CUSTOMS SURVEYER SUBD WRIT ISSUED BY THE GOVERNMENT AGAINST MR. JOHN DOUGLAS.

80000 Alleged to Have Been Lost to the Customs Department by Careless Valuation of Wallpapers Imported by Firm of C. M. Taylor & Co. - Not Less Said to be Only \$2000.

On Saturday morning a writ was served on Mr. John Douglas, surveyor of the port of Toronto, in the Exchequer Court, to recover the sum of \$8000, which it is alleged was lost to the Government through his negligence. Three years ago the firm of C. M. Taylor & Co., wholesale stationers and paper dealers, imported a large amount of wall papers, which were stored in the company's bonded warehouse. The paper was packed in bundles of a uniform size. To outward appearance they were all the same. As a matter of fact, however, the bundles varied greatly in value and consequently each day different rates of duty were paid. From time to time the company received permission from the Customs House to take away quantities of the paper. The order in each case gave permission to the company to take out as many bundles as they wished, but each lot was taken from the warehouse where it was paid, and the lowest quality of paper, while those taken from the warehouse were in all cases bundles containing the most expensive goods.

The writ was brought against the surveyor for negligence in allowing the company to take away stock which was subject to a higher duty than that which duty had actually been paid. The loss alleged to have been suffered by the Government in this way is placed at \$8000.

The fact that the company were getting ahead of the Customs House was discovered until the firm failed. What goods were then left were contacted and sold to satisfy the claims for unpaid duty. It is said \$4000 was realized at the sale, and it is such in the case this would make the real loss to the Government only \$2000.

Proceeded by Department of Justice. The Controller's attention was first directed to the matter some months ago and he made a very careful investigation of the facts, and also the Customs House officers here. The matter was referred by the Controller to the Minister of Justice and it is understood it was on the latter's recommendation that proceedings were instituted against the surveyor.

Before proceedings were taken Mr. Douglas had a large number of merchants in the city, including many Conservatives, interested with the Controller on Mr. Douglas's behalf, pointing out that the ordinary rules of the Customs House were such that Mr. Douglas should not be held responsible for any negligence in the matter.

It is said the same custom prevails in regard to many other lines of goods, as that which prevailed in the delivery of goods from C. M. Taylor's bonded warehouse.

As everyone knows, Mr. Douglas has been an official of the Customs House for about 40 years, during part of which he occupied the position of acting collector.

Mr. Douglas, when seen at his residence, Broadview-street, said: "I am true that a writ has been issued against me by the Government for \$8000. I do not think it is a fair thing to make such a charge against me, when there are others that have made the same mistake as I have. The goods passed through other hands, and they did not define the qualities of the goods. It is the system that is at fault, and I did not detect it. work by day labor. This is only one side of the case. As a matter of fact, after the contract was taken out of Nelson's hands, tenders were again advertised for. The lowest tender submitted was one by Brown & Neeson, figures being \$80,000 in excess of the Nelson contract. The next highest tender was \$150,000 higher than Nelson's figure. When it was proposed to award the contract to Brown & Neeson, this firm refused to accept it and the position then was this: that the city had either to pay \$150,000 more than the Nelson contract, or to do the work itself by day labor. Architect Lennox decided that the latter method would be cheaper for the city and it was about that time that he advised the city to assume the work itself. As the account now stands, the city has paid \$23,000 in excess of the Nelson contract for stone work, and it may probably require \$100,000 more to finish the job. This is put down as an outside figure, consequently the city will save the difference between \$150,000, which was the lowest tender put in, and \$128,000, or \$22,000.
