## An Efficiency Talk.

do first class work in any other direction.

For instance, suppose your business is stenography. Being a woman, you usually make up the beds for mother of a Sunday morning. You don't like to make beds, and you are inclined to make them in a very slovenly fashion, despite the knowledge that by so doing you forfeit a handsome husband. Now, if you yield to this inclination you not only spoil the appearance of the room, but you also effect your ability to write a neat letter in the office on Monday. And conversely, if you insist on making those beds just as well as you know how, you also strengthen yourself as a neat and accurate stenographer.

Or, again, say that your profession is homemaking and you are elected treasurer of the local Woman's Club. Keeping books is stiff, up-hill work

for you, but if you persist in doing it in an orderly and systematic fashion, you will thereby strengthen the habits of order and system. Whereas, if you allow yourself to be careless about this task, you impair your ability as a housekeeper.

Of course, the influence which one single act exerts is not perceptible. But we seldom perform single acts. We let ourselves be slovenly in the making of the beds or the keeping of the books again and again, until by-and-by the poison of slovenliness begins to affect our whole system.

"The habits of work are really more important than the work itself." That means bad habits as well as good ones. If you want to be efficient in one direction, you must try not to be slovenly in any, even though the work itself does not seem to you important.

## Sunstroke Without Sun

Sunstroke is seldom fatal in this country, but it may be very serious after-effects. It has been noticed in the Army and Navy that officers who have once had a severe sunstroke are seldom quite as efficient afterwards. They are sometimes inclined to dizziness often to ringing in the ears, and are always more inclined to come on the sick list for spring causes.

Sun is not necessary to sunstroke, a fact which explains why many doctors prefer to call it heatstroke. You can get sunstroke before a hot fire, and many cases occur after the sun has set. You are most likely to get it if doing hard physical work. Ships stokers are peculiarly liable to it, and it is the usual cause of the suicides by drowning which occur so frequently among stokers at sea.

The chief tip about avoiding sunstroke is to take things easy in hot weather, particularly if you are run down physically, as sunstroke usually attacks people who are out of sorts. Army surgeons recommend keeping constantly wetted cloths under the hat when the temperature is abnormal, or cabbage leaves.

Sunstroke usually comes gradually in this country, the victim becoming more and more languid before he collapses. In hotter countries it usually comes with the suddenness of a stroke of apoplexy.

The first thing to do with anyone attacked by sunstroke is to lay them down in a dark room. Cold cloths should be applied to the head. If the pulse is very feeble, stimulants are needed.

A curious point about sunstroke that medical science is unable to explain is that the sufferer always gives off a curious mousey odour.—P.W.

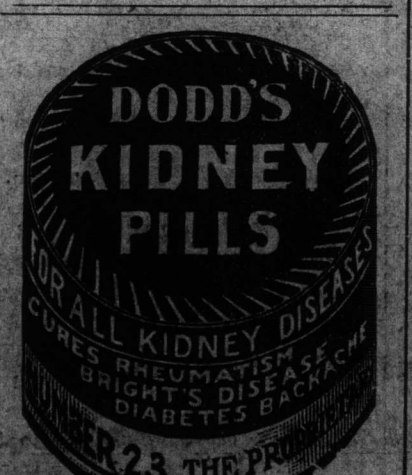

A report received from Shanghai says that Dr. Sun Yat Sen, former provincial President is still there, but General Chang Chihmen and General Huan Sing, two other leaders of the revolt. Bankers, members of the diplomatic Corps at Peking are under the belief that Provisional President Yuan Shi Kai's most difficult task is the organization of a system of taxation through the Republic.

Senator Thornton, Louisiana, in a speech pictured the ruin that free sugar would bring on this state, denounced the policy of free sugar as undemocratic, and characterized his party's action as a pity and a shame. "I am not false to the principles of the democratic party," said the Senator in refusing to follow it along the strange devious pathway that it is now pursuing with regard to the tariff on sugar. "I am true to these principles, and it is the Democratic party itself that is seeking to depart from them."

