

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

Schooner Crushed in Ice.

On the 12th inst., the crew of one of Sleat & Read's schooners which sailed in company with the Cosmopoout of this Harbor returned by land from Bonavista Bay, having lost their schooner two days before in the same gale which we felt so much of here. She was jammed in the ice and literally crushed to pieces. 

The Victorian Century.

One of the remarkable people who were born in the year 1819 was Victoria, daughter of Edward the Duke of Kent, and granddaughter of King George the Third, who, on the death of William the Fourth, in 1837, became queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The Princess Victoria was born on the 24th of May, and this day throughout her beneficent reign of more than sixty-three years became so firmly established as a national holiday in Britain that it has been found well-nigh impossible place it with the natal day of either place it with the natal day of either successors. Indeed, the name and thought of Queen Victoria became so intimately associated with public and private life, even with people's trappings and belongings, that the actual faults of our taste in that bourgeoning time, here as well as in England, became "Victorian." The use of the word is actually a tribute to the world's affection for this simple woman who was the greater British sovereign for her simplicity. The most amazing events in the world's history, short of this amazing war which is so hard to bring to formal end, were associated with Victoria's reign. It covered the period from lumbering stage-coaches to automobiles. It witnessed the developments of railways, telegraphs, elephones, electric lights, and paused only at the vestibule of air-flight. In politics, it traversed the world's and civilization's width, from genteel aristocratic rule to horny-handed democracy. It saw the English language become the imperial speech of mankind. Measured in its events, Victoria's was the greatest reign in the history of England's sovereigns. But through all its events the Queen held the throne rather of the woman and the mother than that of the sovereign. 
