



[Sensation.] I regard it as an abominable crime," continued the General, "to have endeavored to substitute for him a man of straw. However disreputable he may have been, and whatever his offences, which in any case would not lessen the guilt of Dreyfus, my conviction is the same as at the commencement of the affair.