**WILLEMSTAD, Curacao, To-day.**  
 Reports received here from re-

volutionary sources in Venezuela are to the effect that the uprising in that Republic started simultaneously last Monday in several States, and that General Cipriano Castro, former President Venezuela is the leader of the movement. Advice say General Leon Jurado, Governor State Falcon, who was previously reported captured, escaped when the rebels attacked Coro, and fled into the interior of the country, but that military authorities of Coro were arrested, and imprisoned. From the State of Falcon, according to reports received here, it is the purpose of the revolutionists to invade the State Lara which adjoins Falcon South. General Navas is expected to operate in the State Zeulia, North-eastern part of republic, adjoining United States of Columbia. Maracaibo, the principal seaport in Venezuela, is the capital of Zeulia. General Camilo Castro, brother of General Cipriano Castro, is commander of the rebel troops in the State of Tachira, which lies just south of the State of Zeulia. It is stated that prior to the outbreak of the revolt, the revolutionists seized the cable and telegraph lines.

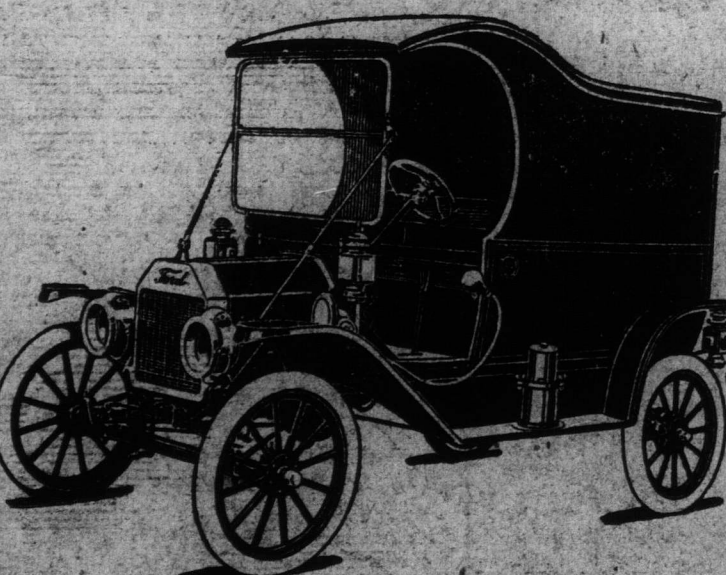

## The Awakening of Ireland.

The New Statesman gave a special supplement last week on "The Awakening of Ireland," which is of special interest at a moment when the Irish Home Rule Bill has again been passed by the House of Commons and rejected by the Lords.  
 "Nothing," says the Nation, "but the defeat of the Government on a non-Irish issue can now stay its passage into law. So long as the three political bodies which form the coalition do not desire such a defeat, and are vigilant enough to avert it, it cannot take place. But Lord Lansdowne met Lord Curzon's motion for the second reading on Monday with a refusal to consider the Bill until it has been referred to the country.  
 "The New Era.  
 "What ever may happen in the immediate future with regard to Home Rule, Ireland stands to-day at the beginning of a new era in her history," says the New Statesman. "During the last two decades there has taken place in Ireland the most fundamental and far-reaching of revolutions—a re-

distribution of property. The redistribution is very far from being complete or final, as the Dublin Parliament will doubtless learn almost as soon as it assembles, but none the less it has altered the face of Ireland, and cannot fail to be a landmark in her history only second in importance to the English conquest. It has moreover, been accompanied by a veritable revival in the intellectual and artistic life of the country, and largely by a great development of cooperative enterprise which, having regard to its spiritual as well as its material results, many observers regard as the most momentous change of all."  
 Mr. George Russell (A.E.) tells the story of this co-operative movement in Ireland which has had such remarkable results.  
 "In Ireland for the last quarter of a century," says Mr. Russell, "two revolutions have been going on, overlapping each other. One, connected with the ownership of land, was at its height when the other, connected with the reorganisation of agricultural industry, was in its infancy.  
 Co-operation and Civilisation.  
 "The divine and the infernal powers alike appear in unexpected ways, now

