Sir Francis Hincks, one of the wandering knights now perambulating through Ontario, has at last found constituency. North Renfrew would have none of him, the people of Ottawa refused to have him foisted on them, Carleton declined to have anything to do with him, and the yeomanry of Oxford would scarcely give hun a heaving. In sheer desperation, and out of pity for the desolate knight the Tory Head of this town proposed that he should try his hand in SouthiWellington, but this scheme, like all others which emanate from that sheet, was so ridiculous that Si Francis would not even give it a thought. But the patient and long suffering knight has at last found rest for the soles of his feet. We are told by the Mail that 'vielding to the urgent solicitations of his very numerous friends and admirers in South Brant. Sir Francis Hincks, Minister of Finhance for the Dominion has consented to become a candidate for the representation of the South Riching of Brant at the ensuing Parliamentary elections." This means when properly interpreted that the whole influence of the Government has been brought to bear on Mr. Watts, the Conservative candidate who was out for this Riding to reture in favor of Sir Francis, and that that patrotic individual, taking hit on the almost despairing Finance Minister, has given way, and will no doubt be well rewarded at some future day for his generosity.
