S. market. Canadians themselves are obliged often to import the U. S. product which they find can be bought cheaper than in their own country, even though they have to pay an import duty on it also of \$4.00 per barrel. It is nonsense, therefore, for Mr. Anderson to talk about buying Canadian pork, and so I would suggest to him to be more careful in luture when writing to the press upnercial matters. 





CURZON DEFENDS U. S.

LONDON, Feb. 16. Earl Curzon, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, speaking at the dinner of the Primrose League last night deplored the publication of sensational articles concerning the settlement of peace problems, and the attitude towards the United States, which he pointed out was confronted with exceptional difficulties. He added, "So far those difficulties are of domestic character. They are not our business, and I hope nothing will be done in this country to aggravate those difficulties. It would be bad for Europe, bad for the world and for the United States also."



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
