





The Freight Congestion.

ACTION OF BOARD OF TRADE. St. John's, Dec. 24, 1912. Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,-As some discussion has taken place of late on the action of the Board of Trade in the matter of congestion of freight on the coastal boats and railway line, the following facts may be of interest to the gener-

On the 6th December, a sub-com nittee of the Council of the Board of Trade called on the Prime Minister and drew his attention to the fact that for several trips large quantities of freight had been shut out from the oastal boats, and urged on him to arrange for the Government to have another steamer to convey the freight to the northern ports. Sir Edward promised to attend to this matter, and the following is his reply directed to

Prime Minister's, Office, St. John's Nfld., 14th December, '12

Dear Sir,-I have to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of December 13th, desiring a reply to the representations made to me by the sub-committee of the Council of the Board of Trade in relation to arranging for a steamer to convey freight to northern ports.

In accordance with my promise I brought the matter to the attention of Committee of Council, when it was decided by the Council that the matter would be carefully enquired into, and that if, upon enquiry, any serious position arose as regards the holding back of freight for the north, by reason of the inability of the regular coastal steamers to convey it, the Government would hire a steamer.

The following day I made enquiries from representatives of the regular northern coastal companies, and learned from them that, in their opinion, no freight would offer for the northern ports that could not be promptly despatched.

This information I conveyed over the 'phone to Mr. Winter as representing the sub-committee.

Since then I have been officially in formed by the representatives of those coastal companies that two steamers have been engaged, the s.s Kite, to take 4,000 drums, that other wise would have gone by the s.s. Prospero, and the s.s. Stella Maris been chartered to take anything that may be left over after the sailin of the s.s. Prospero and the s.s. Fo-

If, after the sailing of these steamers, the Government find tha any large quantity of freight remain requiring immediate despatch, the matter will be considered. Yours faithfully.

The deccased who was a member of the Masonic fraternity for 40 years, was also a prominent and devoted adher-ent of the Methodist Church and was a man of genial and kindly tempera-ment, a faithful friend and worthy citizen. of London.

Its Vastness Revealed in Recent Fig-ures of London County Council.

The immensity of the world's greatest city is strikingly illustrated by he facts and figures published recently in a report on London life isued by the London Council. It is estimated that for the privilege of keeping about 180,000 dogs London-ers pay \$305,000. Altogether no less than \$7,000,000 is paid every week in rent, and \$5,000,000,000 worth of property belonging to Londoners is in-

sured. It is remarkable that while fifty ears ago only half the people living London were born in the capital, to-day we are approaching the time when three-quarters of the popula-tion of London are natives, the figures being 668 per 1,000. Most peo-ple are under the impression as they notice the new streets of houses going up in all directions in the metropolis that London is growing bigger every day, but as a matter of fact, last year \$25,000,000 less was spent on house building than in 1902. There are 7,950 weddings in Lon-

don every week, while the weekly average number of inquests is 100. No fewer than 65,000 drunkards are convicted in twelve months, while postmen deliver every day 6,000,000 ters, post cards, circulars and newspapers .- New York Sun.


