

It was stated yesterday that some of the Lower Cove grocers refused to buy at the advanced rates, claiming that they can procure milk at the old prices, and this is said to have created some discussion among the wholesale dealers.

Upon inquiry it has been found that in many instances small grocers have lost regular milk customers who, they say, have arranged with milkmen who are willing to supply them at the rate of six cents per quart. 