in mangers and now in puddle, as when Mephistopheles chose first to appear to Faust. But a steam separator to conceal the seed of a new civilization! "A most strange case of the kind," as Dr. Faust would have said. Nobody except Signor Plunkett who knew very well what he was doing, would have suspected that the steam separator which he so urgently pressed Irish farmers to utilize was dangerous to anything except the manufacturers of the older sort of churn used in home butter making. But the erection of a creamery equipped with the new plant was an expensive undertaking for small farmers, and he advocated the forming of co-operative societies to enable them to obtain the necessary capital.  
 "Now, co-operation is one of the half-dozen fundamental principles on which it is possible to imagine a civilisation being based. It may be added to the various forms of collectivism, State socialism, guild socialism, and communism as one of the fundamental ideas by the application of which to society a noble civilisation could be organized. The steam separator was a harmless ingredient in Irish national life. Co-operation for such an imaginative and logically-

mindful folk as the Irish are was much more indefinable stuff. Once it was adopted it would not be possible to confine it to steam separators.  
 "As the movement has grown to national dimensions, it has, while improving its economic position, become more humanized. Societies build halls out of their profits, hold concerts or entertainments, run village libraries, and a new organisation, the United Irishwomen, the feminine counterpart of the I. A. O. S., and affiliated to it, has been at work during the past year organising Irish countrywomen, and already about forty associations have been formed. One of the pleasantest things about the movement is this latter development, which is mainly directed to bringing about a higher standard of living in rural districts. The women promote flower shows, exhibitions of home industries, nursing schemes, start industry societies, teach domestic economy and by entertainments and concerts try to bring about a sayer life in the desolate Irish countryside."  
**Killing 100,000 Flies a Day.**  
 The fly season will soon be upon us, and it behoves everyone to take up arms against the common enemy. Here is a simple apparatus which has been responsible for the death of more than 100,000 a day of these winged disease-breeders.  
 The idea consists of a square or oblong wooden box, with a hinged lid at one end. Smear the inside of it with honey or treacle, and place it on the roof or in the garden, with the lid open. Any fly in the vicinity will make for the box with all possible speed, and will not want to come out again.  
 The box will soon begin to buzz like a beehive and the lid should be shut as soon as it is fairly full. Now take the box and plunge it into water and open the lid. The flies are at once drowned, and the box can be used again any number of times.  
 The inventor of this simple fly trap killed more than 100,000 a day last summer and cleared the whole neighborhood of these pests in a very short time.

## Fishing Gear Badly Damaged.

S. S. MEIGLE'S REPORT.  
 The steamer Meigle, Capt. J. Goble, returned from north at noon yesterday, after experiencing the stormiest trip for the season. The ship, however, made all regular ports between here and Battle Harbor and returned. Strong southwesterly winds, with dense fog and heavy seas were encountered throughout the voyage. In the Straits havoc was wrought among the fishing gear, especially traps on Labrador side between Bradore and Blanc Sablon, and very little was done with codfish at these places the past week. In eastern part of the Straits the westerly gales were not felt so badly and from West-St. Modiste to Cape St. Charles, most traps are doing fairly well, especially so around Chateau and Hentley H. Around Battle Hb., however, the fishery to date is almost a failure. On the Newfoundland side of the Straits from Ferrole to Eddies Cove, every man has a fair voyage ashore. Wm. Geange, of Anchor Point, who is a passenger by the Meigle, is offering for sale for himself and neighbors 4000 quintals of codfish in salt bulk, if a satisfactory price can be obtained. Pike's lobster crews of Channel and Clarke's of Bonne Bay, who were fishing at Bartlett's Harbor, returned by the Meigle this trip.—Western Star.

