SUPT. HAMILTON'S DEFENCE.

The Waterworks Superintendent Replies to His Critics—The Fault Lies in the Mayor's "Dead Ends."

Superintendent Hamilton of the Waterworks Department was seen yesterday and this was told a World reporter in regard to the dirty water and the cause of it. The whole trouble is that we haven't enough water to properly flush the mains and connections. Last year we were obliged to notify every water user that the water couldn't supply them, and street watering was discontinued for a time. There are nearly a hundred "dead ends" throughout the city, where the water becomes stagnant and the small amount which is taken from the top of the pipe by the connections is not sufficient to keep up a purifying circulation.

AN ENQUIRY REFUSED.

Campbell of Durham Votes with the Government—Declines to Answer Questions of the Opposition.

The charges of irregularities in connection with the East Hastings election occupied the Assembly yesterday afternoon. Mr. Stewart moved that Mr. Hudson's motion to refer the matter to the Committee on Privileges and Elections and moved in amendment that the legitimate purpose of investigation would be better accomplished by the ordinary tribunals provided by law, or by a commission under the authority of the act respecting inquiries concerning public matters, which was adopted by a vote of 15 to 11.
