

M'CARTHY AT CREEMORE. es An Account of His Stewardship Simcoe Electors—The Meeting

Slimly Attended.

the Simcoe Electors—The Meeting

Silmly Attended.

CREEMORE, Ont., July 24.—Mr. D'Alton McCarthy addressed a slimly-attended meeting of the electors of Simcoe in Cupland's Grove yesterday.

In the course of his address Mr. McCarthy accused the Government of postponing the bill dealing with the Territories until Hon. Clarke Wallace got out of the country. Mr. Wallace must have voted with the Government, as he could not, as the holder of a portfolio in the Administration, vote against it. It was an awkward situation, and it was decided to get out of it by waiting until he had left Canada to attend the Grand Orange Lodge. Mr. McCarthy admitted that his amendment had been defeated, but told his friends that their influence had not been lost. A petition signed by all the Bishops and backed by the full power of the hierarchy had been pigeonholed by the Government from fear of the spirit manifested in Ontario, and a resolution which was to have been moved by one of their supporters, and which could have been carried, was suppressed by the Government owing to the same wholesome influence. He gave an explanation of his statement about which the Conservative press has been making a clamor, that he would rather have Separate schools than secular schools. A secular school system was one from which the Word of God was excluded. This was a Christian country, and it would be a scandal, he said, if there was no opportunity given to have the religion common to the whole people taught in the schools. Although there were some people in this country who did not believe in any religion, their number was small, and it would be a terrible hardship to the people generally if the Word of God were the only book excluded from the schools. Surely, he said, there were in the Bible chapters on which all could agree and which would not promote sectarianism. But he was not meaning to dictate to the 66,000 people of the Northwest. He would let them do as they think best and make the choice they saw fit, whether to be Separate or secular school



The French Treaty. With regard to the French treaty he had with regard to the rench treaty he had voted against it, because it had given Candada too little and France too much. It had carried by the largest majority of the session because the French-Canadians thought it a great thing to have a treaty with France. Every member almost who spoke spoke against it. Dr. Montague, as slavish a follower as any Government ever had, spoke against it, and so did Mr. Cockburn and Mr. Maclean of East York. Not had, spoke against it, and so did Aff. Only took \$80,000 a year of taxes off champagne and other wines of France, and, while relieving these luxuries, kept the duty on the necessaries of life. Then there was the fast line. Parliament had voted \$750,000 a year to it, and he had voted against it. Did they know, he asked, what the fast line is? It would enable them to go 20 knots an hour across the Atlantic, and if they did not strike an iceberg or run into a fog reach Liverpool in five days and some hours. If they did not want to go so tast the line would carry reight. But, unfortunately for the schome, here were already more vessels sailing out f Canada than could find cargoes. What as \$750,000 a year? Well, when they reflected that the controllable expenditure of the country, after taking out the sum annually required for debt payment and provincial subsidies, amounted to only 10 or 12

million dollars, it would be seen that the subsidy would make quite a hole in it. In all these matters he had opposed the Government; in fact, he had voted so often against the Government he had no shred of reputation left as an old-line Conservative. He, however, regarded himself—as he was kicked out of the Conservative—a free lance party, and he was not a member of the Opposition. He was free to vote according to his convictions and the interests of his constituents. He had tried to find a ground on which he might vote with the Government to show that he was sailing on an even keel. But, except in the case of the censure on the New Brunswick judges, he could find no occasion. [Applause and laughter.] Taking up the tariff question he opened this branch of his speech with the declaration: "I was, as you all know, a National Policy man and now I tell you that I am for as much free trade as we can get. We would be all the better if we could have it as it is in England. But that is impossible, and so I say that what this country needs now is to get down to a tariff for revenue."