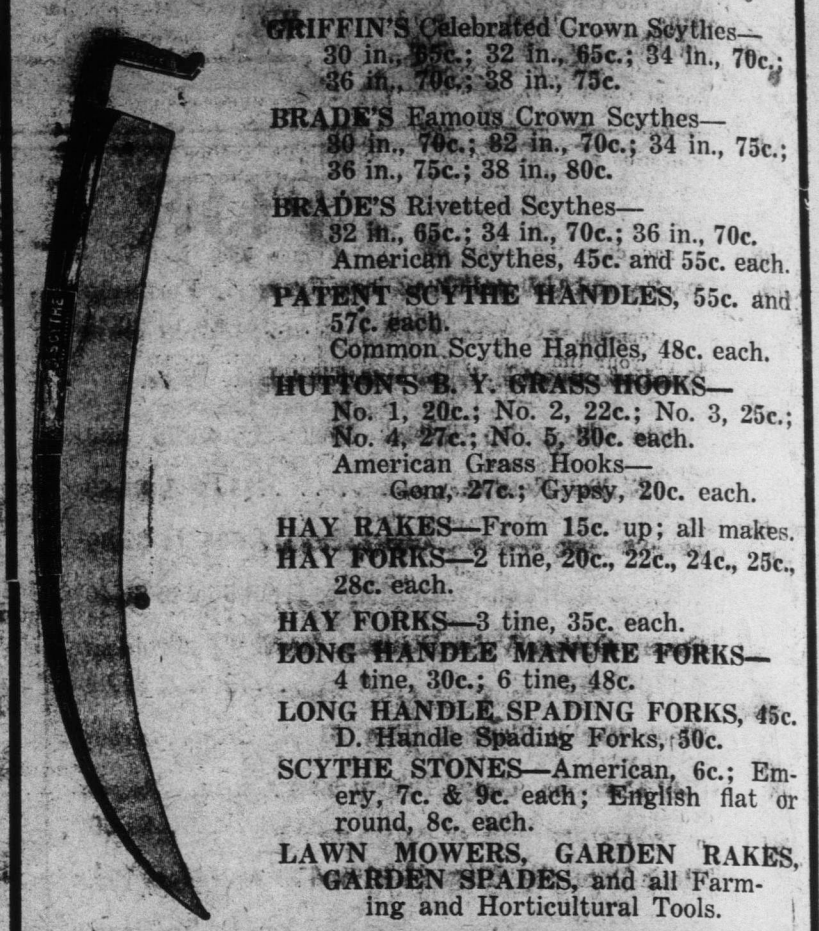

## Lord Morley's Address TO COLLEGE GRADUATES.

"Take Care of Your Time and Care You Do Not Throw Away and Your Life Out of Dow at the Start."

Lord Morley, of Blackburn, a degree ceremony in the Hall at the University in Manchester and addressed the graduates. Lord Morley presided over an opening speech by the Chancellor at the afternoon ceremony. **Lord Morley's Advice**  
TO COLLEGE GRADUATES.

"Take Care of Your Time and Take Care You Do Not Throw Your Talents and Your Life Out of the Window at the Start."

Lord Morley, of Blackburn, attended a degree ceremony in the Whitworth Hall at the University in Manchester, and addressed the graduates and students. Lord Morley presided as Chancellor at the afternoon ceremony. In an opening speech he expressed his gratification at being present on such a day. It was, to his mind, always one of the most moving sights to see those who had done their best to equip themselves for the great journey of life setting upon it. "I am not going this afternoon," he continued, "to take up your time with any glorification of the new Universities which have to some degree taken the place, or widened the place, of the old Universities to which many of us here belong. I always look back upon Oxford, where I had the happiness to be trained, as the happiest portion of one's life. You are freed from the strict discipline of the school; you have not to bear the burden of the great responsibilities of life; you are acquiring knowledge; your delightful experiences are just as much the portion of you here in the great University of Manchester—because great it is and without arrogance we may contend that of the new Universities the University of Manchester is the foremost. (Applause.) The same sentiment does not yet exist possibly in the new Universities as existed or exists in the old. They have the surroundings of historic associations of infinite moment and infinite delight.

