Scenes Which Recalled the Days of the Commune—Church of St. Joseph Attacked and Pillaged.

Police and Gendarmes Were Attacked With Knives and Hatchets and There Was Considerable Bloodshed—Bonfire Made of Church Furniture—380 Persons Injured.

Paris, Aug. 20.—Paris was today the scene of most serious disturbances, recalling some of the aspects of the Commune. In response to an appeal of The Journal Le Peuple and La Petite Republique, groups of Anarchists and Socialists gathered at 2 in the afternoon in the Place de la Republique.

The Police Interfered. The police then interfered and dislodged Faure and Fabrot, making three arrests. The crowd at this point dispersed, but a column of demonstrators, headed by Faure and Henri d'Hort, made for the Place de la Nation.

More Fierce Fighting. The police, reinforced by a squad that had been held in reserve, made another attempt to stem the current and fresh fighting started, three constables being killed and several wounded.

Smashing Windows. In the meantime the Anarchist mob retraced its course to the Place de la Republique and started smashing windows of offices on the rue de Valenciennes.

Church of St. Joseph Wrecked. Hatchets were suddenly produced, with long knives stolen from the counters of shops and a concerted rush was made toward the Church of St. Joseph.

Police Drew Their Swords. In the avenue de Villiers there was a fierce conflict. The police had to draw their swords against the Anarchists.



AGAINST OLD AGE PENSIONS. The Unionists Opposed the Proposal to Tax Wheat 1 Shilling a Quarter. London, Aug. 20.—The speech which the Right Hon. Henry Chaplin, president of the local Government Board, made a week ago, suggesting the taxing of wheat one shilling a quarter in order to provide the nucleus for an old age pension fund, has aroused great opposition, especially among the Unionists, and it has been discussed freely by all in the course of the week. The Spectator sums up the opinion of the Conservative party in regard to the matter when it says: "That a Cabinet Minister should encourage, such a proposal and with an obviously protectionist intent, is a matter which cannot but be a subject of grave concern to all Unionists, who regard the Emperor's rule, which is not dead, but only comatose, should be faced with a united front."

'T WAS A STUNNING SURPRISE. Emperor William and His Cabinet Greatly Taken Aback by Thursday's Vote. ON THE GOVERNMENT CANAL BILLS. Centrist Party Thought to Have Played a Trick Which Upset the Conservatives. Berlin, Aug. 19.—The result of Wednesday's and Thursday's sessions of the Diet, the unbroken opposition to the Conservative party, constituting almost a majority of the House, came as a stunning surprise, not alone to Emperor William, but also to the whole Cabinet, Dr. Von Miquel, the Prussian Minister of Finance, included. To one of his intimates the Emperor said early this week, referring to the opposition to the canal bill: "To yield in this matter now before we would be tantamount to an abdication." To the same gentleman his Majesty complained bitterly of the fact that the Cabinet often managed affairs of importance so badly as to force him against his will to actively interfere. The result of Thursday's vote in the Lower House, when, by a vote of 212 to 200, it rejected the second reading of the bill relating to the Dortmund-Ems Canal and the Central Canal bill, came as a surprise to the Emperor, nobody supposing that the Opposition was so strong, especially after the Emperor's vigorous declaration. The whole political scene in regard to the canal bill, whereas it was expected they would at least vote for the Dortmund-Rhine Canal section.



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
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
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
