# Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The Huerta's suggestion for simultaneous salute to States and Mexican flags, the Washington Government informed Huerta that it was untenable, that a salute of twentyone guns would be insisted upon, and that the manner of the returning sa-lute would be left to the States Admiral who had agreed to fire one to the American flag. No reply has been received up to late last night and no orders to war fleets to slow down or urn back had been considered.

LONDON, To-day. Asquith's refusal to grant a judicial nquiry into the circumstances conected with the recently contempla ed military operations in Ulster as tounded the Opposition vesterday, i ace of damaging facts, admitted in written reply to queries by L. S. Amery, Unionist member for South Birmingham. The Premier, in his re ly, produced a telegram which show d that troops were ready to move a short notice, that provisional ar rangements had been made for their ransport by sea if necessary. When any other members talked to Mr. Asquith yesterday concerning the offi cial notification to General Gough that assurance had been repudiated by the declared that such an assurance was unnecessary, Asquith declared that he saw no sufficient grounds for an inquiry. Mr. Amery notified the Minister of War that he would again raise the question at adjournment but Mr. Asquith was absent from the House, when last night the member for South Birmingham made his pro test; he now intends to bring the mater up again on Tuesday. Si Quiller Couch addressed a letter in which he insists that the common sense of Parliament must see th thing through. Sir Quiller says that the Unionist mind must see that Liberals and Nationalists are not to be cezened into a game of "heads you lose, tails we win." At the same time he objects to the coercion o Ulster, remarking that any convic tions which make him a Home Rule make him abhor the coercion of a fre people and that Liberal principle could never accord with any coercion. He concludes with the advice against the employment of English forces to intervene in the dis pute, remarking that Orange Lodges and the Order of Hibernians under stand each other far better than we understand either.

The following report of the fishery on the western banks was received vesterday:-

"(Channel to Port aux Basques) from T. Soper, April 11th .- Four boats and 21 dories and skiffs are fishing. No bankers have arrived from the grounds to date. Prospects are very good at present, and frozen herring is being used for bait. The 7th was the only day of the week that any fishing was done, and those who got out did fairly well. The ice embargo is the great evil just now. To-day, the 11th it is very fine, with a little north-west wind, but the ice is close home to the shore and the fishing skiffs cannot get out.
