



Eight Lives Saved By a Plank.

A fire broke out on June 3, 1909, on the premises of a builder's merchant and a portion of a draper's in King Street, Hammersmith, became involved. The fire was discovered in the early hours of the morning, and eighty shop assistants who "lived in" had an exciting experience. The bedrooms of the male assistants were situated in the portion attacked by the fire, and when they were foused from sleep it was found that their means of escape was cut off. The only way out was to stretch a plank from the window of one of the bedrooms to an opposite window belonging to another part of the building. One by one the eighty men crossed the plank in safety, the ordeal being rendered greater by the fact that the fire was burning fiercely some feet below them. Within half an hour, of their escape the men's bedrooms were burnt out. Considerable alarm was also aroused among the hundred women assistants, and many of them ran out of the building half dressed and were accomodated in neighbouring houses. The prompt closing of the fireproof doors, however, prevented the fiames from spreading to the women's bedrooms. Before the fire was extinguished it had destroyed the premises of the buildiers' merchants and done a large amount of damage to the drapers'.

No less than seven different color -violet, indigo, blue, green, yellow orange and red-are needed to make light of different strengths, the violet being the shortest wave and the red, which is the strongest, travelling twice as far.

In a fog the first six colours are not strong enough to penetrate, and the sun therefore appears crimson because only those rays are sufficiently powerful to pierce the atmosphere. In the same way the sky is rosy at

sunset, because the red rays, being the longest, are visible to the eye after the others have vanished. If the order of things had been reversed we should have had sunsets of deep violet, and a blue sun would have been a common occurance in winter!




