Original Expeditionary Army Multiplied by Six, While Output of Munitions Has Increased Nineteen Fold---Record of Organization Greatest

Known in History,

LONDON, April 21. - (10.10 p.m.) - The British Expeditionary Force in France, which, at the beginning of the war, consisted of six divisions, has been increased to more than 36 divisions, or, roughly speaking, 750,000 men, accord-ing to a statement made by David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, in the house of commons this afternoon. The chancellor added that the place of every man who had fallen in battle had been filled, and that the army was adequately equipped.
