquor advertisements. Persons who have not tasted strong drink for years, and others who never drank or never intended to, moderate drinkers and hard drinkers, are receiving through the mail pamphlets and price lists from liquor dealers in Montreal who intrude their obnoxious propaganda into the quiet sober homes of temperate communities in an endeavor to bring their barrooms under our very noses, and to flood the country with strong drink. Under the present law the post office people are obliged to handle this matter. There is not a newspaper in Nova Scotia that will carry one of these advertisements for any money. Yet the mails carry them into every part of the country, with the result that thousands of dollars daily are being sent to Montreal from this province alone for intoxicating liquor "for personal and family use." So we have the unreasonable condition that while no person in this province may sell a drop of liquor to another resident of the province, the liquor dealers of Montreal may sell all they like, without the payment of either taxes or license fees.

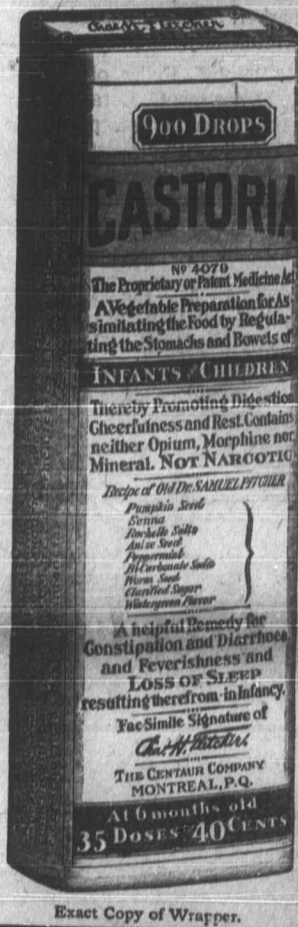

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:-

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by-mail to Inspectors of Taxation.
