PEOPLE NOT BOUND TO PAY FOR RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION English Court of Appeal Accomplishes What Educational Bill Remedied.

London, Aug. 8.—A decision given by the court of appeals today leaves the question of religious education in Great Britain in a peculiar position. The Education Act of 1902 was intended to compel local authorities to pay for religious instruction in the voluntary schools and led to the notorious "passive resistance" movement, under which numbers of nonconformists refused to pay the rates levied to cover this expenditure for church schools.

Rejects Blueberry Pie, But Tarts Tickle His Appetite.

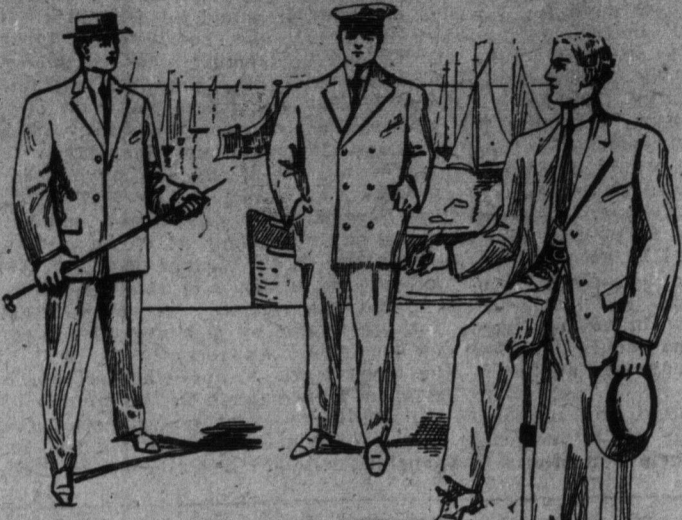

THEIR SIDE OF THE STORY THE TEMAGAMI RAILWAY

Superintendent's Report of the Accident to the Train Bearing Pittsburg Capitalists.

Editor World: I notice an article in your issue of Aug. 3 headed, "Pittsburgers Purchased Properties in Cobalt," the latter part of which has reference to a slight accident on our line. I enclose you herewith copy of the report of our superintendent in the matter, in connection with this matter, and I should be glad if you would be good enough to publish same in the columns of your paper. Thanking you in anticipation, H. W. Pearson, Secretary-Treasurer, Toronto, Aug. 8, 1906.

North Bay, Ont., Aug. 6, 1906. Mr. C. B. Smith, Chairman, Toronto: Dear Sir,—I have noticed in The Toronto World a report of an accident to special train running from Cobalt to Temagami on July 29, and I beg leave to give you particulars in connection therewith.

The party on this car were ticketed to the party on this car, and left on our train No. 3, Sunday, July 29, changed their plans and requested that they be taken to New Liskeard, for which they were charged. On the 29th they were taken to Argente Sidling on our morning local, lifted on the evening local for Cobalt. They made request at Cobalt that the evening local be run through with them to Temagami, which we refused to do, unless they paid us \$10, our charge for same, which they refused to do, but after local had departed, decided that they would pay this amount. To assist them in their movements, I took engine off train No. 11 and ran their car to Temagami, leaving Cobalt 7:05 p.m. When at mileage 100 1/2 at 7:12 p.m., engine running tender first became derailed and ran a short piece on the ties. As you know, air-brake is of little effect once engine gets on the ties. Private car at no time was derailed; engineer making a very quiet stop, not even spilling the tea that conductor had poured out for himself in his caboose.