**Adaptability.**

But, after all, one of the great advantages of the old Universities is yours also, and it is this University life, whether it be close, as it is in Oxford and Cambridge, or whether it be less close, as it necessarily is here, opens the eyes of the young men and women to new worlds. They perceive that their own home life, delightful as it is, dear as it is, does not include all the conditions of human existence. And I should have thought that in a business city, like Manchester, and in the business communities that surround Manchester, the student here, inspired by adaptability or widened adaptability to conditions is an enormous gain in all the pursuits of which these countries are the home. I shall have the honor of conferring degrees upon doctors, lawyers, upon many who are going to teach. We have also, by the way, the honor of conferring an honorary degree upon a very distinguished and successful member of the teaching profession—Mr. Page. I do not believe the world will have found its true balance till it has recognized that the school teacher, and, of course, the professional teacher, are the most important agents in the diffusion of knowledge and the formation of character. Then I suppose the majority of those who will take their full degree today are going into the profession of medicine. From my various circumstances I am pretty well acquainted with that profession. I know its defects—(laughter)—but I am sure those defects will not exist in any of the medical graduates I am to give degrees to by and by. But the power of the doctor in dealing with difficulties in human life is really only second—and perhaps it is not, second—to that of those who take degrees in Theology. We won't enter into any competition of that kind to-day. Many of you will go abroad to Australia, to Canada, and so forth. What a thought it is that the ideas, the thoughts, the habits of mind that you have acquired here in Manchester you may be the agents for distributing, with improvements, all over the surface of the habitable globe.

Another piece of advice—take care you do not throw your talents and your life out of the window at the start. Those two admonitions only amount after all to "work hard, stick to your interests, and then watch what the consequences of your acts will be."

**ST. PAUL, To-day.**  
Six persons were killed, and many others may have met death in a collision between two Great Northern trains near Superior Wis., last night.

**OTTAWA, To-day.**  
The Roger Miller Company, Toronto, were awarded a contract for the Prince Edward Island terminal at Carleton, the point of the intercolonial Car Ferry. The figure is \$950,000.

**OTTAWA, To-day.**  
Two cows sleeping on the Grand Trunk right of way of Beatty Station, 248 miles from Ottawa, twelve miles from Perry Sound, caused the derailment of a Grand Trunk extra freight with the death of five men, and injuries to two others.

**SHANGHAI, To-day.**  
Everything is quite here and also at Chapel. The rebel forces of this district have dwindled to one thousand. The Kiangnan arsenal has been relieved by the arrival of a thousand government troops overland and it is believed that negotiations are in progress with the rebels for the cessation of the Wu Tang forts.

**ATHENS, To-day.**  
Official dispatches received here admit that a strong attack by Bulgarians compelled the Greeks to retire to defensive positions on the heights in the neighbourhood of Petchova and Kavitsa, but they claim fresh Bulgarian attacks near Djuma, in Rimelia, 45 miles south, were repulsed.

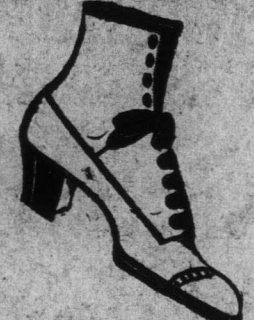
**LONDON, To-day.**  
The Daily Telegraph correspondent with Greeks at Saloniki describes a battle between Greeks and Bulgarians in the Djuma district as the most hotly contested and sanguinary of the entire war. The Bulgarians, the correspondent says, were reinforced by fifty thousand men who had been withdrawn from the Serbian frontier, and made an unexpected attack on the Greek left wing. The fight raged two days, with varying successes, but the victory finally rested with the Greeks who captured again their lost positions. The Greek losses were two thousand men killed, including many officers bearing historic names, and between six and seven thousand wounded.

### The Tariff.



The tariff is a political m'è à l' ticket which is punched for several weeks preceding a primary election by candidates for congress who believe in protecting all of the industries in which they hold stock. It is one of those subjects which nobody knows anything about, but which everybody is perfectly willing to discuss until the cows come home.

