Crime in New York

POLICE DEPARTMENT SAID TO BE UNDERSTAFFED.

There have been so many crimes of violence in New York of late that the police department, which is understaffed, is making a special appeal to the courts for help. In accordance with the request, Judge Collins, in addressing three grand juries in the General Sessions Court. directed them to bring indictments with the greatest possible haste in all cases of crimes of violence. The District Attorney has arranged for such cases to be tried promptly, in the hope that speedy convictions will deter other intending law-breakers. In the Bronx district three men bound and gagged the maid in a jeweller's flat and stole £4,000 worth of diamonds and other precious stones. Another gang cut through the door of a safe in a news stand in the Pennsylvania Railroad Station, placed where hundreds of people pass every hour, and stole £600. Other robbers cut through the ceiling of a business building in the financial district and removed £2,000 worth of jewellery from a safe. About ten burgiaries also occurred in the residential districts of the city. 

will learn with regret of the death at Los Angeles of Mr. Herbert Standing, wardrobes furnished to suit women's the well-known actor. Mr. Standing, ciated with the late Sir Charles Wyndham during his early years at the Criterion Theatre. Herbert Standing was born at Peckham on Nov. 13, 1846, and came of old Quaker stock. His first appearance was at the old Queen's Theatre in 1867, when he played Langford in "Still Waters Run Deep," and Ellen Terry played Mrs. Mildmay. Thenceforth nothing in the way of a part ever came amiss to him from Cassio to Captain Hawksley. During his 34 years on the English stage, he was a principal in the companies of Phelps, Irving, Toole, Wyndham, and the Bancrofts, as well as leading man to Mary Anderson, Mrs. Bernard Beere, and Mrs. Langtry. He was Irving's original Christian in "The Bells," at the Lyceum, and the Snodgrass to his Jingle. He returned repeatedly to the Criterion, to share Sir Charles Wyndham's later successes. In the 'nineties, the patrens of nearly every West-end theatre were familiar with his attractive performances. Then, in 1901, Mr. Standing went to New York. Fifty years ago lobsters were so plentiful that even the poorest of the people might feast to their heart's content on this succulent crustacean. Even as late as 1889, the catch in the United States alone reached a total of 30,000,000 pounds, which sold for \$800,000-less than three cents a pound. Ten years later the catch was only half as large, while the price had more than doubled. In 1880 the State of Maine produced 14,-234,000 pounds, which sold for less than two cents a pound, as compared with 5,545,000 pounds in 1922, which sold at 26 cents a pound at the wharf, and heaven only knows at how much to the ultimate consumer. The catch of Maine alone in 1880 was greater than the total from Delaware Bay to the coast of Newfoundland in 1922. Overfishing has been the cause. This can be combatted in two ways by artificial propagation and by restricting the catch, either as to season or


