PRICES IN NEW YORK SHOW IRREGULARITY

Local Monetary Situation Developed Improvement but Banking Position of Country Still Weak-- Wall Street Makes but Poor Response to Some Favorable Developments.

THE ORE DEAL

The lease of the Great Northern ore lands to the United States Steel Corporation is the most stupendous industrial operation in the United States since the Carnegie consolidation of which this is the outcome. The United States Steel Corporation holds a majority of the control of the production of this country.

Referring to this phase of the situation, a citizen talking with the Times said, "You can readily understand an increase in the price of condensed milk under present conditions. You take, for instance, a person with a small income, or if you will, the man who is blessed with a large family, but commands only a very limited income. In either case you will probably find that his daily milk supply is barely enough for actual needs. But raise the price on this supply, however small it may be, a single cent a quart, and you the difference in the cost per year, and you will find it means considerable to the man who has to look at a dollar twice before he spends it."

With regard to the effect of the higher figures on grocers' handling milk, very much depends on locality, or, perhaps more accurately, the class of customers to whom he caters for the bulk of his trade. In some parts of the city grocers say that milk customers either dropped off or bought less, at first, but that they have again fallen in line and pay the new figure without comment. In other portions, either they cut down their supply, use the condensed milk, or--if they cannot get a milkman who will supply them at the six cent rate.

CHEW YOUR FOOD AND LIVE LONGER

Professor Irving Fisher, professor of political economy at Yale, has been conducting experiments to discover whether proper mastication and enjoyment of food affects the working powers of the individual. The professor has just made his report on the subject in the Yale Alumni Weekly.

"These experiments were made with nine Yale students," Professor Fisher says. "The experiments began in January, and lasted four and a half months. At the middle of the experiment the men had improved 50 per cent in endurance. The second half showed as marked improvement as the first, and at the end of the experimenting the men were able to do double the amount of physical work as shown by gymnasium tests, that they were capable of in January. This increase in working power is ascribed by Professor Fisher to dietetic causes.

"The men led sedentary lives and took no more exercise than before the experiment began. "Meats were available three times a day, but it was found that by thorough mastication the men gained more desire for meat and substituted cereals, fruits and nuts, so that at the end of the first half of the experiment their daily consumption of meat was little more than half of its original amount.

"In June it was found that the men had decreased their consumption of fresh foods to one-sixth of its original amount." Professor Fisher says that the practical conclusion from these experiments is that it is in the power of a healthy individual to double his endurance in 5 months by thorough mastication, prolonging the enjoyment of food and acquiring a more sensitive choice of amounts and kinds to meet the varying daily needs of the body.

ROOSEVELT BACK AT HIS DESK AFTER HIS HOLIDAYS

President has Removed to Washington from Oyster Bay---His Vacation has Benefited Him---Secretary Shaw and Attorney-General Moody to Retire from United States Cabinet.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 4.—President Roosevelt, who has just returned to Washington at the beginning of the week and early in the morning after his week-end stay at Oyster Bay, N. Y., is reported to be in excellent health.

The president is of the opinion that the island will not require the management of the United States for a very extended period. It will be the object of the administration to restore order, compel a fair election and a re-establishment of the government and then to turn the country over to the Cubans once more.

Cabinet changes are the topic every autumn when the president and his advisors come together again and before the close of the session there will be two important changes in the present circle.