As generally understood, the tariff consists of a pair of bars which prevent foreign goods from climbing over into this country and ruining some of our best protectionists. These bars were put up in the early days of the republic, when we had to buy everything abroad except the home-made sock and the Boston baked bean. About the only articles manufactured here were taxes, salt pork and patriotic poetry, and everybody felt that it would be a good thing to replace the poetry with the hum of industry. Opponents of the tariff now claim that this is one of the most expensive hums ever created.

Every member of congress is firmly of the opinion that the tariff is a hollow sham except when applied to the products of his own district. This opinion is shared by many earnest and unselfish constituents who do not grow anything that is on the free list. These constituents are always willing to see the tariff torn up, root and branch, in all sections of the country save the township in which they reside, thereby constituting an example of self-abnegation which is touching in the extreme.

No two people agree on the tariff and it has caused more joint debates on a cracker box than the age-long controversy as to whether Samson wore a pompadour or parted his hair in the middle. Some of the liveliest debates on the tariff are precipitated by people who wouldn't know an ad valorem duty if they should meet it head on, but this never interferes with a sulphurous expression of their convictions. And by the way, very few congressmen know enough about the tariff to cause a corrosion of the intellect.

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
**WASHINGTON, July 31.**  
Ty Cobb was a caller at the White House to-day, and was warmly greeted by President Wilson.

**LONDON, July 31.**  
Despatches from South Africa, regarding the possibility of a strike by the Rand gold miners, are more optimistic. It is now believed that the threatened walk-out will not occur.

**CINCINNATI, July 31.**  
Two are dead and six will die, according to attending physicians, whilst twelve others were seriously and some possibly fatally, injured as the result of a motor cycle accident at the Lagoon motordrome.

**LONDON, July 31.**  
George Lansbury, who resigned his seat in Parliament to fight for re-election on a suffragette issue, and was defeated, has been sentenced at Bow Street to three months for making inflammatory speeches during hunger strike.

**LONDON, July 31.**  
A despatch to the Times from Peking, says that news from the South, implying outbreak of the revolt, is pouring into Peking. Much of it requires confirmation, but there is little doubt that the military phase of the trouble is near.

**LONDON, July 31.**  
The Telegraph's Shanghai correspondent says that the Japanese naval contingent, re-occupied Shanghai on Wednesday, without a fight. The correspondent adds that the general feeling in Shanghai is that the southern rebels will discontinue the revolution.

**LONDON, July 31.**  
Suffragettes were suspected today when the luncheon tent, adjoining the grand stand at the Woodrow Wilson race track was being set. The races are now on, and the last of the season's fashionable turf events, the King and Queen attending. The tent and all its contents were burned.

**BERLIN, July 31.**  
Several morning papers announce that four directors of the Krupp Co., including the President, have been made defendants with the officers of the Prussian war office, who were arrested some time ago, on a charge of accepting bribes from the Krupp Co. for a sight of official documents.

**LONDON, July 31.**  
Britain has decided not to participate in the Panama Pacific Exhibition at San Francisco in 1915. This was notified to Washington, early in the week. No reason was given. Foreign office and the United States Ambassador are reticent. It is believed that the real cause for the reversal of the previous decision to participate is due to the Panama Canal dispute.

**LONDON, July 31.**  
The conclusion of a peace treaty between the Balkan States, seems assured by the news from Bucharest of the five days' armistice. The view is generally held, however, that the prospects of permanent peace are as remote as they have been at any time during the past half century. The Powers have taken no steps to bring about the evacuation of Adria-nople by the Turks, whose tons is more and more defiant, and from whom no word has come regarding the invasion of Southern Bulgaria. Sofia, too, is silent, but it is believed here that the Turkish advance has ceased.

