## Speaker's Chair for Canada


The Speaker's Chair which is being presented to the Canadian House of Commons by the Empire Parliamentary Association (United Kingdom branch) to take the place of that destroyed in the fire at the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa, in February, 1916, is now completed, and it is expected that the presentation will be made by the Right Hon. J. W. Lowther, speaker of the Imperial House of Commons, during the summer.

The gift has been tendered by the donors as "an abiding token of good will between both Parliaments," and has been gratefully accepted as such by the Canadian House of Commons. The chair is an exact copy of the Speaker's Chair in the House of Commons (designed by Pugin, who was Barry's assistant in the building of the New Palace of Westminster), which has been used since the oscipation of the present chamber by the Commons in 1852. Like the original, the replica is a beautiful example of carved oak. It stands 18ft. 6th., surmounted by a canopy bearing the Royal Arms, which are carved in a piece of old oak taken from the roof of Westminster Hall. The seat of the chair is upholstered in green leather. The right jamb of the chair is inscribed: — "Manus justa nardus; memor et fidelis mens conscia recti"; and on the left jamb is inscribed: — "Nec prece nee pretic; libertas in legibus; hostis honori invidia; laus Deo." .

The replica was executed by Messrs. Harry Hems and Sons, of Exeter, under the direction of Sir Frank Baines, of the Office of Works. It was recently on view at the rooms of the Empire Parliamentary Association, Westminster Hall, when the Speaker and a large party of Lords and Commons, were received by Sir H. d'Eville, secretary of the association, and Mr. T. Wilson, Clerk of Works and Deputy Keeper of Westminster Hall. Accompanying the chair is a framed roll of parchment, ornamentally inscribed as follows:—

"This replica of the Speaker's Chair in the House of Commons, at Westminster, is herewith presented to the House of Commons at Ottawa by the United Kingdom branch of the Empire Parliamentary Association, comprising members of both Houses, as a fitting symbol of the great Parliamentary Tradition which binds together the free nations of the British Commonwealth."

The scroll is signed: — "Birken-head, Lord Chancellor: James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, Joint President, Empire Parliamentary Association, United Kingdom branch, Westminster Hall."

Formerly the Canadian Speaker, on leaving office, was entitled to take away the chair in which he sat as a perquisite, but this perquisite will now be lost. It is probable that there are some of the chairs of the old English House of Commons still in existence in country mansions. Dean Pellew, in his biography of Lord's Glamouth (Henry Addington), relates that in the dining-room of White Lodge, Richmond Park — a house given by George III. to Sidmouth in appreciation of his services for the use of the Speaker.

#### Plenty of Heat

Do not cut down the heat too soon until the chicks are well feathered, and even after that, if the weather is cold and changeable, they will require a certain amount of heat, whether they are raised naturally or artificial

#### Naturally Raised Chicks

The hen will probably ! hicks to themselves by the are feathered, sometimes even before and it is well to have the chicks housed in a fairly comfortably coop or colony house, so that when the hen leaves them they will be quite comfortable and can get along with-

#### Artifically Raised Chicks.

The same care as to heat and com fortable rearing quarters should be given to the chicks that are hatched and reared artificially and sometimes even more care is necessary. The re n:oval of the heat, when nights are still cold, often results in the chicks becoming chilled, crowding into a corner and a number of them being smothered. Those that survive are more or less stunted because of the chill.

#### Give Them Fresh Land

It is never advisable to rear chick ens in the same yards or upon the same soil that the old hens have used. Give them new soil that is sweet and free from disease germs Such a place as a cultivated orchard, potato patch. root or corn field, or in fact any place where there is a grow ing crop of such a nature that they cannot destroy it will be an ideal spot for the chicks.

#### Plenty of Shade

During the warmer months shade i very important. This can be provided by the growing crop, orchard, shrubs or even the raising of the house and in some cases, along with this, artificial shade made from boughs or cotton screens is an alvan-

#### Feeding

The feeding of a flock of chicks aring the growing season should not Though plenty of reed is required it may be given in such a way that the minimum amount of labour is entailed. For this purpose, hopper feeding is very much to be recommended. A homemade hopper in which mixed grains and mash can be placed and to which the chicks can have access at all times insures plenty of feed for the chicks with very little labour on the part of the attendant. If the growth in plenty of time for the fall, a moist mash fed once a day will help them, and milk before them

at all times is a decided advantage. In feeding and caring for the grow ing chicks it should be borne in mind that the chief aim is to have matured pullets so that they will commence to lay before the winter season comes on. The feeder should keep this in mind and feed the birds accordingly. 

## **CULTIVATION OF GROWING CROPS**

The currention of crops requires reasonable care. There is seldem gain from deep cultivation after the crop has been planted. Such cultivation is necessary in preparing the sell for all heed crops, but if not done then, later cultivation will not make up for the neglect. Summer cultivato a should be shallow: shalloint to destroy weeds and produce a finmulch one to two inches deep.

it may be possible and is then advisable, to narrow the cultivator and cutivate deeply the space between the rows not occupied by growing roots. It should be remembered however, that these rocts penetrate the soil towards the centre of the row very rapidiy and frequent observations are necessary to determine whether the feeding roots are being disturbed or destroyed by cultivation, often happens. The moist soil below the loose surface soil covering is where the soil bacteria are most tive, and consequently where the most plant I od is being liberated, as result of which roots will be found ir this soil area in greater abundance than anywhere else.

Although there seems to be no good reason for using care in selection of seed, preparation of the soil and fertilizing to grow a good plant-only to destroy the roots as soon as they have grown-yet this is what is very often done. Root pruning has so far never been shown to be desirable and as the root development is a big factor in crop yields, the better chance they have for development without being disturbed the better use they can make of the plant food the soil contain.s The object at this time is to point out the desirability of surface tillage by shallow surface cultivation and warn against deep culture in the area occupied by the growing

Another reason why roots should not be disturbed more than possible is because injured roots may not be able to take up the full moisture required and wilting may result bringing about premature maturity; particularly is this the case if the weather is ho and accompanied by drying winds.

A depth guide should be used or the cultivator to avoid too deep cultivation and as the plants grow toward the centre between the rows the cultivator should be narrowed. advent of the horse hoe or hiller has marked the greatest advance in economic potato culture of any imple ment on the farm. This implemen has made it possible to distribute around the potato hill a fine earth mulch sufficient to kill the weeds, if done when the weeds are young, and



A Party of Six Will Search For Treasure Which Tradition Says Was Buried By French Frigate In the Year 1758 On Caribou

Pictou, N. S., May 21-Treasure nunters of Trenton, New Glasgow and Caribou, six in all, have banded to gether to dig for a long buried pot of gold, or chests of money, which they believe are hidden beneath the soil of Caribou Island, twelve miles from Pictou. The island is located in the Northumberland strait, off the mouth of the Caribou river and is situated between Pictou Island and the main

Caribou Island residents, who are few in number, have held the idea for a long time that the crew of a Frenci frigate on her way to Quebec late in the fall of the year 1758 had taken on a large amount of gold destined to pay the French forces in Quebec and buried it on the island for safe-keeping the commanders rearing it to fall into the hands of the English vessels which at the time circumvented the mouth of the St. Lawrence river. 
