W. W. McNeily informed the Court that he would appear in the enquiry for Mr. J. Forbes, Assistant Government Boiler Inspector. Mr. McNeily also asked to be made familiar with the terms of the Commission, and Judge Morris read this Commission for the information of all concerned. Mr. Matthew McGettigan, sworn, examined by Mr. Bradley:-Witness is a marine engineer, and holds a first class certificate. He has been employed by Bowring Brothers as Superintendent Engineer for 25 years. His duties are to look after repairs to the ships, in a practical way. He has to see that the hulls of the ships are repaired, and also the boilers. He has to report anything he finds wrong and the Company depends on him to see everything is alright before the ships go out. Witness knows the S. S. Ranger but does not know how long she is built. She is owned by Bowring Brothers about twenty years and is a wooden ship. She has been under supervision of witness since the firm took her over. Her horsepower is about 75. Witness is fairly well acquainted with the ship's engines and boilers. They are in the ship about 35 or 36 years. It is not original boil er that came to the country with the ship. Repairs have beer made to the boiler, to knowledge of witness; a new furnace and new tubes were put in. The new tubes were put in about 12 years ago. When the firm got the ship, he made an examination of the boiler and attended to her pretty often since the new tubes were put in. When repairs are to be made the inspector is called and his instructions are carried out. Witness has two boiler makers with him and they go through the boilers every year. Witness was inside the furnace but was not in the boiler, since the ship was examined with a view to buying her. He is not able to get in the boiler, but has sent his men in. The boiler makers have been doing the work since witness could not do it. When the boiler makers make the examination they report to Mr. McGettigan and he instructs them to do whatever is required. Witness remembers an examination being made of the boilers of the Ranger, List Fall, after which a certificate was issued in December. When he said December 2nd, he referred to the date of the certificate.