**BOSTON, July 31.**  
Wreaths, fashioned by members of the family of William T. Stead, who was lost in the Titanic, were cast into the sea from the deck of the Guard liner Franconia, as that vessel lay with engines afloat over the grave of the Titanic, on Sunday afternoon. Fifteen hundred men and women stood with bowed heads during the ceremony, while the ship's band played "Nearer my God to Thee." The service had been arranged by Miss Kate Stevens, who was associated with Mr. Stead in reform work. The wreaths were made from lavender picked in Mr. Stead's garden. Miss Stevens arrived here in the Franconia.

**The Regatta.**  
Most of the crew were out in the evening. The best time was made on the Shamrock, 16:17.  
All the crews are required to get to-night at the T. A. Armory. It is expected that the largest number of men in the history of the Regatta will row this year.  
Despite the constant barking the hideous whistles were again in evidence on the lake last night.

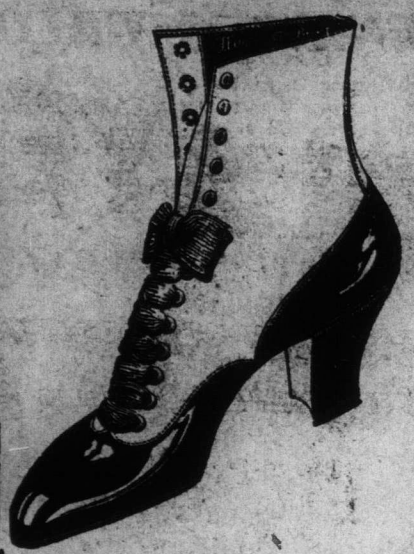

## Mannerisms of Famous M.P.'s.

By a Pressman Who Has Seen Them.

"He looks like a good boy—mother's darling, in fact; immaculate to a degree. But he talks like a sage." There is no more apt and happier description of Mr. P. E. Smith, K.C., the youngest "silk" in England, and one of the youngest Parliamentary lights, than this, which has been applied to him by a well-known writer; and men of all parties are agreed that Mr. Smith can talk like a sage, albeit a somewhat bitter one at times, for he is a master of irony and sardonic humor.

Perhaps his most notable characteristic, however, is the rapidity with which he speaks, although of late he has been training himself to speak more slowly. Still, members of the Press gallery, when Mr. Smith gets on his feet, usually feel some misgiving for, absorbed in his speech, he is apt to forget that there are limits to the capabilities of the best of shorthand writers. As he speaks Mr. Smith has a habit of thrusting his head forward as though to hurt his words with additional force at the members opposite. Indeed, at times he bends so far forward as to seem almost in danger of falling on his face.

"Ulster's King." The rapier-like methods of Mr. P. E. Smith for his actions are almost as rapid as his words—a striking contrast to the more "bludgeon-like" speech and tactics of Sir Edward Carson—"Ulster's King," as he has been termed by his critics. Sir Edward still retains that Irish brogue which his Nationalist opponents find a delight to the ear.

One of the best stories told of Sir Edward Carson, which illustrates his wit as well as providing an example of his brogue, is that of an incident which occurred in a case in which he appeared.

"Ar-re ye a teetotaller?" he asked of the bottle-nosed man in the witness box.

"No, I'm not," said the bottle-nosed man, with resentment.

"Ar-re ye a moderate drinker?"

No answer.

"Should I be right if I called ye a heavy drinker?"

"That's my business," said the bottle-nosed man, stiffly.

"An-y other business?"

It was a knock-out blow, typical of the man whose masterful fighting spirit is manifested by the challenge thrust of the under-lip, the heavy jaw, and the ponderous manner in which he brings down his fist into the palm of the other hand, or flings his arms magnificently above his head with dramatic gesture when wishing to emphasize some particular part of his speech.

On the other hand, his equally famous legal confrere, Sir Rufus Isaacs, has practically no gestures. Rather does he rely for effect on quiet, incisive manners. He will grip with both hands the lapels of his coat, something like Mr. Balfour is in the habit of doing, as he delivers, with cutting emphasis, his criticism of his opponents. Or it may be that he will lean slightly forward with the tips of his fingers daintily placed on the table of the House. This was always his favorite pose in the courts.

