

These can be only one explanation of the situation, viz, that the offerings are beyond the ability of the money market to handle. Large investors and financial institutions would like much to take up some of the new bond and deterure issues, but are not permitted, because their funds are already engaged. Some of these have large lines of stocks, which are more difficult of sale than the bonds, and for which an exchange would be acceptable, if a shrinkage in the former could be avoided. The present is not an isolated instance of this condition of affairs in financial history, and the remedy has been brought about in various ways, but practically by a heavy reduction in prices where inflation has occurred. As recently as 1903, the remedy was applied to the stock markets, and whether this will have to be resorted to again, or a turn taken in the commodities markets, will not be settled until the event materializes. Highgrade bonds, unsaleable, except at concessions, are not the acme of perfection of a safe financial position. Herbert H. Ball.


