

Victoria, B.C., Nov. 25—The opening of the Behring Sea Claims Commission witnessed some preliminary skirmishing between P. C. Peters, senior British counsel, and Don M. Dickinson, senior counsel for the United States. Chandler P. Anderson of New York was chosen secretary.

The rules of procedure were then taken up. Both sides agreed on all but one, and here they were diametrically opposed. Mr. Peters wanted the Canadian claims dealt with singly, but to this Mr. Dickinson strongly objected, arguing that the British sealers should put in all their claims, and then the United States authorities would submit their defence at San Francisco.

Mr. Peters replied that it might not be necessary to sit at San Francisco.

The point was finally settled in favor of the British contention. Sixteen British claims, with a total of \$459,500, and with interest added from the time of seizure, were filed yesterday, and more will follow.



A QUESTION OF DRUGS.