Sir Rufus is not a man of many words. What he says he likes to say briefly, and quickly. In this respect he is somewhat different to the Premier, who, of late years, seems to have become somewhat laconic and terse. As an orator, Mr. Asquith is inclined to run to long and involved sentences, and in his speech on the Welsh Church Bill recently he delivered himself, in replying to Lord Hugh Cecil of a sentence containing 188 words.

His coolness is proverbial. With his left hand thrust in his trouser-pocket, and holding a sheet of newspaper in the other hand, he will deliver a speech in a calm, lawyer-like manner, which he allows nothing to upset.

one has only to go back to the recent incident when a man threw from the Strangers' Gallery a bag of flour on the floor of the House, presumably at the Premier, who was speaking at the time. It missed Mr. Asquith and fell near the Speaker's table. For a moment there was great excitement in the House, as the stragglers rushed forward to the stranger and hurried him from the Chamber. Mr. Asquith merely glanced at the gallery, waited for half a minute until the excitement had subsided, and then continued his speech from the interrupted sentence, as though nothing out of the ordinary had happened.

"His Majesty."

The Chancellor of the Exchequer is not given to many gestures when speaking, except, that when moved more than usual he vigorously thumps the table of the House, as though to drive home his arguments. But he has a curious habit, when making a speech, of introducing each different point with the words, "Well, now." It is a little oratorical trick which recalls the favorite word, "Forsooth!" of Mr. John Redmond.

The Irish leader when induly excited rolls out this word in a manner which might well frighten anyone unused to his peculiar mannerism. In ordinary circumstances, however, Mr. John Redmond is as cool and calculating as Mr. Asquith. Indeed, on more than one occasion his imposing walk and dignified, commanding mien has led to him being dubbed "His Majesty." But Mr. Redmond can unbend, and it is only necessary to see him walking on the Terrace of the House or in the Lobby, with both hands thrust deep into his trouser pockets and head thrown back, laughing heartily at some joke, to understand that it is his geniality, as well as genius as a politician, which has made him so popular with his friends.

Perfect Temper.

But there is no more popular man in the Commons than Mr. Birrell, who absolutely refuses to be ruffled by any remarks of his opponents.

"I respect the honorable gentleman opposite," he said, during one speech, alluding to an opponent whose views he was severely criticizing.

"I don't want your respect," came the ungracious remark across the floor of the House.

"The honorable gentleman cannot prevent me respecting him," said Mr. Birrell, smilingly, and the House chuckled.

But he came perilously near to a mixture of metaphors in his peroration in the Home Rule debate. He said: "This Bill is open, no doubt, to many objections, some of which time will reveal, but for the time being it holds the field. The Liberal Party, associated with all those who are hearty Home Rulers, will abate neither a jot of heart nor hope, but steer right onwards."

And perhaps one might conclude the article with Mr. Bonar Law, whose Christian name by the way is pronounced as though it were spelled "Bonner." A man of many pockets is the leader of the Opposition, who, while other members lounge on the benches in all sorts of attitudes, usually sits erect, as though determined to be stern and uncompromising, and when he gets up to speak he will dive first into one pocket and then into another for his various references. But always in a cool, unembarrassed manner, and he never seems at a loss to know in which pocket to find a particular reference.

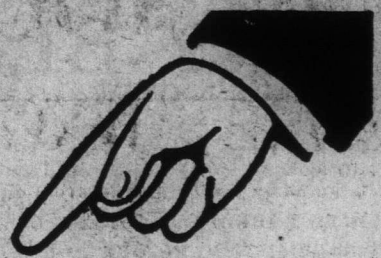
It is said of Mr. Law that he has never coined an epigram, and that he has never been guilty of a joke, but as an orator he is known as one who always hits, without wasting superfluous words, straight from the shoulder, and thus for his grimness and downness about his words and actions which has earned for him the reputation of being one of the most tenacious politicians in the House to-day.

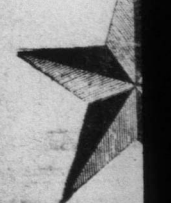
